INCOME TAX FIGHTERS, THREW AWAY THE BELT

They Will Continue the Battle Against the New Law.

ATTORNEY GENERAL OLNEY'S VIEW

He Declares That the Division of the Supreme Court Upon the Major Portion of the Law is as Binding as Though the Whole Court Favored It.

WASHINGTON, April 10.-Since the delivery of the income tax decision attorneys and others interested in overthrowing the tax have been taking steps to test various parts of the law in further proceedings.

Attacks will be made both on those por-

Attacks will be made both on those por-tions that were sustained by a tie vote and on some fresh points not passed upon in the particular cases decided on Monday. Attorney J. M. Wilson, of Shellabarger & Wilson, who represented John G. Moore in the court of appeals in the recent cases, said that further proceedings would be taken immediately.

Several parts of the law will be attacked," said he, "the principal one being the exemption from taxation of incomes under \$1,000 annual. This will be attacked as an unjust discrimination. I cannot say just yet who the complainants or what the titles of the suits will be, but they will be instituted very soon, probably within a few days, and be pushed as rapidly as pos-sible."

"So far as the lower courts are con-cerned," said Attorney General Olney today, "the division of the supreme court upon the income tax law is as binding as if the whole court had been unanimous in its favor. I cannot believe that any judge would grant an injunction to prevent collector from collecting the tax on comes derived from other sources rents or state and municipal bonds in the face of the supreme court's action. The only way I can see by which persons who object to paying the tax can secure judicial action is by their paying the tax under protest and entering suit for its recovery."

The occupants of the houses along Bushkill creek have moved their effects to the second floor for safety. The Delaware is twenty-five feet above low water mark, the highest point reached in many years, and is still rising rapidly. Thousands of dollars' worth of lumber has been carried away in the lumber region.

Verdict Against "Messiah" Schweinfurth. CHICAGO, April 10 .- The long delayed trial of George W. Coudrey against Jacob Schweinfurth, the Rockford "Messiah," took place in Judge Dunn's court yesterday. The jury returned a verdict award-ing Coudrey \$50,000 damages, the full amount asked for. The jury was but a few minutes in reaching the verdict. Schweinfurth's people say he has no money to meet the damages. Coudrey charged that the defendant alienated Mrs. Coud-rey's affections from her husband by inducing her to enter his "heaven." Solwein-furth did not appear in the trial, though summoned, declaring that he "did not recognize earthly courts." He will be ar-rested for contempt of court.

Remarkable and Sweeping Repeal Law. RALEIGH, April 10.—The startling dis-covery has been made that the election law passed by the last legislature repeals all the city and town election laws enacted since 1888, but does not provide any stitutes for them. In cities which this new law may affect, and whose charters may not have been amended by the late legislature, there will be no city government unless that is a provision of law for the present municipal authorities to hold over. This will be a matter for the supreme court to consider. Counsel em-ployed by Republicans made the discovery as to this remarkable and sweeping repeal.



In the neighborhood of Mont Verde, province of Santiago de Cuba, Lieutenant Garrido overtook a number of rebels belonging to the forces of General Maceo. The government troops captured three rebels, among whom was one man who belonged to the expedition headed by General Maceo, which recently landed on the coast of Cuba. The rebels were obliged to seek refuge in the mountains, pursued by the troops. In this skirmish the govern-ment soldiers sustained no loss.

Brigadier Moncado died from Illness at Muscaral, Santiago de Cuba, on Monday. He was generally known as "Guillermo," and was the leader of the rebels of Guata name, who recently defeated a detachment of Spanish troops commanded by General Lachambre. "Gulllermo" was a negro of the blackest complexion, a carpenter by trade, and with the stature of a Hercules. In the long Cuban revolution he displayed great courage, and when General Martinez Campos brought about the pacification of Cuba "Guillermo" was appointed inspector of agriculture at Santi-

Private news received in this city is to the effect that the civil and military au-thorities of Pherto Frincipe were told re-cently by an informer of the existence of a conspiracy to raise a body of Insurgents to take the field as soon as Field Marshal Martinez De Campos arrives in Cuba. The governor at once gave orders for the ar-rest of the conspirators, the names of whom had been betrayed by the informer.

Among these taken into custody were the Marquis of Santa Lucia, and four equally well known gentlemen, all of whom are now in prison. Varono Aguero was also denounced as being implicated in the conspiracy, but news of the discovery of the plot coming to his ears, he dis-appeared and his whereabouts has not yet

been learned.

According to the information of the conspirators Marshal De Campos intends to land at Guantanamo, a well known sugar port on the south side of Cuba, a short distance to the eastward of Santiago.

Venezuela's Gratitude,

WASHINGTON, April 10.—The president of Venezuela has sent a special message to the congresses of Venezuela concerning the attitude of the United States on the British Venezuela question. Immediately following the receipt of the president's message the congress passed resolutions, amid great entimislasm, heartly thanking the United States for its sympathy and support, and these resolutions have just reached this city. The Venezuelan people are getting up a monster popular petition, breathing the warmest appreciation for the support of "the great republic of the north

Murderer Buchanan Weakens,

SING SING, N. Y., April 10.-Dr. Buchanan, the condemned wife murderer, M. S. RISTLER, M. D., who is under sentence to be executed in the electric chair on Monday, April 29, has completely broken down, and if the condemned man continues to fail it is a ques tion whether he will be able to walk to the execution room. He has lost thirty pounds weeks ago. Buchanan did not seem to realize his position until the court of appeals confirmed his conviction.

Mr. Aubrey Will Not Contest,

CHICAGO, April 10.—James Matthew Aubrey, Jr., has filed his answer to the divorce bill of Pauline Conyn Aubrey, a daughter of Chief Justice Fuller, of the United States supreme court. The answer is very brief, and admits the single charge in the bill, which is that of indulgence in intoxicants. The answer, being a formal one, shows on its face that Mr. Aubrey does not desire to contest the case. Mrs. Aubrey will be awarded the custody of her two children.
