DEATH CERTIFICATES FORGED.

The Coffins Containing the Live Celestials Were Perforated, and the Scheme Was Worked by an Organized Gang-The Story Declared "Absurd and Impossible."

MONTREAL, April 24 .- A novel mode of smuggling Chinamen into the United States has just been brought to light by the shrewd work of the United States cus-toms officials of this city. About a year age an organized gang of smugglers was frightened off by the same officials, their thief point of operation then being Richford, Vr.

Not to be outwitted, the leaders of the gang put their heads together, and last month devised another means of getting the Celestials across the line. This time the wily Chinamen were consigned to rude pine coffins, with concealed air holes, and, with the aid of forged death certifiand, with the aid of forged death certain-cates, were safely shipped from St. John, N. B., to Vanceboro, Me., where the sup-posed corpses were claimed by one of the smugglers. After staying in hiding for several days the "corpse," attired as a fe-male, would be spirited away under cover of night, and before morning dawned was safely lodged in either Boston, Spring-

field or New York.

When this new means of entrance into the United States territory became gen-erally known among the resident Chinamen at Vancouver they took steps to in-struct their friends from the flowery kingdom as soon as they arrived on the Pacific coast of the manner of gaining access to the land of the free.

Arrived in Montreal, the Celestials were taken in hand by the smugglers, who shipped them this time to Quebec, and from there over the Intercolonial railway to St. John, N. B., where other members of the gang ran them into the states as

The Story Declared Absurd.

St. John, N. B., April 24.-The collector of customs at this port, when shown the dispatch from Montreal about Chinamen having been smuggled from this city to United States in perforated collins, said the statement was perfectly absurd. Such a thing was an impossibility.

Desperate Fight Between Convicts.

JEFFERSONVILLE, Ind., April 24.-Two olored convicts, Jackson and Tuller, engaged in a desperate fight in the Indiana state prison, South Jeffersonville. Jackson and Tuller have been enemies for some time. As the men were marching to breakfast Tuller applied an epithet to Jackson, and instantly they came to blows. Jackson was cut across the abdomen, face and arms. Dr. Peyton, the prison physician, cannot determine how seriously Jackson is cut, but considers his condition very

Iron Furnaces Closed Down.

New Castle, Pa., April 24.—Every furnace shut down last evening. The men have asked their employers to restore the wages of a year ago, and they have given the owners twenty-four hours to determine the matter. The latter declined to take the time, but decided to close at once. The men refused to coke down the fur naces, and the clerks and owners were obliged to do the work. The old wages gave the keepers \$1.25 per day, and they now receive \$1.75.

Attempts to Poison a Family.

FINDLAY, O., April 24 — Two mysterious attempts have been made recently to pedson the family of Frank H. O'Dell, an oil operator. On Easter Sunday Mrs. O'Dell and two of her children were attacked with the same symptoms. Two physicians who were called saved their lives, but both declared that arsenic poison had been admin istered to the patients, probably in the milk they used in their coffee. There is no clew to the perpetrator of the crime.

Distillery Owners Ignore Law.

PARIS, Ky., April 24.—Prosecuting Attorney C. Arnspargur issued warrants for Durner, Block & Co., of Cincinnati, owners of the Peacock distillery here. They have been running slop from their distil lery into Stoner creek, killing fish and en-dangering the health of the residents along the creek since last November. The fine is \$1,000 a day, and will amount to \$200,000 should the law be enforced.

Counterfeiters in the Tennessee Mountains. CHATTANOOGA, April 24.—Deputy Marshal George D. Barnes has just returned from the mountains of Bradley county, where he located a gang of counterfelters who have been operating for some time The officer was working alone, and did not attempt the arrest, but reported here that there are six men engaged in the work, and a posse will be organized at once to apprehend them.

Bank Cashier's Big Shortage.

