AN EARTHQUILLE SCARE. ALMOST INCREDIBLE. Citizens of Maxico Fear Serious A Professional Nurse Afflicted With

Seismie Disturbances.

ANGIENT VOLUANO IN ERUPTION.

While the Shocks Thus Far Felt Have prehensions of a General Earthquake Period, with Disastrous Results.

CORODOBA, Mexico, March 11.-The peak of Orizaba, the ancient volcano, is in ; state of eruption. The signs of disturb-ance began to manifest themselves on Sunday night of last week, and have in creased in force constantly since that time It is now vomiting poisonous gases, and thick volumes of smoke are emitted from 100 apertures in its great maw. The earth for 100 miles around has shaken periodi-cally with subterranean vibrations. A great alarm exists among the dwellers in the cities of Corodoba, Orizaba, Kalaha and the dozens of small villages scattered within the scope of the strange and inter-esting phenomenon.

The shocks as yet have not been of a dis-astrous nature, and no damage from them has been reported. The rim of the crater glows like fire, and the thick gases rolling down the mountain sides have set affame the grasses and vegetation clothing the sides of the summit, which adds to the density of the smoke and the grandeur of the spectacle.

the spectacle. For the public safety the governor of the state of Vera Cruz will shortly name a commission of scientists to make all the investigation into the eruption possible, and to make recommendations looking to the protection of the inhabitants of the neighboring will see

The present eruption is in the heart of the best improved coffee district in Mex ico, where there are located many Ameri-cans who have embarked in the profitable business. The coffee plantations are not as yet thought to be in any danger of damage, nor will they be unless the fall of thick ashes occurs, which is not considered probable. Masses are being said in all the churches of the locality to ward off

the impending danger. Coming soon after the late destructive volcanic activities in many parts of the re-public, the cruption of Orizaba has many terrors, not only to the people of its vicin-ity, but to all living in the volcanic belt stretching from the active volcanic for stretching from the active volume of Co-lima, on the west const, clear to the Gulf of Mexico on the east. Within this helt are numbered dozens of old craters, either in repose or smoking constantly. It is natural to suppose that should its eruptions continue the other volcances will be affected and a general earthquake period set in. The consequences of such a catas trophe are hard to foretell, but could hardly be anything less than very disastrons to Pueblo, City of Mexico and the hundreds of other towns in the heart of Mexico.


