Senators Discussing the Proposed Cable Connection with Hawaii. Wassing one, Feb. 7.—The Hawaiian questio (1997) control, and the Hawaiian cable in particular, were the main themes before the senate yesterday. The diplomatic consular appropriation bill was disposed of except for the item of \$500,000 for immediately beginning cable construction between the United States and Hawall. Mr. Platt also maintained that Great Britain would build this cable if the United States did not, thus linking England and Hawali by commercial ties. Mr. Teller (Colo.) renewed his criticisms of Secretary Herbert scourse toward Hawaii. Mr. Gray (Del.) defended the course of Secretary Herbert and of the administration. and caustically characterized the over throw of Queen Lil as a "mean, paltry conspiracy." He declared it was about as commendable as a busband beating a wife. The Hawnian debate was resumed today

Rents Most Be Lowered-Home Industry Argument Revived.

Careful inquiry has convinced me that it will require heroic measures on the part of landlords to tone down the future THIRD EDITION interests of this town. A few weeks hence there will be at least a dozen less bustness places than are now found open. This should be a hint to property owners to act, and act at once. Many of the best business people are complaining that the hard times, heavy credit business and high rents are gradually forcing them to the wall.

Many families of the town are in great distress, and in several instances they have "doubled up" in an effort to reduce the rent. This saving with a use of stoves on the co operative plan is enabling them to "stand off" the effects of the times, to some degree.

But in the midst of all these evidence of stringency money is plentiful, except as a circulating medium. The deposits as shown by the statements of the Mer chants' and First National banks are surprisingly large and the secretaries of the saving funds say the payments come in regularly. There is also considerable money hoarded privately by people who would rather throw their savings into a stove than trust them to the banks. All this money is tied up. No one wants to invest until the financial cloud hovering over the country gives some indication of disappearing. It is hoped that when sunshine beams again the people who have the means will roll up their sleeves and do something towards giving the town industries that will furnish the people with a dependence other than that fur nished by the coal mines. If our capitalists will step forward and show a disposition to put up their money they will find many of less means, but who can give some help, willing to follow their example. Shenandeah can be made a place of many industries that will come in very handy when a dull coal market throws the breakers idle. The cap factories of town are breasting the bard times and manage to distribute among some people sums that come in handy in these times These industries prove good stand-bys.

IN FAVOR OF BRAZIL

President Cleveland settles the Long Pending Bonodary Disputs.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The president esterday announced his doublen as arbi rator between Bearll and Argentina in he boundary dispute between the two countries over the Missiones territory. The decision is in favor of Brazil.

The territory involved covers an area of 81,000 square nitles, and has a population of about 7,000 inhabitants. In early colonial times it was the subject of frequent controversy between the crowns of Portugal and Spain, and efforts have been mod in more recent times to arrange the dis-putes between Brazil and Argentina by treaty, but all without success up to this

The situation of the disputed territory The altuation of the disputed territory is of no little interest, not only from a political but from a military standpoint. Its loss to Brazil would almost have cut off the rich and populous state of the Grande de Sul from the remainder of the republic, leaving only a narrow neck of land of something less than fifty leagues in width as a means of connection. Thus the teras a means of connection. Thus the ter-ritory of Missiones, if held by a foreign sower, would be a continual menace to the sease and progress of Rio Grand do Sul, as weil as to the states of the north. Inas-much as Missio, as has always been in the on of Brazil, the willingness of the latter to submit the matter to arbitration has caused considerable favorable com-

Senator Parter's Case Against Andrews. PRILADELPHIA, Feb. 7.—William T. Andrews, who is charged with having made libelous statements against Senator C. A. Porter, of the contracting firm of Filbert, Porter & Co., was placed on trial in the criminal court yesterday. The case grown out of the construction of the Queen Lane reservoir, the contract for which was awarded Filbert, Porter & Co. for over \$1,000,000. Andrews is charged with hav-ing written a letter to Director of Public Works Windrim, in which he accused the firm of having grossly violated the terms of its confract and charged them with having cheated the city out of nearly \$250, 000. Only two witnesses were called for the prosecution yesterday—City Controller Thompson and Director Windrim—both of whom pronounced the charges false Sensational developments are promised when the defense opens.