CRARLOTTE, N. C., April 21.—James R. Holland, cashier of the Merchants and Farmers' National bank of this city, has been discovered short in his accounts to the amount of \$75,000. Bank Examiner Miller was the discoverer of Holland's shortage. The city is much excited over the trouble, but no run on the bank will occur, as it is considered perfectly solvent

Another Victim of the Brooklyn Riot. BROOKLYN, April 24.-The second victim of Sunday night's battle in Williams burg, when Italians used Winchester rifles and revolvers to settle a feud of long standing, died in the Eastern District hos-pital. He was Carmine Sesca, of No. 188 Union avenue, and was the leader of his PHIL. WOLL'S HOTEL faction.



FRENCH IN MADAGASCAR

Engagements in Which Hovas Were Defeated with Great Loss,

A FRENCH ATTACK ON MIADANE

The Enemy Routed, a Hundred Killed and Many Wounded-The Paris Soir Declares That Ex-Consul Waller Acted as a Spy for the Hoyas,

PARIS, April 24.—Official dispatches from Madagascar state that the Hovas have gathered large forces along the chief routes to Antanauarivo from Tamatave. Diego Suarez and Mojunga. Throughout the island posts with several hundred men stationed at each have been established. A French gunboat has ascended the Bet-aibiko river and silenced a Hova battery

The enemy were driven out with a loss of eight killed. Two cannons were captured. The population of the village gathered around the tombs of the chiefs in order to defend them, but on finding that the French respected the graves, they yielded and asked protection against the Hovas, who had another camp of 3,000 men at Miadane, on the other side of the river.

General Metzinger, with four companies of infantry and artillery, attacked Mia-dane on April 8 and routed the enemy, killing 100 and wounding many. The French loss was three wounded.

The Soir states that ex-American Con-sul John I. Waller, who was brought from Madagascar to Marsellles under arrest acted as the medium between the Hova and the English for the conveyance of or ders for munitions and arms. When France declared war against the Hova-Waller, according to The Soir, acted as a spy at Majunga, and by means of waving different colored lanterns at night advised the Hovas of the movements of the French. This once nearly resulted in 600 French troops falling into the hands of the enemy

The Union Label Not a Trade Mark. St. Louis, April 24.—The case of the state vs. Nathan Bailenzheimer, who was of counterfeiting the union label of the Cigarmakers' union, reversed the finding of the lower court, on the grounds that trade mark must be a mark or label use by a certain party to designate his goods The union label is not a trade mark. It is one of the indispensable requisites to valid trade mark that it should point ou the true origin or ownership of a vendible commonity to which it is fixed. This label does not have this quality.

Double Drowning Mystery Unraveled. CHICAGO, April 24.—The identity of th woman who drowned herself and the little by in the lake on Monday has been es tablished. She was Mrs. Mattie D. Mor rison, of Clifton, Ills., and the boy was her son. The woman was divorced from James T. Morrison, a real estate dealer, two years ago. No reason is known for the suicide, save that she in some way was disappointed because her husband had married again.

Escaped the Death Sentence.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 24.-The Turkish soldier, Mustapha, who on Jan. 30 ran amuck in the Pankaldi Karter, of this city, killing Mr. Stupe, an American, di-rector of the Metropolitan Railway of Constantinople, and two other men, and wounding ten others, has escaped the death sontence that was imposed upon him on March 11. His sentence has been commuted to fifteen years' penal servi-

Bussian Warships in Japanese Waters. St. Petersburg, April 24.—The Sviet declares that Russia has concentrated in Japanese waters twenty-two warships, carrying 360 guns and a large body of men This fleet, it is added, with the French squadron, makes a total of thirty-seven warships, carrying 610 guns. Moreover, according to The Sviet, a Russian army of 20,000 men could occupy Jesso and take Japan in flank should trouble arise

Double Murder in Florida.

OCALA, Fla., April 34.—Henry Subers, while intoxicated and eating oysters in Antonio Tafloletto's store at Marti City, objected to Italian bystanders talking in their native language. He shot and killed Pietro Volpoto and Leopoldo Ressiue, and seriously wounded Tafioletto. He fled on horseback, and took a train at a distant station and escaped. Subers keeps a sa-loon in a Texas frontier town.
