

BUT WILL MAKE A LEGAL FIGHT.

He Denounces the Charges of Mismanagement and Malfeasance, and Brings Suits for Heavy Damages Against Several Directors of the Trust.

PEORIA, Ills., April 18 -The whisky trust reorganization committee carried yesterday's annual stockholders' meeting of the Distilling and Catalo Foelling com pany by storm, and when they adjourned had deposed ex Posident Greenbut, elected a full board of directors and empowered the board to take any necessary action to wards recovering from the trust's late of-ficials any property that may be due to the porporation

But Mr. Greenhut was not at all doclle, being present at the meeting with objec-tions at every turn, refusing to resign as director, and before adjournment he per-sonally superintended the serving of papers in eleven libel suits of \$50,000 each. The suits were served upon the members of the reorganization committee, Messrs. R. B. Hartshorne, John I. Waterbury, F.



Hutton, and upon Attorney Levy Mayer of Chicago, Attorney Nathan Bijur of New York, Receiver John McNuita and New York, Receiver John McNuita and the three experts who have been examining the trust's books. The ex-president further made the session interesting by reading a decidedly warm annual report, and by intimating that he intended to fight the new management to a finish. The following is the company's new directorate: Samuel M. Rice, Walter M. Schoftel and T. H. Wentworth of New York, J. M. Hutton of Cincinnati, William J. Meyer, John M. Mott and Floyd E. Jennison of Chicago.

As there was no quorum of directors present the election of officers will be held in Chicago in the near future, when Sam-nel M. Rice, of New York, will very prob-ably be chosen to succeed Joseph B. Green-hut as president.

There was no fight over the election, the slate having been prepared in advance, and Greenhut's attorney simply gave no tice that the election of seven men was illegal, as the ex-president had not yet re-

signed. In his annual report Mr. Greenhut declared his accusers to be slanderors and faisifiers, denied absolutely all charges of mismanagement, and asserted that the present receivership is proving disastrous

BATTLE EN ORLAHOMA.

Factional Political Differences Result in Bloodshed.

SIX PERSONS KILLED THUS FAR.

Another Fight Expected at Any Moment Between the Friends of Governor Moseley and His Opponents-A Special Session of the Legislature Called.

GUTHRIE, O. T., April 18.—Couriers just arrived here from Tishomingo, the capital of the Chickasaw nation, report that a battle is raging between Governor Moseley and 200 insurrectionists. Six people have been killed and eight wounded, so the report says, and the greatest excitement prevails. The cause of the trouble is due to bad political blood, which has long pervaded the Chickasaw seat of government, and has existed since the legislature ignored Willis Brown, Charles Brown and Nonh McGill, who claimed to have duly elected sheriffs of the nation, alleg-ing that the legislature did not have authority to reject their claims to such of-

On Tuesday morning Governor Moseley ssued orders to all sheriffs, constables and deputies throughout the nation to report to him at once with arms. When the officers gathered around the house 200 enraged men, headed by McGill and the Brown brothers, rushed from adjoining houses, and a deadly riot followed. The names of the od and wounded could not be ascertained: the couriers, owing to the great excitoment which prevailed.

Governor Moseley and his official retinue

escaped by rushing to houses on the out-skirts of the town. Moseley has called a special session of the legislature to take action. Tishomingo is now in a terrible state of excitement, and white people are fleeing. Another fight is looked for at any

The Dominion Government Sustained. TORONTO, April 18.—The election which took place in Haldimand yesterday to fill a vacancy in the Dominion parliament was more important than is usual with a bi-election, from the fact that it is the first time that an Ontario constituency has spoken since the order was issued from Ottawa suggesting relief for the Roman Catholic minority in Manitoba. Dr. Montague, who takes the portfolle of secretary, represented the Dominion government, and Jeffrey McCarthy solicited the Orange vote as a protest against interference with provincial rights. In the last election Dr. Montagne had a majority of 78. Yesterday Montague's majority was 647.

Break in the Iowa Miners' Strike.

OTTUMWA, Ia., April 18.—A break has come in the coal mining trouble. The troops have been withdrawn from Cincinnati, and many miners are going to work Word comes from Boone county to the effeet that 500 men went to work with each operator paying what he pleases. The miners at Milford agreed at a meeting to resume work at the old scale until a new scale is agreed upon, and went into the mines this morning.

Murdered by Her Paramour.

Morgan City, La., April 18.—Adolph Scheurrick, a member of the Boyland protective police in New Orleans, shot Mallie Francisco three times in the head, killing her. He then placed the revolver against his temple and killed himself. He leaves a wife and four children in New Orleans. The woman also leaves four children. She deserted her husband for Scheurrick some

Not Guilty of Attempted Train Wrecking. May's Landing, N. J., April 18.—Fred Gondora, Pospello and Peter Quardino, the three Italians who were arrested for Lager and Sazzer Pale Bees. an alleged attempt at train wrecking on the Camden and Atlantic rallroad in February last, were put on trial here yester-day. The jury, after four hours' delibera-tion, acquitted all of them.

Colliery to be Closed Down.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., April 18.—The Col-eraine colliery, one of the oldest in the Le-high region, will shut down on Saturday for an indefinite period, owing to the low price of anthracite coal. The colliery has a capacity of from 1,000 to 1,200 tons daily.
