Mayor Strong's Pertinent Message to the Board of Aldermen.

INCREASED BONDED INDEBTEDNESS

The Mayor Declares It "the Result of a System of Financial Jugglery Practiced by the Previous Administration" to Defor the Issuing of Bonds.

NEW YORK, April 3.-Mayor Strong sent a message to the board of aldermen yes-terday showing the financial condition of the city. He said there was a big excess in the budget over previous years, and al-leged that this was due to a system of financial jugglery practiced by previous administrations. In the park department, he said. \$1 000,000 were expended under the guise of helping men who were out of work. The mayor said that every technical subterfuge was adopted by the pre-vious administration to dedge the issuing vious administration to dedge the issuing of bonds in order to force this duty on the left me."

"The question of affairs as herein presented, and the consequent increase of bonded indebtedness that must be shown against the city at the close of this year is attributable to the result of a system of financial jugglery, practiced by the previous administration in an apparent en-deavor to mislead the public into the innocent belief that, knowing the liberal and perhaps wasteful expenditures on spe oial accounts during the year, particularly by the park department under the \$1,000,000 act, ostensibly to give work to the un-employed, that the debt of the city had not been increased to the proportions that the statements herewith submitted indicate and with such delusion seek to produce a political as well as a hoped for beneficial moral effect, and leave to the future the realization and burden of the actual con-

dition of the financial affairs of the city.
"An examination of the statements, as submitted by the comparation, justifies the belief that every technical subterfuge was availed of to defer authorizing the issue of bonds or to defer issuing them after the were authorized in 1894, leaving their issu and the responsibility of the same, and th consequent increase of the bonded indebt edness, to fall upon the administration of

The mayor also speaks sharply of man datory legislation which increases the city debt, and goes over the history of assessments of corporations which kept up as ssed values, but many of which were set

aside by the courts.
Under date of March 14 the comptroller transmitted to the mayor a statement showing approximately the liability of the city for public works and improvements which on Jan. 1, 1895, still remained to be paid out of the proceeds of bonds then unissued. The total amount for which the city was liable on that date was \$19,379,

The mayor makes no recommendations whatever, but simply says that he sends the message for the information of the board and the public

Two Drowned in the Monongahela, PITTSBURG, April 3.—By the upsetting of a skiff, either by accident or the resulof a drunken row, two young men, sup posed to be John Brotia and Thomas Gro gan, both residents of this city, wer drowned in the Monongabela river. Th two men, with George Wolfe, John Mc-Manus and William Ford, started to cross the river in a skiff, and when some distance from shore the boat capsized and Grogan and Brotia were drowned. The three men rescued were locked up until the police investigate the matter, as they all tell conflicting stories of the accident.

Snow Hill, Md., April 3.—The bodies of William T. Birch and Charles Hudson, two of the three men who were drowned while trying to sail across Sinepuxent bay last January in the face of the worst storm ever experienced in that section, were recovered near here on Monday. Rel atives of the dead men have been searching for the remains for ten weeks, and have dragged the bay for many miles around the scene of the accident, yet the bodies floated ashere directly opposite where the men were drowned.

Swift, their candidate for mayor, by a plurality close to 40,000. Of the aldermen, the Republicans have certainly elected sixteen out of the total thirty-four, and claim that they have fully thirty aldermen, but this is very doubtful, the Democrats claiming at least ten of them. Frank Lawler, the ex-congressman who ran as an independent in the Nineteenth ward, is elected by a good mafority.
