Germany's Emperor Honors the

Venerable Statesman.

PRESENTED A SWORD OF HONOR.

WILLIAM AND BISMARCK. THREW AWAY THE BELT

The Emperor's Presentation Speech - His Majesty Headed a Body of Troops Who Had Been Detailed to Honor the Prince.

The Artillery Fires a Boyal Salute. FRIEDRICHSRHUE, March 27.-Emperor William, who visited Prince Bismarek yesterday, accompanied by the crown prince, left the special train near the village of Aumuehle, where he mounted a horse, and, attended by a brilliantly uni-formed staff, rode quickly to the spot selected for the assembling of the troops who had been detailed to do honor to the

With Emperor William at its head this force was marched to an open space in Prince Bismarck's park, and upon arriving there the troops were deployed in parade order. Prince Bismarck had come in an open carriage, and were the uniform of



MISMARCH. the Hasberstadt calrassiers. The officer saluted, the troops presented arms, the bands played patriotic airs, and the em-peror welcomed the prince with the great st heartiness

His majesty then took up a position in front of the troops, and delivered an address of congratulation to the prince.

Then, in the name of the army, the emperor presented Prince Blsmarck with a sword of honor of antique form, richly embossed and inlaid with gold. After this ceremony Emperor William, accompanied by Prince Bismarck, drove along the ranks of the troops, the prince returning the sa-

lutes with evident pleasure.
In presenting Prince Bismarck with the sword of honor Emperor William, refer ring to the presence of the cuirassiers, said that he handed him the gift in recognition of his deeds, adding: "I could not have found a better present than a sword, whether as a weapon of the ancient Ger mans or as a symbol of never failing re source, and upon it are engraved the united arms of the Roichsland. May your serene highness look upon this as a token of gratitude for deeds recorded in history which were brought to a conclusion twen ty-five years ago. Let us, comrades, shout a hurrah for his serene highness, Prince

Bismarck, duke of Leuenberg." Recovering his composure, the ex-chan-

"Will your majesty permit me to lay at your feet my humblest thanks. My military position towards your majesty will not allow me to further express my feelings. I thank your majesty."

He then kissed the kaiser's hands, and

his majesty urged him to mount his car-riage, which Prince Bismarck only did when the crown prince had first entered the vehicle and taken a seat to the right. Then the ex-chancellor, escorted by the

emperor, drove in front of the troops, and after the rounds had been made the troops filed past Prince Bismarck, the emperor personally leading Bismarck's cuirassiers. Court Master Count Eulenburg brought Prince Bismarck's daughter, Countess von Rantzau, and her sons, and led them Countess across the field to stand at the side of the prince.

After the review the cuirassieres, with the emperor in command, mounted guard at the castle. The emperor ordered double sentinels at each door, and presented all the members of his suite to the ex-chan-

Luncheon was served shortly after wards, and when the emperor proposed Prince Bismarck's health the artiflery fired a salute of twenty-one gunk.

Emperor William, in proposing Prince Bismarck's health after the luncheon, referred to the services which the latter had rendered to Emperor William I. Prince Bismarck in roply said that since 1848 he had only done his duty and nothing more As for the recent action of the reichstag in refusing congratulations, he added, he could only deplore the lack of national

sentiment thereby displayed.

The empress of Germany commissioned the crown prince to present to Prince Bis-marck a beautiful basket of roses and a letter of congratulation. The young prince handed the gift to Prince Bismarck with

the simple words, "From Mazama." Emperor William has appointed Prince Bismarck's physician, Dr. Schweninger, to be privy medical councillor, and has conferred upon Dr. Crysander, Prince Bis-marck's secretary, the Order of the Grown.

HIS EXTREME AGE AGAINST HIM.

A Disputch to a Metropolitan Newspaper Declares That the Mikado's Physician Has Reported Confidentially That There Is No Hope for China's Premier.

NEW YORK, March 27.—A special to The Press from Washington says: "In a pri-vate cablegram from Tokio received by a member of the Japanese legasion here is conveyed news of world wide interest. According to this dispatch, which comes from the highest official source in Japan. a German physician, who is a professor at the University of Tokio, and an expert of high standing, was sent at the personal request of the emperor to examine Li Hung Chang's wound.

"After a thorough examination of his

"After a thorough examination of his distinguished patient the physician reported confidentially to the mikado that Li Hung Chang must die. The wound is in the face, and the builet, which the surgeon had not succeeded in extracting yesterday, is apparently beyond reach. Moreover, Li is 70 years of age, and, aithough a classically his years are against him.

giant physically, his years are against him. "The dispatch which conveys this in formation is a private and confidently one, but its trustworthiness is not doubted by its recipient, who gave the news to The Press correspondent.

The Chinese Concessions.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 27.-It is stated on good authority that in addition to the indemnity which will be guaranteed by the provisional occupation of the Chinese the provisional occupation of the Chinese territory already occupied by the Japanese. Li Hung Chang, the Chinese peace envoy, is authorized to cede to Japan the Loo Choo islands, which lie to the south of Japan, the Majico-Sima group, to the eastward of Formosa, the islands of Batan and Babuyan, which lie to the northward of the Philippines, and the Island of Formosa, Instructions have been diversed. mosa Instructions have been given to Li Hung Chang ordering him to oppose any demand for the cession of territory on the Lion-Tung peninsula. As a last resort he may suggest the conversion of the peninsula into a buffer state between Corea and China on condition that it be placed under the protection of Russia, France and England.

A More Cheering Report.

SHIMONOSEKI, March 27.-The condition of Li Hung Chang is favorable. It is re-ported that he has now consented to the extraction of the bullet in his face. His only fear is a lack of cleanliness on the part of his physicians in using old instru-

Our Claims Against Venezuela.

WASHINGTON, March 27.-After months of deliberation the Venezuelan claims commission yesterday concluded its labors and announced its decision, being a judg-ment in favor of citizens of the United States for \$143,500, about one-third of the amount of the claims. This judgment amounts to a declaration that countries subject to revolutions are responsible for the acts of insurgents against the rights and properties of foreigners, even if these acts are beyond their control. Senor Andrade, the Venezuelan representative on the commission, has given notice that he will file a dissenting opinion in the case.

Proposing a Reduction for Ironworkers PITTSBURG, March 27.—The conference on the proposition of the Ohio valley mannfacturers to pay only \$3.50 per ton for puddling and a general reduction of 15 per cent, in the finishing departments will be held on Saturday. Unless the manufac turers withdraw the proposition a strike is likely to be declared in the Shenandon! and Mahoning valleys, and fully 10,000 men will be idle.

Forgot to Lock the Jail Door.

WICHITA, Kan., March 27,-Twenty-six prisoners escaped from the city prison yes terday. Twelve were immediately recap tured, and the remainder ran in different directions, with officers in hot pursuit. Chief Massey has corralled all but two. It is claimed by the prisoners that the turn key forgot to lock the door.
