

## THER HOLE DESTRUCED!

Fire Wipes Out a 7 eloge for Waifs at White Plains, M. Y.

CHILDREN WAKENED FROM SLEEP

To Find the Westchester Home in Flames. The Two Hundred Children Safely Taken from the Burning Structure, and No Fa-Inlities Resulted.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Feb, 16 .- The Westchester Temporary Home, on North street, about a mile from the county court , was totally destroyed by fire last. found dead in a lonely place near Stamfard ford, Conn., having committed suicide by ranging from i to 15 years of age. dren, ranging from i to 15 years of age. Besides, there was a dozen teachers and nurses. The home was in charge of James Pierce, who is the superintendent, and Miss McDonald, assistant superintendent. Mr. Pierce had been away all day in Poughkeepsie, and returned on a late train, after the building was in ruins.

About 10 o'clock a watchman in the building discovered the cellar in a mass of flames. The fire had originated from a defective flue. At that hour the little ones were sound asleep. They were awak-ened as quickly as possible and hurried from the burning building. They were first taken to the laundry, but the beat became so intense that they were transferred to the schoolhouse and cared for.

An alarm was sounded in the village, and the entire fire department of White Plains repsonded and started for the scene. They had hardly gone half a mile when they were told that the fire was out, and returned to their fire houses. A telephone call was later sent in that unless the department hastened the whole institution

A second alarm was sounded and the department again started out. When they arrived at the home the main build-ing, which was 75 feet front and 100 feet deep, was a mass of flames. It was only possible to save the buildings adjoining the home, and this was done with dif-ficulty. Most of the children's wearing apparel was destroyed, and the children, many of whom were sick, suffered con-siderably from the cold.

The Westchester Temporary Home was established about fifteen years ago by well known society ladies of New York. The president of the institution is Mrs. Charles Butler. Among the board of managers are Mrs. William F. Cochran, Mrs. Richard Hoe, Mrs. Jennings McComb, Mrs. Brinkerhoff and Miss Helen Gould.



IN SENATE AND HOUSE.

The Postoffice Appropriation Bill Passed the Senate Without Amendment. WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The senate con-fined itself strictly to business yesterday, and as a result passed the postoffice ap-propriation bill and got half through the agricultural appropriation bills. Efforts were resumed to out down the rentals for postal cars and for the eastern fast mail service, north and south, but all these amendments were defeated by decisive majorities Secretary Morton was present during the debate on the agricultural bill. It brought out an animated discussion of the proposition to amend the meat inspection system in order to get American ments into foreign countries. During the day the pooling bill was taken up long enough to purnit a speech in its support by Mr. Butler, of South Carolina, in charge of the bill. The finance committee reported favorably the hill repealing the one-tenth discriminating duty on sugar from countries paying a sugar bounty, and Mr. Aldrich submitted a motion to recommit the bill to the committee with instructions to add provisions for reci-procity, bounty on domestic sugar, and for meeting treasury deficiencies. No action was taken on the report or motion to

The house considered the naval appropriation bill and devoted the day to general debate. The bill carries \$31,807,-023 and authorizes the construction of three new lines of battle ships and twelve torpedo boats. The features of the bill providing for the new ships were antagon-ized by Messrs. Simpson, Hall and Everett, and were supported by Messrs. Talbott, Bolliver, Pendleton, Money, Weadock and Myer. It is expected that a vote will be reached on Monday.

Says He Sacrificed Himself for Another. DANVILLE, Ind., Feb. 16.—John Sexon, of Thornton, who was tried here for the naurder of Hiram McDonald, and who was sentenced to twenty-one years' imprison-ment, has made a statement that the murderous blow was struck by Charles Pat-terson as the result of a long standing grudge. He also claims that Patterson in-fluenced him to bear the brunt of the affair, saying that if he (Patterson) should be arraigned he would be hung because of his bad reputation, but that it would be an easy matter for Sexon to establish a good character and get free. Sexon also claimed that Patterson perjured himself.

#### Murderer Lake Convicted.

Albion, N. Y., Feb. 16.—The defense in the Lake murder trial closed yesterday afternoon and at 9 o'clock last night the jury returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. Lake stood up, and when the court asked him whether he had anything to say why sentence of death should not be pronounced replied: "No sir." The prisoner was the coolest person in the court room. The judge sentenced Lake to be electrocated at Auburn in the week beginning April 1. William Lake killed Emma Hunt, who was a domestic on the farm of his employer, Joseph Van M. Camp. Lake was a farmhand.

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
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
