IN SENATE AND HOUSE.

Senators Discussing the Proposed Cable Connection with Hawaii.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The Hawaiian question in general, and the Hawaiian cable in particular, were the main themes before the senate yesterday. The diplomatic committee appropriation bill was taken up and would have been quickly disposed of except for the item of \$500,000 for immediately beginning cable construction between the United States and Hawaii.

Mr. Mills (Tex.) made a point of order against the cable proposition which is likely to rule it out, but the decision was withheld until senators could further debate Hawaii.

Mr. Hale (Me.) presented estimates showing the prospective cost of the cable to be about \$2,500,000. Mr. Platt (Conn.) upheld the cable project, and read early presidential messages of Mr. Cleveland urging congress to provide for the cable. Mr. Platt also maintained that Great Britain would build this cable if the United States did not, thus linking England and Hawaii by commercial ties.

Mr. Teller (Colo.) renewed his criticisms of Secretary Herbert's course toward Hawaii. Mr. Gray (Ill.) defended the course of Secretary Herbert and of the administration, and caustically characterized the overthrow of Queen Liliuokalani as a "mean, paltry conspiracy."

The bill for a new postoffice at Chicago was passed without opposition.

The debate in the house on the administration bill authorizing the issue of \$500,000,000 of gold bonds for the retirement of the legal tenders and treasury notes was not productive of marked incident of any kind.

A good deal of confusion existed after 2 o'clock, when the committee began voting on amendments to this bill.

Most of the amendments were defeated as rapidly as offered. The committee on banking and currency sustained two defeats, two of the amendments proposed by that committee being voted down.

IN FAVOR OF BRAZIL.

President Cleveland Settles the Long Pending Boundary Dispute.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The president yesterday announced his decision as arbitrator between Brazil and Argentina in the boundary dispute between the two countries over the Misiones territory. The decision is in favor of Brazil.

The territory involved covers an area of 81,000 square miles, and has a population of about 7,000 inhabitants. In early colonial times it was the subject of frequent controversy between the crowns of Portugal and Spain, and efforts have been made in more recent times to arrange the disputes between Brazil and Argentina by treaty, but all without success up to this time.

The situation of the disputed territory is of no little interest, not only from a political but from a military standpoint. Its loss to Brazil would almost have cut off the rich and populous state of Rio Grande do Sul from the remainder of the republic, leaving only a narrow neck of land of something less than fifty leagues in width as a means of connection.

CHICAGO, Feb. 7.—Burglars secured entrance into the county clerk's office some time during Tuesday night, and finding the lower vault unlocked secured possession of the cash box and took therefrom \$10 in currency and checks for \$3,000.
