Our Government Will Not Mix is A Pheumatic Tells a Wonder-

We Will Form No Entangling Atliances Which May Involve Us in Complications with the Governments of Europe or Asia. Japan's Answer Nearly Ready.

WASHINGTON, April 80.-The attitude of WASHINGTON, April 30.—The attitude of the United States on the eastern war trouble has been made clear to the various powers interested. In brief, it is that the unvarying polloy of this country is not to form alliances which may involve it in complications with the countries of Europe or Asia. It is a reas-sertion of the polloy of isolation, except in so far as this country may be able to ex-ert a kindly or advisory infimene toward ert a kindly or advisory influence toward the adjustment of a trouble involving castern nations. The foregoing is now ac-cepted by diplomats here as the policy which will guide the United States in the pending European complications over the Japan-China settlement.

At one time within recent days there was a prospect that the United States might co-operate with Great Britain and Italy in endeavoring to effect a solution of the Japan China trouble and the belliger-ent protest of Russia, France and Ger-many. Such action, if it had been taken, many. Such action, if it had been taken, would not have been in the nature of as-sistance to Japan, but merely an exertion of joint influence to persuade China to ratify the peace agreement. It is said by diplomats that as Japan has already rati-fied the agreement similar action by China would make it effective. While, therefore, Bussia Errance and Communications. Russia, France and Germany were pro-testing at Tokio, the desire of the other powers was to bring to bear their influence at Pekin.

It is known positively that Italy's policy is that of a neutral, but that it favors the execution of the Japan-China agreement as already made, and to this extent its sympathies are with Japan. This will not, however, go to the extent of opposing the Duran Remark Communication. the Russo-Franco-German alliance. It is understood that Great Britain's course is along the same lines. So far as the United States is concerned there will be no co-operation as already stated, except in such kindly way as may seem for the interest of all concerned, but always short of an alliance or the possibilities of forcible complications.

LONDON, April 30.—The Associated Press learns on good authority that Japan will reply to the Bussian, German and French protests within a few days.

A Monster Sale of Wheat.

SAN FRANCISCO. April 80.-Two hun-dred thousand tons of "syndicate wheat" which has been stored for the winter in the warehouses of the late James G. Fair at Port Costa has been placed on the mar-ket. The wheat is of the crop of '99, '98 and '94. 





