GIFTS FOR BISMARCK. HELD IN BONDAGE Every 'Train Bears the Germans' Tokens of Esteem.

VAST OROWDS AT FRIEDRICHSBUHE

In All Parts of Germany the People Are Wild with Enthusiasm in Celebrating the Veteran Statesman's Birthday-Fires Burning on Every Elevation.

FRIEDRICHSBURE, April 1.-The Bis-marck celebration is in full swing, and displayed by the German people over the south of the second states over the south anniversary of the hirth of the old chancettor. Every train arriving at Fried-richards in budded with presents for the aged statesman, and every post brings hundrads of congratulatory, letters, not and from people in Germany, but from Germans and others throughout the civil-ized world. Thousands upon thousands of the special Bismarck post cards have been sold, and a great number have been mailed to the United States. Those in Germany who have received them have put them carefully away to be preserved as mementoes of the iron chancellor and the great outporing of the public heart in his honor.

Today, the actual anniversary of the prince's birth, withesies such a popular demonstration as has not been witnessed since the return to Berlin of the Prussian army from Brance, Every preparation had been made at Freidrichsruhe to accommodate yest crowds. The decoration of the station had been concluded, and the roadway from the station to the Schloss had been transformed by willing hands into a veritable triumphal arch.

A beautiful work of art, the gift of in-habitants of Anhalt, who took up a sub-scription for the purpose, has been erected in a field overlooking the prince's home. The work which is the prince's home. The work, which is in bronze, represented

a large stag keeping two dogs at bay. For the first time since the beginning of the celebrations in his honor Prince Bismarak on Saturday was somewhat fatigued and indisposed, his old trouble, neuralgra, troubling him slightly. A good night's sleep, however, restored his health, and to day he is as bright as ever.

Thousands of visitors arrived here yes terday, hoping that they would get a glimpse of the prince. Quite a fair has been established in the vicinity of the station. Refreshment booths have been erected, and here, there and everywhere are itinerant purveyors of Bismarck post cards, medals, portraits and mementoes

of every description. Yesterday the prince received his first congratulatory telegram from a crowned head outside of Germany. It was from King Oscar, of Sweden, and contained a graceful expression of his majesty's interest in the occasion and hearty well wishes for the prince's welfare and longevity.

One of the features of the Bismarck celebration at Hamburg was the holding on Saturday night of a "commers," organized by the reichstag electoral union. Sixteen hundred admirers of the prince were pros-ent, and hundreds had to be turned away from the doors, owing to lack of room Several senators, the president of the house, burgesses, officers and the elite of Hamburg society were present. Dr. Sie-veking, president of the supreme provinvoking, president of the supreme provin-cial court, proposed "hochs" for Emperor William. His majesty's popularity has been greatly increased here by his graceful attitude towards the prince, and the "hochs" were given with a hearty good will. Dr. Sieveking then made an elo-quent speech, in which he highly eulogized the arrying Prince Biamarch had sondered the services Prince Bismarck had rendered the empire. The speech was received with





An Unknown Schooner Founders Off Nova Scotia's Coast.

SAILORS IMPERILLED.

THE CREW WILL PROBABLY PERISH.

Fears That Resenters Will be Unable to Reach the Men, Who Are Clinging to the Rigging, Owing to the Shallow Water in the Vicinity.

YARMOUTH.N.S., April 1.-An unknown ARMOUTH.N.S., April 1.—An unknown two masted schooner foundered yesterday morning off Cape St. Mary, near the Bay of Fundy extremity of the Nova Scotia coast. Cape St. Mary is thirty-five miles from Yarmouth. The vessel was discov-ered early in the morning apparently dis-abled, drifting towards Trinity ledge, a transformation of scale scenario miles of treacherous line of rocks several miles off the coast. Suddenly she began to settle, and it became evident that she had struck the ledge. As soon as the people of Cape St. Mary learned of the schooner's plight they notified the marine officials, and steps were at once taken to send relief. At this season the small craft along the coast are Inid up, and it is next to impossible to procure a vessel of any description for miles along the coast in the vicinity of where the schooner is situated.

ity of Trinity Ledge it is doubtful if a pag can reach her, and there is also great dan-ger of the vessel being washed off by the tide. About twenty feet of the schooner's masts were out of the water late last night, and several men were elinging to them, but it is feared that the unfortunate men will perish before a vessel own reach them.

Philadelphia's New Mayor Sworn In.

PHILADELPHIA, April 1.-At noon today Hon. Charles F. Warwick took the oath of office as mayor of Philadelphia. Mr. Warwick was the first mayor to take the oath of office in the big city hall, the long line of mayor's preceding him having been sworn in in the historic old state house. After the inauguration there was a public reception from 1 to 2 o'clock. The first official communication from Mayor Warwick to select conneil will in all probabil-ity be the one announcing the appointment of Thomas M. Thompson director of public works and Abraham M. Beitler director of public safety.

Death of General Chesney.

LONDON, April 1.-The Times this morn-ing announces the death of General Sir George Tomkyns Chesney from angina pectoris. General Chesney was the author of the "Battle of Dorking." He was edu-cated at Woolwich, and joined the Bengal engineers in 1848. He was lieutenant in 1854, and served throughout the slege of Delhi, where he was twice severely wounded. He was made a captain in 1858, major in 1872, lieutenant colonel in 1874, colonel in 1884 and general in 1892. In 1887 General Chesney became a member) the council as the governor general of India

Among those present were representatives of thirty-six cities in the Rhenish district.

Throughout Germany last night joy fire burned on the highest mountain peaks and hills from the Baltic and the North as on the north to the Swiss and Austrian frontiers on the south, from the Russian frontier on the cast, to the frontiers of France, Belgium and the Netherlands on the west. Never before in the history of the empire has there been such a heartfelt and spontaneous exhibition of love by

the German people. Today all the schools and most of the civic and state offices are closed in honor of him to whom the empire owes its ex-

The Berlin papers comment upon the enormous number of gifts of valables that have been sent to Prince Bismarck. These are of every squeetvable kind, including sansages two yards long, choeses weighing from 130 to 150 pounds and masses of horse radiah.


