

"Three days after, late in the evening, even Turkish soldiers came into the house where I was with my wife and child, and in spite of my protest that I was an American citizen, and that they had no right to arrest me without the information of an American official, they compelled me to go, saying the vall wanted me. They took me to prison. The next morning they put me in chains and manacles. and an iron ring around the neck, together with two murderers, in a dungeon, and then they sent me in a cart to Amasia From Amasia to Kovak they made me walk in chains with the murderers, five days' distance, making me sleep at night in dungeons in chains. My feet were so swollen I could not walk any more, and persuaded the murderers to pay for a cart till Samsoon was reached, which we could

not walk in three days.
"Neither I nor my friends could send telegrams. The messages would be acepted, but not sent. But a person was sent to Sivas and information given to Consul Jewett, and yet nothing was done either by him or the consul at Samsoon for two weeks. They brought me out oc-casionally to ask me if I still persisted in remaining an American citizen, and when I said I did, they took me back to jail. At the end of two weeks I was sent as a prisoner to Constantinople in a Turkish steamer, and upon arrival put into prison.

"The next day Minister Terrell was in formed, and I was released and sent to him. He heard of all I had suffered. It was some days after my arrival that a letter came from Consul Jewett, and both he and the consul at Samsoon have confirmed the outrage and injury inflicted upon me

by order of the vali.
"I had my wife and child come to Samsoon, and as no man was allowed to come with her I had to take the steamer for find that she had no money whatever, all the money that I had (about \$350 in all) and my watch having been stolen by the Turkish soldiers, who remained behind and ransacked my house on the night they arrested me. We sold some of my wife's gold coin ornaments, and with much suffering reached Constantinople. I sent an appeal by registered letter from Constanople Dec. 12 last to the president of the United States, beggging him that tele-graphic instruction be sent to Minister Terrell to secure justice for me. No an-

"There had not been even a word against me from any Turkish official, and even the chief of police at Constantinople ex-pressed great astonishment that I should have been arrested and put in chains They took my affidavits and said they would be sent to our government and that if I managed to reach the United States the matter would be settled from there.

"With much suffering we managed to borrow money and reached Marse les and there we lived in privations till, by working at my trade all I could, I carried money for passage to the United states. 

An Ante-Mortom Statement of the Dead Man Presented.

CHARGES OF POISONING RENEWED.

If a Statement Written by a Dying Man Is to be Credited, He Believed He Was Reing "Doted" by His Wife and Her. Present Emband.

NEW YORK, May 13-The dying declaration of Edward Isving Darling, the musical composer, was filled with other documents in the district attorney's office in the case in which Mrs. Flora Adams Darling, mother of Edward Irving Darling, accuses Dr. Spranger of having pois-oned her son. Soon after the death of Darling, Dr. Spranger married his widow. They are now in California.

The affidavit made by Edward Irving Darling was written partly by himself in the presence of witnesses a few hours be-fore his death. In the statement he tells how in December, 1890, he met with an accident when attempting to save property for a firm he was with in Detroit. He rerecovered rapidly and returned to business on March 1, 1891. Dr. Oleetz was the surgeon and Dr. Spranger the physician who attended him. He declared that the intimacy between Dr. Spranger and Mrs. Darling, his wife, began during his ill-ness. Concerning this intimacy the letter alloged:

Where she had been amiable, agreeable and cheerful, she was now petulant, vindictive and arbitrary. I seemed to be the object of her antipathy. The statement then recounts his gradual decline in health when with his wife and Dr. Spranger, substantially as given in the statement of his mother, published

Darling said that he fought against sickness and tried to keep up, but it was impossible. His wife, he said, spent much of her time gossiping at Dr. Spranger's of-fice or with his friends. Darling stated that he became worse and Dr. Spranger came to him with a drug which he (Dr. Spranger) said he had received from Paris. A hypodermic injection of this drug drove him crazy. He said that he talked for

nineteen hours without ceasing. The statement continues with the asser tion that Darling found his wife had a private letter box. He also discovered that his wife and Dr. Spranger were circulat-ing a report that he was drinking himself to death. It dawned on him that he was not being properly treated and refused to take any more medicine. He began to recover after that. In November he left for New York.

Concluding the statement declared: "In November I was improved, but if any man ever suffered the terments of the damned, was crushed, hurs, humiliated and crucified, I was at that time by Mrs. Darling. She decided to close the house. My mother went to Mount Clemens. left for New York. She with the children were to go to Washington. She did not go. As soon as I left, Dec. 8, she filed a bill for alsolute divorce for 'drunkenness, non-support, cruelty and desertion,' which she expected to obtain with money through default-a suppressed case.

"On Jan. 26 she joined me in New York, came to my rooms of her own volition and lived with me as a devoted wife until March 1. I had improved in health, gained twenty-five pounds, and was at work on 'Viking.' The day she left I was taken seriously III, and have falled slowly but surely. I am dying without hope or burry.'

John Quincy Adams, the brother of Mrs. Floria Adams Darling of this city, said that the declaration of Darling had been placed in the hands of Assistant District Attorney Battle. He also said that under the direction of the district attorney's office inalyses were being made of the medicine taken from phials used in administering drugs to Darling. The result of these an alvsis will be submitted to the district attorney.
