Further Fighting Reported Near Thien Uhwang Thai,

ONLY FORTY MILES FROM MOUKDEN

When the Latter City Is Beached the Vie torious Armies Will be on the Direct Road to Pekin-Meantime Chinese Officials Are Hoping for Peace.

LONDON, Feb. 28 - A dispatch from Tien tsin says it is reported that the Japanes have advanced from Hai Cheng and that fighting has occurred around Thien Chwang Thai. Rumors are current of trouble in the foreign settlement at New Chwang. The families of missionaries soming into Tlentsin from the interior report that the authorities everywhere were anxious to protect them. The towns people of Tung Chow, near Pekin, requested the missionaries to mediate with regard to the ransom of the city should the Japanese appear. The gentry of Tien tain recently made a similar request of the foreign consuls.

Thien Chwang Thai, around which town fighting is said to have occurred, is on the right bank of the Lino river, a considerable distance to the westward of Hal Cheng and about forty miles west by south of Moukden, capital of the province of Liao Tong, which is thought to be the present objective point of the Japanese forces operating in Manchurla. It is surmised from the above dispatch that the Japanese will move upon Moukden from two directions, that portion of the army from Hai Cheng attacking it from the south and the other portion, from Thien Chwang Thai, from the west. Once at Moukden the Japanese will be on the direct road to Pekin.

Another dispatch from Tientsin says that the Rev. Gilbert Reid, of the board of foreign missions of the Presbyterian church in the United States, who is now at Pekin, has privately interviewed the members of the grand council and other Important Chinese personages. All the persons interviewed expressed themselves as being strongly desirous of peace with Japan, and hoped that the mission of Li Hung Chang to Japan would be succes

Dispatches received at Yokohama from the commander of the Japanese forces a Hai Cheng say that a force of 17,000 Chi neso, supported by twenty guns, recently attacked the Japhnese troops at that place, but retreated after the Chinese artillery had been silenced by the fire of the Japanese batteries.

The British warship Alacrity has an rived at Shanghai from Wei-Hai-Wei and reports that the Japanese have destroyed all the land forts at that place with the exception of those on the island of Lin Kung Tae.

Awful Crime in Chicago,

CHICAGO, Feb. 26.-Evidence of what the police think is a frightful murder mystery were found yesterday when two children discovered the mutilated body of a man in a lonely locality at Ninety-fifth street and Western avenue. The body, which was that of a man about 25 years old, was found in a sitting posture, leaning against a tree. The hands, legs and lower part of the body were badly burned, deep gashes were found in the head, and about the waist were the remnants of a charred and singed rope. The theory that the man had been tied and burned to death was at first laughed at by the police officers, but later investigations seemed to prove either that he had been murdered and an attempt made to conceal the crime by burning the body, or that he had really been burned it the stake. The body is supposed to be that of Fred Holzhuter, a butcher of this city. The last seen of him was three weeks ago when he went out to buy cattle with \$250 in his pocket.

IN SENATE AND HOUSE

Lower floidy flotuses to Anthonias Parment of the Rebring Son Award.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.-The general de fictionary bill, the last of the regular ap-propriation bills, passed the house yester day. Almost the entire day was spent discussing the amendment to pay Great Britain \$425,000, the amount of damages agreed upon by Sceretary Gresham and Sir Julian Pauncefole to be due that ountry under the award of the Paris arbitration tribunal on account of the seizure of some twenty Canadian scalers by the United States previous to the modus virendi of 1892.

The amendment was strongly attacked by Messrs, Cannon (Ilis.), Henderson (In.) and Hitt (Ills.) on the ground that the amount was unreasonably large; that some of the vessels were owned by citizens of the United States, and that \$375,000 was for constructive or speculative damages (the estimated catch). Only \$\$1,000, they ontended, was due Great Britain. Messrs. Breckinridge (Ky.), McCreary (Ky.), Ding-ley (Me.) and Hooker (Miss.) supported the amendment, maintaining that the government, no matter how bad the bar gain, must carry out the award of the Paris tribunal in good faith. Mr. Dingcydeclared that it was preferable to pay Great Britain \$425,000 than leave the assesament of damages to an umpire ap-

pointed by a foreign power. The amendment carried in committee, but was defeated in the house by 112 to 143. Some excitement was caused by the attempt to strike out in the house the appropriation for an extra month's salary for the employes of the house and senate and the clerks of members, but it failed, and the amendment prevailed, 143 to 108. Mo tions to reconsider and recommit were voted down as promptly as offered until the opposition dwindled to a point when it could not get the yeas and mays. It then surrendered, and the bill was passed.

The senate is now working day and night on the appropriation bills in order to complete them before the session closes. The sundry civil appropriation bill was considered with little interruption or delay from 11 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. and again at a night session. The item of \$150,000 for purchasing the historic property of the late James G. Blaine in order to prevent its use for theater purposes occasioned a sharp debate, but was finally agreed to.

The Philadelphia Investigation.

HARRISBURG, Feb. 26 .- The movement for the appointment of a senate committee to investigate the municipal affairs of Philadelphia has not been abandoned, as many suppose, but is merely in abeyance. At a conference before the legislative recess between the friends in the senate of Senator Quay it was decided that there should be such an investigation, and a resolution was outlined to be introduced by Senator Kennedy, of Allegheny. Senator Penrose favors an investigation, and would vote and fight for it in the senate

His Brother Adry.

PERJURY MOST EXTRAORDINARY.

Either Harry or Adry Is an Adept in Bearing False Witness, for the Former Repeats Adry's Story with Their Positions Raversed.

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 20.-It was some what of a surprise to Mr. Nye, the county attorney, when Mr. Erwin turned Harry Hayward over for cross-examination short time before court adjourned. He had expected that the examination would take at least the day and was hardly prepared to go into the examination He therefore contented himself with going over som minor matters that he might begin in earnest this morning.

The day was an extremely interesting one, being filled with the troubles between the witness and his brother. Adry, he said, had proposed all the bloody details of the murder. Harry explained that he had been so shocked at his brother's depravity that he had resolved to sound many other people to see if they had such wonderful consciences. Thus it was that he had questioned Waterman and the hackman, and even L. M. Stewart, and he dared the state to put Stewart on the stand

Instead of having threatened to kill his brother with a knife, Adry, he said, had threatened to kill his father, and had often stated that he was so devoid of conscience that he could kill his father easily and not be troubled about it afterward. All through his evidence it was Adry who had been the fiend, Adry who was the slaughterer, Adry who had a mania for killing people, Adry who was the member of a gang, Adry who was everything, and yet with all this he went on to tell how he confided all his business to Adry and begged his father to take him back into his employ. Not much more of interest developed during the remainder of the direct examination, and Mr. Erwin turned the witness over to the state late in the afternoon. Mr. Nye made Harry admit that he had been a gambler by habit for years-in fact, since he was 17 years old. Then he went over his relations with Miss Ging, and had Harry repeat his wanderings the night of her murder. He got along very well ex-cept to say "my flat" twice in places where

he had said on direct examination that he went into his mother's flat. Mr. Erwin interrupted and corrected him. In speaking of where he went after leaving the flat witness said he went directly up Hennepin to Laurel avenue, On direct examination he said that he went down Hennepin first, intending to ook for Miss Ging at her place of business. Harry showed on a map where he had gone until he reached Mr. Bartleson's goine until he reached sir, parties a residence. 


