

PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATURE.

The Session May Be Extended to the First Week in June.

HARRISBURG, May 12.—The legislature is getting ready to adjourn. Bills are being rushed through both bodies with unprecedented haste. Speaker Walcott wants to get away the latter part of next week. He insists that the calendars can be cleared by that time if the house will keep right at work. Mr. Walton's belief is not shared by his older and more experienced colleagues. They say it is absolutely impossible to adjourn finally before the first week of June. If it should be decided to quit business at that time many of the bills on the calendar will have to be dropped.

There is much to do from now until the close of the session. The appropriation and appropriation bills have not yet been considered. At this evening's session of the house a calendar of forty-eight appropriation bills will be read for the first time. The senate appropriation committee has not yet reported out any bills. The house committee still has upwards of 150 on hand, which will be held back until those now on the calendar are well advanced.

The revenue bill framed by the state tax conference will be considered on third reading tomorrow in the house. On Wednesday the bill creating the county of Quay will be called up in the house for final passage. Its friends are confident that they have enough votes to put it through this stage. On Tuesday evening the opponent of the Porter school bill will be given a hearing by the house municipal corporations committee.

Governor Hastings is disposing of the bills as fast as they reach him. He is very few under consideration. Among them is the Farr compulsory education bill, which will probably be signed tomorrow, along with the other bills not yet acted upon. On Wednesday a meeting of the board of pardons will be held for the consideration of a number of cases which have been pending for several months.

Andrews' Execution Day Fixed. BELVIDERE, N. J., May 13.—Governor Verts sent his private secretary here with the warrant for the execution of George Andrews, the wife murderer. The day fixed for the execution is Thursday, June 13, between the hours of 10 and 3. Andrews when informed of the matter did not have anything to say, apparently treating it with indifference. His counsel, George M. Shipman, will now go to the court of pardons and endeavor to have the sentence changed to imprisonment for life, and a petition to that effect is being circulated for signers.

The Froshitten West. CHICAGO, May 13.—The frost is unusually extensive and severe for this time of the year, frost having occurred yesterday in all the fifteen states for which it was forecast Saturday. In the peach belt of Michigan and the cranberry marshes of Wisconsin temperature below freezing occurred, and the frost was of a killing nature. Frost of more or less severity occurred throughout the states of the upper lake region, and the upper Mississippi valley, on the east slope of the Rocky mountains, and in Montana, Wyoming and Colorado.

Found a Dead Baby in a Store Box. HAZLETON, Pa., May 13.—While at work in the Catholic cemetery at Beaver Meadow, Thomas McGrath and Martin Mulligan came unexpectedly across a small store box containing the body of a male child about 5 months old. An effort had been made to conceal the box in the underbrush. Last Tuesday evening a carriage was seen to stop before the graveyard, and a woman alighted carrying a bundle. As this was not a very unusual proceeding, no particular attention was paid to it at the time.

Dr. Duestrow Declared Sane. ST. LOUIS, May 13.—The jury in the case of Dr. Arthur Duestrow, wife and child murderer, returned a verdict declaring him sane. He has been on trial at Union, Mo., to determine his sanity, his attorneys alleging that he was a paranoiac. He will be placed on trial. Dr. Duestrow is a millionaire citizen of St. Louis, and was charged with the brutal murder of his wife and 4-year-old son. The jury at the first trial disagreed, and this second trial the defense set up was insanity.

[From the Lowell Morning Citizen.] At Atlantic, Iowa, on May 7, C. M. Instantly Killed by Lightning. WILKESBARRE, Pa., May 13.—A severe thunder storm passed over this valley Saturday night and was followed by a heavy rain, doing considerable damage to the crops. About 8 o'clock Abraham Van Scoy, of Dallas, a prominent farmer, while going from his house to his barn, was struck by lightning and instantly killed.

Death of Ex-Governor Chase. LUSK, Me., May 13.—Ex-Governor Ira J. Chase, of Indiana, died in this city late Saturday evening of erysipelas. Mr. Chase left his home in Irvington about two months ago to conduct evangelistic services, and a few days ago was taken very sick, and it was not thought that he could survive very long.

Crossed the Channel on a Bicycle Boat. PARIS, May 13.—An American named John C. Buck arrived at Calais last evening, having crossed the British channel in a bicycle boat twenty-four feet long. He started from Woolwich on May 6.

NUGGETS OF NEWS. Palmer Carter, 19 years old, accidentally shot and killed his 13-year-old brother Herbert, at Plainfield, Ill.

Julius Lichtenberg, ex-school inspector, was convicted at Detroit of accepting a bribe, and will be sentenced tomorrow.

An explosion of gas in a lodging house in Chicago resulted in the death of three persons and serious injuries to ten others.

Louisiana farmers are charged with invading Ouachita county and other border counties of Arkansas and kidnapping negroes for farm labor.

At Connorsville, Ky., Leo Glatis, 18 years old, attempted to criminally assault the wife of Harrison Nutter, a negro preacher. Falling in this he stabbed her twelve times with a dirk, but she may recover. Glatis was arrested. Military are ready to prevent a threatened lynching.
