



GUILTY COUPLE KILLED.

The Man in the Case a Son of Kentucky's Governor.

A WRONGED HUSBAND'S REVENGE.

He Followed His Wife and Her Paramour to an Assignment House and Riddled Them with Bullets—A Sensation in High Kentucky Society.

LOUISVILLE, May 1.—At separate undertaking establishments in this city lie the bodies of perhaps two of the most prominent people in the state of Kentucky. One that of Archie Brown, son and private secretary to Kentucky's chief executive; the other that of Mrs. Fulton Gordon, prominent because of her remarkable beauty and excellent family connections. JERSEY'S INQUISITORS.

They Resume the Investigation of the Map Scandal.

HAMILTON CASE RESUBMITTED.

The Methods of the Board of Pardons Ventilated and the Memory of Governor Leon Abbott Assailed—Heppenheimer's Big Fee for Little Work.

TRENTON, May 1.—The senate investigating committee yesterday again took up the question of the furnishing of maps with the reports of the state board of assessors. Colonel Loutrel, of the Francis Loutrel company, testified that his company furnished 4,000 maps since 1892 to the state board of assessors, and that 1,400 of these are still in their charge, subject to order. These maps were billed to the state board of assessors, but Colonel Loutrel could not say that the money paid for them came from the state.

Taking advantage of a brief delay in the proceedings Mr. Corbin summed up the evidence concerning the map transactions. Van Cleef, he said, purchased, all told, 10,000 maps, paying about \$1,000 for them. He charged the state for 41,500 maps, receiving \$1,919 for them.

John T. Van Cleef, secretary of the state board of assessors, was called and asked if he had anything to say supplemental to his statement made last week. He stated that he would not like to go on the stand now. He, with his counsel, is preparing a statement which he will submit later. Colonel Van Cleef said he knew he had done wrong, but he thought it was more negligence than anything else. He wanted to hide nothing.

The Robert Hay Hamilton scandal and the ensuing complications were forcibly recalled at the afternoon session of that committee, at which the methods of the board of pardons were ventilated. Incidentally a good deal of testimony was elicited which reflects very gravely upon the memory of the late Leon Abbott, who in his lifetime took so prominent a part in New Jersey state politics.

James H. Patterson was the first witness of importance. He is the principal keeper of the state prison, and upon being questioned by Prosecutor Corbin admitted with evident reluctance that he had been summoned to the executive chamber of Mr. Abbott, who was then governor of the state, and questioned regarding the application of Eva Ray Hamilton for a pardon from the balance of the sentence imposed upon her for causing the murder of Mayor Donnelly in Atlantic City in 1888.

Witness testified that Governor Abbott told him that Mrs. Hamilton should dismiss the lawyers she then had and employ General W. C. Heppenheimer, who afterward became state controller, but Mr. Patterson refused to suggest the change to the prisoner. Later on, the witness said, the woman instructed him to pay \$1,000 to General Heppenheimer, out of funds in the keeper's custody belonging to her. Witness followed her instructions and paid the money to General Heppenheimer.

Colonel Fuller, the Jersey City lawyer and ex-state school superintendent, who was one of Mrs. Hamilton's counsel, said he had discussed the woman's pardon with Judge's Smith, Brown and Whitaker, members of the board of pardons, who told him that they favored the woman's release, but that she would never procure it until she employed General Heppenheimer as her counsel, adding that Governor Abbott was the stumbling block. The witness said that Mrs. Hamilton did employ General Heppenheimer and was pardoned at the next meeting of the board, and that, so far as he knew, General Heppenheimer never did anything for Mrs. Hamilton to earn his fee of \$1,000, except to use his influence to procure her pardon.

General Heppenheimer next went on the witness stand and admitted receiving the \$1,000, but positively denied that anybody else got any portion of it.

Mr. Corbin also took up the question of the granting of paroles to the famous Jersey City ballot box stuffers, and showed that the assigned parole papers were made out by Governor Abbott's instructions in advance of the granting of the paroles by the board of pardons in order that there might be no delay in their execution.

Throughout the entire examination there was a manifest desire upon the part of all concerned to shield the memory of Governor Abbott, and earnest protests against that line of inquiry being carried out were entered by Senator Daly and Allen McDermott.

The committee will meet again tomorrow.

Liberal Victory in England.

LONDON, May 1.—An election was held yesterday in the east division of Leeds to fill the vacancy in the house of commons caused by the death of Mr. J. L. Gane (Liberal), who died at sea while returning to England from New Zealand. The candidates were Councillor Leuty, ex-mayor of Leeds, who stood in the Liberal interest, and Mr. J. D. Power, of Marlow, Buckinghamshire, who represented the Conservatives. Mr. Leuty was elected by a majority of 1,131. At the last election the Liberal majority was 877.

Price Pleads Not Guilty.

DENTON, Md., May 1.—Margall E. Price, the young blacksmith charged with the murder of Sallie E. Dean, the school-girl, was arraigned yesterday, his petition for a change of venue having been denied. He pleaded not guilty to the indictment, and requested trial before open court, through his counsel. The father of the murdered girl was the first witness. He repeated his testimony, as given at the coroner's inquest. Insanity, it is understood, will be the defense of Price.

Locomotive Brotherhood Not Incorporated.

CHICAGO, May 1.—Because it could not be proved that the International Grand Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers was an incorporated body, Judge Clifford yesterday took from the jury the case of William A. Burns and discharged the prisoner. Some time ago Burns was indicted for forging and counterfeiting the seal of the organization mentioned, it being alleged that by means of false dies and stamps he had obtained passes and sold them to swappers.

Wants the Evidence in Waller's Case.

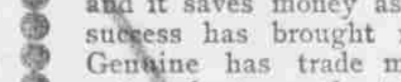
