

> New Dumping Grounds Must be Secured for Ofal and a Committee Has Been Appointed for That Purpose.

An adjourned meeting of the Board of Health was held in the Council chamber last night, but the business for which the meeting was held was not transacted on account of all the members of the board not being able to attend. The business related to the West Coal street sewer, of which so much complaint has been made and it was decided to postpone action until the next regular meeting of the board.

Another important matter was brought up through a report by the nulsance committee to the effect that Capt. E. C. Wagner, assistant superintendent of the Gi rard Estate, had given notice that the contents of cesspools must not be dumped upon the lands of the Estate. This order leaves the town officials in a quandary. There are a large number of cesspools that must be emptied, and yet the work cannot proceed under the order issued by Capt.

Before adjourning last night the Board of Health appointed Dr. S. C. Spaiding the Girard Estate and P. & R. C. & I. Co. officials to see if some arrangement can be made to secure a lease of grounds to be used as a dumping place for the offal. Some effective means should certainly be resorted to for doing away with the pestilential filth which is gathered in the spring and summer. A public dumping grounds is far preferable to none at all yet to have the filth of the town dumped within even half a dozen miles of places of habitation is by no means in accord ance with the views of modern progres and medical science. A creamatory is the only means by which the emergency can be effectually met. Cleanliness is one of the necessaries of the hour in this town. And now a question arises as to whether the borough owns its electric fire alarm system. A firm called the Munici-pal Signal Company, of Boston, lass., now comes out with circulars and claiming to be the owner of a large number of letters patented for inventions relating to muni cipal, police and fire alarm, call and signa systems and apparatuses operated electricity and are notifying all boroughs towns and cities of such ownership with a view to calling attention to infrituge ments of the patent. Shenandoah is among the places notified and the not states that the apparatuses controlled the company's patents are principall issued from the Gamewell Fire Alarn Telegraph Company.
