DUKES SLAYER DYING.

A Kannis Tag / Bealls Two Pennazi nia Murdera.

JIM NUTT EHOOLS TOO LEOPLE.

His First Victim, a Weman, Will Die. The Woman, After Being Wounded, Inflicts Fatal Wounds with an Ax on Her

ATCHISON, Kan., Feb. 6.—Jim Nutt, made famous for killing Lawyer M. L. Dukes, in Uniontown, Ps., over a decade ago, because he seduced Miss Nutt, is dy-ing from wounds inflicted yesterday by Mrs. John Payton, who committed the act after Nutt, in a drunken rage, had fatally shot her. Neither can live: Leonard Colsman, a hired man, who attempted to save Mrs. Payton's life, is lying seriously wounded, having received a bullet from Nutt's revolver, but will recover. The crime was most horrible and unprovoked. The prominence of the families makes it

The Nutts and Dukes were at one time prominent politicians in Pennsylvania, while Coleman, who is 27 years of ago, originally came from New York, where he was well known. Fourteen years ago M. L. Dukes, then a prominent lawyer in Uniontown, Pa., seduced Miss Nutt, and killed her father in an encounter arising out of this. He was acquitted on a plea of self defense, and was then killed by James Nutt, the girl's brother, who was in turn acquitted on a plea of emotional insanity. The trial created a great sensa insanity. The tri

Shortly afterwards young Nutt moved to Kansas, to where his present farm is situated, and managed his mother's farm. He was considered a good citizen, and be-came prosperous. Until two years ago the Paytons worked for Nutt, living on his tarm. The relations became strained, however, and the Payton family, consisting of the parents and five children, rented a farm eight miles from Nutt's place, from

a Mrs. A. E. Bradbury. Payton has been away from home most of the present winter cutting ice, during which time Nutt renewed his relations with the family. Nothing out of the way was discernable in his conduct, however, until he sauntered into the Payton house hold at a late hour under the influence of liquor. Payton was absent, and Coleman the hired man, was the only other man on the premises. Nutt, who had been on a week's spree, was in no pleasant mood, and gruffly ordered Mrs. Payton to get him some supper. Mrs. Payton complied, and scenting trouble, quietly got the children from the room. As he ate Nutt be-came more abusive toward Mrs. Payton and seemed to be becoming insane. When he had finished eating he deliberately drew his revolver, and pointing it at the nov thoroughly frightened woman, cried:

"I'm going to kill you." Before she could make a move he car-ried his threat into effect, sending three bullets into her body. The shots attracted Coleman, who rushed into the house with an ax in his hand. The instant he entered Nutt leveled his weapon at him and Two shots struck the would-be rescuer. He fell to the floor, and for a time lay unconscious in the blood that poured

from his wounds.

At the same time Mrs. Payton, with a superhuman effort, raised herself from the floor and secured the ax. Nutt had sunk down, overcome by liquor, and was help-less. Bushing to where he lay the woman with her own wounds bleading profusely and harself weak from loss of blood rained blow after blow upon Nutt's head. until she was too weak to longer wield the ax did she desist. Then she sank to the

floor and became unconscious.

Coleman first came to his senses, and Coleman has came or found both Nutt and Mrs. Payton lying in great pools of their blood. Tying Nutt to a chair, Coleman gave the alarm. When assistance arrived the woman was beyond help. Neither Mrs. Payton or Nutt are able to relate the story of the crime. Cole-man is also in a bad way, but will recover. Nutt has been removed to Atchison.

The Nutt-Dukes Tragedy.

PITTSBUBG, Feb. 6. — The Nutt-Dukes ragedy, which is recalled by the Kansas killing, was the reigning sensation in Pennsylvania in 1888, and it gained national notoriety. Captain Nutt was as-sistant state treasurer and M. L. Dukes was a member of the legislature from Fay ette county. Both lived in Uniontown Dukes had been paying attention to Lizzle Nutt, and was engaged to marry her. In the spring of 1883 Dukes, as an excuse for breaking the engagement, wrote a let-ter to Captain Nutt, who was then in Har risburg, which was offensive and proper, relating to Lizzle. On receipt of the letter Captain Nutt started for home to investigate the allegations made in the letter. He wrote to Dukes to meet him, but instead Dukes bought a revolver and kept out of the way of Captain Nutt. Finally Captain Nutt went to Dukes' office and went there unarmed. Then the first tragedy occurred, Dukes alleging self

Father and Son Burned to Death. PITTSBURG, Feb. 6.-Frederick D. Miller and his 6-year-old son were burned to death at their house on Second avenue Fire was discovered in the kitchen at midnight. Miller, his wife, children and a hired man ran to the front of the building. On the way Mrs. Miller lost the boy, and ner husband returned to find him. Miller, one child and the man escaped by jumping into blankets from the second story windows. After the fire Miller and the boy were found lying on the floor of the bedroom dead.
