SLATTERY WILL SPEAK. | MUNYON PRAYED FOR.

The Right of Free Speach Will be A Prominent Divine Invokes God's Blessings Exploding Gas Brings Sorrow to Upheld in Savannah.

BARRED OUT OF MASONIC HALL.

The Ex-Priest, However, Will Secure An other Hall, and the Citizens Will Protect Him from Mob Violence-Another Day

SAVANNAH, Feb. 28.-Yesterday was a day of great excitement here. one general expression of opinion, and that was that Slattery should lecture again if he degred, if it took the whole military force and half the citizens to protect him. Prominent Catholics unite in this opinion, and declare that nearly all of those participating in Tuesday night's riot were non-churchgoers. It has ceased to be a case of an ex-priest desiring to lecture, and has become in the minds of many a question of the preservation of the right of free speech in Savannah.

Mrs Slattery was booked to lecture to

women at Masonic Temple yesterday after-noon, and at 1 o'clock, under police escort, he and her husband were taken to the hall. Prior to this the managers of the Men's Hebrew association had notified Slattery that they would break the con-tract and refuse to allow the use of the hall which they have leased, as his lan-guage incited to riot and endangered the

lives and property of citizens. Slattery would not consider the contract broken. Arriving at the hall the police refused to admit any one. Several hundred women were turned away. Slattery and President Haas, of the Hebrew association, became involved in a wordy dispute, and the chief put Slattery under arrest, but released nim, as Haas declined to enter any charge.

After Slattery had waited an hour for a

awyer it was decided that he and his wife would go back to the hotel. The police were ordered in line and the mounted ofcers decided to clear the streets at once. Hundreds of people ran wild to get a dimpse of them. A crowd of women and been grouped just outside of the curb on Bull street, and as the ex-priest and wife passed they were hissed loudly and spat at. The police had their hands full o keep the passageway clear.

When the Pulaski House was reached it was almost impossible to see the hotel for the people who had congregated. The Masonic hall would have been unable to have held the women if it had been opened.

Finding the hall locked, many came down to the Pulaski House. There Mrs. Slattery held a reception. Hundreds called on her, and some tendered her the use of their parlors to lecture in. Such a scene had never been seen before in this city. At one time over a hundred women were in the hotel parlor, crowded about the ex-nun. If the lecture had been held at the hall hundreds of citizens would have gathered around it to protect those inside if the atacks by roughs had been resumed.

The refusal to let Slattery have the hall is being severely criticized. He is making arrangements to lecture at Odd Fellows' hall tonight, and the outlook is that there will be a thousand men out to hear him. The entire police force will be on hand. and some of the military companies will probably be held in reserve at their ar-

that I meant business. People will continue in a nervous state until after tonight. The hope is generally expressed that after it has been shown to the world that free speech is maintained here that Slattery and his wife will leave Savannah at once

To this letter Commissioner War ing has sent a reply, in which he says: "l regard your organization as being an anti-labor organization, opposed to working men and opposed to work—an association carried on in the interest of idleness. I believe its chief cause of existence to be that your leaders may earn your salary by making mischief. I am opposed to the infliction of the burdens on workingmen. and their cost to the whole people, that the infamous conduct of "organized labor" has caused."

ANOTHER MINE HORROR

Many Families.

TWENTY-SIX PROBABLY KILLED.

Eleven Men Taken from the Fiery Furnace. but It is Helieved That All of These Will Die from Their Jujumes - Taking Out the

ALBEQUERQUE, N. M., Feb. 28. - A special to The Morning Democrat says: White Ash coal mines, three miles from Cerrillos, were the scene of a terrible explosion yesterday. Thirty-seven men were working in four levels when the disaster occurred. Eleven of these have so far been rescued, all in a dying condition. The remaining twenty-six have doubtless perished. Over twenty dend bodies have been recovered. The scenes at the identification of the

wounded and dead were heartrending. The miners are all married, and when the news of the disaster spread, wives and children hurried from Waldo and Madrid. Not until this evening were searchers able to descend, owing to the poisonous vapors. In the course of half au hour several dead were sent up. Then it was feared not a soul of the thirty-seven had escaped.

Later in the evening eleven dying miners were discovered in a bunch. They were probably overcome in an effort to escape. The explosion is thought to have been due to accidental breaking into an abandoned

chamber charged with gas.

The sight about the mine was heartrending in the extreme. Frantic wives many of them carrying babes in their arms, having children clinging to their skirts, stood at the entrance of the mine for hours amid tears and prayers, while hundreds of men valuely struggled to gain an entrance further into the mine. So dense was the smoke at one time during the afternoon that many thought the mine had taken fire, and the conduct of the wives and mothers when this was announced as a probability was painfu! in the extreme.

Up to 5 o'clock the gas continued to pour forth from the single opening in the mine in such a volume as to make the progress of the rescuers very difficult, but an hour later the noxious vapors cleared away, and the work of rescuing the dead bodies began to prove more successful.

Many camp fires dot the scene, and the anguish of the women and children hovering about them, hoping for the best and urging the men on in their endeavors to reach the ensombed, while others are clinging to their dead or ministering to those brought out alive, presents a picture of human anguish seldom witnessed.
