INCOME TAX REHEARING

The Merits of All the Points Involved Will be Argued,

PROVIDED THERE IS A FULL BENCH.

This Unexpected Explanation of the Court's Order Shows What It Intended to State in Its Ambiguous Announcement Made a Few Days Ago.

WASHINGTON, April 26. - When the United States supreme court on May again takes up the income tax question, it will once more go into the merits of all the points involved, and will not, as its order made on Tuesday apparently stated. confine the arguments to the question whether or not the rehearing of the cases shall be granted. This unexpected explanation of the court's order shows that what it intended to state in its ambiguous announcement was that it had granted the petition for a rehearing, and if the bench were full on the date named, would reopen the cases on May 6. The order of the court, it is stated, was drawn hastly, and it was not noticed at the time that it was ambiguous and apparently justified the conclusion that the court had decided simply to hear arguments on the question of granting a rehearing.

While it is the purpose of the suprem

court to have the whole case reargued and the merits gone into at full length in order that a final disposition of the question may speedily be reached, yet there is good reason to believed that the vagueness of its recent order was due to some doubt still remain-ing as to the condition of Justice Jackson's health, it being thought that even if he is able to come to Washington it may be found on his arrival here that the is no strong enough to sit through an argument that might be protracted through two weeks. The court therefore wished to leave itself considerable latitude as to the extent of the present hearing and freedom of action at the last moment.

The action of the court in fixing upor May 6 for the beginning of the reargu ment was something of a surprise to the officials of the department of justice While, as a matter of course, the government will be as ready on that day as is possible in the very limited time given for preparation, yet it is realized that it will be extremely difficult to do in eight days the work which rightfully calls for month's close application.

The department officials appreciate the fact that the principles involved in these cases are of vast importance, and hence will devote practically every moment ye remaining of the time to the preparation of the government's briefs and arguments

Victory for Receiver McNulta.

CINCINNATI, April 26.-Judge Taft gav another decision yesterday in the whisky trust receivership case. He grants the ap-plication of Receiver McNulta and author-izes him to make, execute and deliver in his own name as receiver, any and all bonds required by law, or under the reg-ulations of the department of internal revenue, including "running bonds," warehousing bonds, and all other bonds and also all consents that may from time time be 'required by law." In addition he authorizes McNulta to sign any paper which may be required for the manage ment of the trust's properties.

Distinguished Officials at a Dinner. Philadelphia, April 26.—A number of distinguished officials from Washington were brought over in a special train to attend the dinner to the Farmers' club given by Clement A. Griscom at his country home in Haverford last night. They in cluded Postmaster General Wilson, Secretary of War Lamont, Secretary of the Navy Herbert, ex-Ministers Robert T. Lincoin and A. Loudon Snowden and Senator J. D. Cameron. The dinner was entirely informal, one of the features of the club being a prohibition against speechmaking.

Lippert Sentenced to Seven Years. CAPE Town, April 26.—William Augus a Linnert, who was extradited from th United States after having been arrested in Cincinnati, O., on Dec. 26, 1891, charged with having committed forgeries to the amount of \$843,675 in Cape Colony during the years 1889 and 1800, has been sentenced to seven years' penal servitude.
