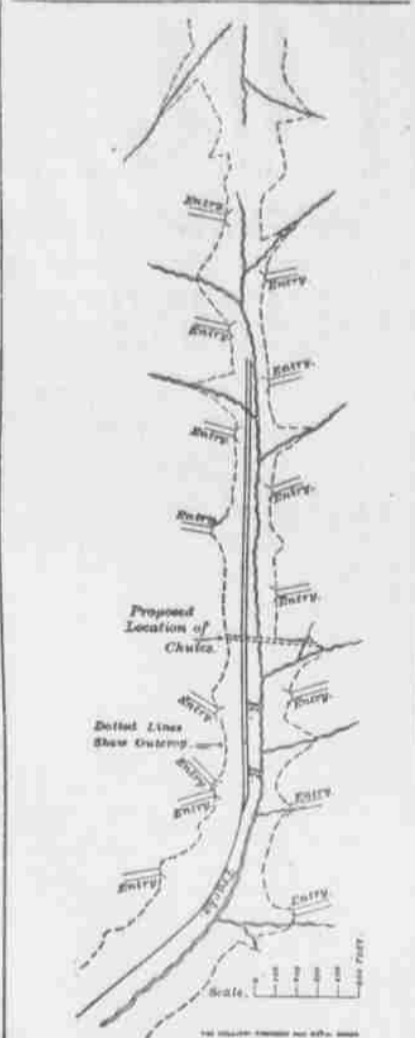

A MINE PROBLEM.

Prominent Mining Company Offers \$100 for a Feasible Plan.

[From the Colliery Engineer, Scranton.] A prominent coal company, in one of the Southern states, submits to our readers the solution of a practical question, and will pay for any plan suggested, that overcomes the difficulties, a cash prize of one hundred dollars. The following map and cross section show the proposed location of a tippie for a drift mine. What is wanted are suggestions as to the best system of outside haulage, and sugges-



MAP SHOWING PROPOSED LOCATION OF CHUTES.

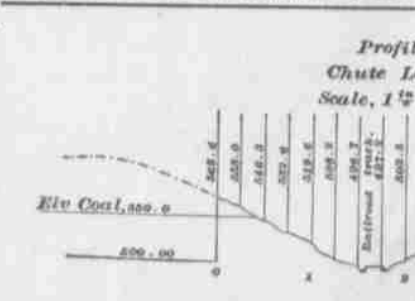
tions as to the best way of handling the coal from the pit car to the railroad car with a view to the least breakage, with only room for the proper screening (say 16 ft. screens) of the same.

The coal is very soft, and will run from 35 to 40% slack, even with careful handling.

It is desirable to get the tip not more than 20 ft. vertically above the railroad grade. On the map the proposed location of the chute is shown. On one side of the ravine the coal outcrop is 50 ft. vertically above the railroad, and on the other side it is 30 ft. vertically above the railroad. The outcrop line is shown on the map as a heavy broken line. The outcrop is comparatively level, that is the bottom slate on each side of the ravine is comparatively level only with a slight rise toward the head of the ravine. As will be seen, on examining the map and section, a gravity plane is impracticable. Further the "drop" from the level of the drift mouths on one side to a point 20 ft. above the railroad grade is 19 ft., and 30 ft. on the other. There is now in operation a chute with stop blocks, on an elevation of 50 ft. above the railroad grade, but it breaks the coal very badly. The main point desired is to get the coal in the mine car as close to the railroad car as possible, or as close as possible to properly screen it, making only two classes of coal, slack, and what is termed "run of mine," over a one inch screen.

It will be noticed that there will be an average outside haul from drift mouths to tippie of 2,000 ft. The life of the mines at a capacity of 1,400 tons per day will be about seven years. These figures are given so that an idea of the amount of expenditure that would be justifiable in handling the available coal may be formed.

Any reader of The Colliery Engineer and Metal Miner offering a suggestion as to the cheapest haulage, arrangement of tracks, and best method of getting the coal to the railroad cars with least break-



age, based on the mines having a capacity of 1,400 tons per day, or 700 tons from each side, will be paid one hundred dollars if the plan is adopted.

A Consul's Change.

GALVESTON, Tex., March 20.—M. Leon Giddul, for fourteen years consul for France at this place, has been assigned to the consulship at Santiago, Cuba, and left for his new station today. He will be succeeded here by M. Meron, formerly French consul at Hamburg.

Marblehead Shoemakers Locked Out.

MARBLEHEAD, Mass., March 20.—A lock-out occurred at the John Loney shoe shops, where 300 hands are employed. Several questions are in dispute between Mr. Loney and his employees, and pending a settlement he decided to close his factory.

Killed by a Fall of Coal.

SHANORIN, Pa., March 20.—John Davlinski, a miner, was killed at the Enterprise mine by a fall of coal. His spinal column was fractured.

A Woman Banker's Failure.

GENOA, Neb., March 21.—A notice posted in the window of the Bank of Genoa, signed by Ben H. Cowdry, state bank examiner, says: "This bank closed and in my hands as temporary receiver." Less than two weeks ago the bank was reorganized and a new set of officers was chosen, with a woman as president. It was announced at this time that the reorganization made the bank one of the best financial institutions of its size in the state. It had a capital stock of \$50,000. The receiver expresses the opinion that the bank will pay out without loss to the depositors, but it will require time. When the bank was reorganized Mrs. H. E. Robbins was chosen president, Arthur E. Anderson cashier and G. Wilson vice president.

To Enlarge New Jersey's State Prison.

TRENTON, March 21.—The house last night passed Assemblyman Ginder's bill appropriating \$15,000 to enlarge the state prison, and naming a commission to have charge of the work. A similar bill, with different commissioners named, had previously passed the senate.

Women Lawyers for New Jersey.

TRENTON, March 21.—Governor Werts signed the women lawyer bill, which provides that women may be admitted by the supreme court to the examinations for attorneys' and counselors' certificates.

NUGGETS OF NEWS.

The Japanese fleet has blocked Tamai, a treaty port of China on the northwest coast of the Island of Formosa.

Joseph H. Hogan, who killed his brother William in Philadelphia on March 7, was arrested in Chicago yesterday.

Mrs. Mary E. Lease has declined the candidacy for mayor of Wichita, Kan., tendered her by the Citizens' convention.

George Timony, mail carrier between Niles, Mich., and Bertrand, has disappeared, and it is believed he has been murdered.

Three children of Charles Ross, of Springfield, Mo., all under 3 years old, were locked in the house while the parents went visiting. The house took fire and all were cremated.

Thirteen diamond cutters who were second class passengers on the Red Star steamship Westernland, from Antwerp, are in the custody of the United States immigration officials at New York, and will undoubtedly be returned to Belgium as contract laborers.

For a New Iron Passenger Steamer.

PHILADELPHIA, March 20.—Edwin S. Cramp, of the William Cramp & Sons' Ship and Engine Building company, signed a contract in New York on Tuesday with Boulton, Bliss & Dallett, owners of the Red "D" line, for a new iron passenger steamer for their direct trade between New York and Maracaibo, to be ready for service within six months. The ship, which is to be of 1,500 tons burthen, will measure 253 feet over all, with 38 feet beam and 17 1/2 feet moulded depth. She will be built in the most approved style of architecture.
