## MEADES RETIREMENT.

Secretary Herbert Explains How It Was Brought About.

THE ADMIRAL ACTED HASTILY.

His Desire to be Ordered to New York Had Been Granted When His Request to be Detached from the Squadron Beached the Navy Department.

WASHINGTON, May 15. - Secretary Herbert, in response to inquiries, dictated the following official statement concerning

Admiral Meade: At the navy department it was learned

yesterday that the department had addressed a letter to Admiral Meade, stating that it desired to know if he was willing to answer whether be had or had not authorized what purported to be an interview with him published in the New York Tribune (which reflects seriously on the administra

tion), and that he ADMIKAL MEADE had replied ac-

schining to answer the questions.

The facts in relation to the failure of the department to grant Admiral Mende's equest to have the Cincinnati ordered to the New York yard instead of to the Nor-olk yard are that this vessel was ordered by the department to go to the Norfoli may yard for some necessary repairs. This was done upon the recommendation of the shief constructor, who desired that work which is now scarce at both yards, might be equalized between the Norfolk and

Admiral Meade, who had selected the Incinnati for his flagship during the abence of the New York, was thereupon ordered to hoist his flag oon that vessel ipon ber arrival from Norfolk, in the in-erim hoisting his flag on the Minneapolis He afterwards forwarded a second request to the department to have the Cincinnat dered to New York, instead of to Nor folk. On the day when the latter request was received Secretary Herbert was not in the department at any time. Assistani Secretary McAdoo being in charge, did not act upon the request, as he did not think it proper to take any action in the matter until the secretary's return.

On the next morning, when Secretary Herbert came to the office, this matter having been brought to his attention, he at once summoned before him the chief constructor, and, after conferring with him and Assistant Secretary McAdoo olntly, decided to order the Cincinnative New York, and at once ordered Admiral lamsay, who was present, to make out rders to intercept the ship at Hampton Roads and order her to New York. also directed orders to be made out to Ad-miral Meade notifying him of this change. and orders both to the admiral and to the ship were written and ready to be signed when a letter came in the noon mail from Admiral Meade, asking to be detached from the squadron, which request the ceretary granted.

This constitutes all the information that could be obtained and leaves the inference that the action, if any, to be taken against Admiral Meade is not yet determined



# EVANS DENUNCIATION.

South Carolina's Governor and the Federal Court.

ORITICIZING THE PEDERAL JUDGES,

The Governor Deciares , hat the Issue Is Now Between the Whites and Blacks of the State, and Must be Fought Out on That Line.

COLUMNIA. S. C., May 15. — Governor Evans has issued a lengthy address to the citizens of South Carolina, in which he deals very harshly with the recent decisions in the dispensary and registration cases. He refers to the political history of his state since the war, and argues for the right of the state "to manage and di-rect its internal affairs without national interference." The address continues:
"The people of South Carolina have al-

ways been law abiding, and respect the constitution and courts of the United States, but when the judges of those courts want not only to invade and trample un der foot the recognized rights of our peo-ple guaranteed by the federal constitution have a right to assert themselves and maintain their sovereignty and indepen-dence. This they have ever done and will continue to do, and will resist with all the means within their power the usurpation and tyranny of partisan politicians in his

places, who disgrace the judicial ermine.
"We cannot, nor have we the desire, resort to arms to resist his unjust decre but we can and will exert the united of forts of a liberty loving people to thiwar the conspirators who are plotting to over throw our civilization. In this strugg's we confidency rely on the sympathy an moral support of all lovers of good gov ernment and state's rights throughor

"It is unfortunate that the passions an projudice excited by the war in regard to the neuro should influence the opinion and feelings of judges indealing with this vital principle, but, it will follow inevit ably that this principle is once destroye this country will be convulsed with a rove lution for the restoration of the liberties of white men, that will forecipse that other fatal struggle for the emancipation of the blacks.

"By an appeal to one of the bitteres enemies of southern civilization, a pol-itician who disgraces the judicial ermine of the United States court and masquer ading as a judge, they have succeeded in having the registration laws declared un constitutional, null and void. The chic argument made before him was the de famation of our state and insult. If insult could come from such a source, to your state officers. Under this decree the door have been thrown open and the ballet again placed in the hands of every man, man, white or black, of the age of 21 years. The abuse and slander heaped upon the state by the cousel for the plaintiff waonly surpassed by that of the judge in his comment styled a decree in equity.

Governor Evans concludes with an as sertion that the issue is now between the blacks and the whites, and urges citizen to see to it that "white men, not white men with black hearts, nor negroes," shall control the constitutional conven

"I will not call the legislature together, he says. "They could do nothing. An ap-peal will be taken to the supreme court of the United States, but under the red tape and technicalities surrounding a decision cannot be had in time to affect the election of delegates. It must be a free, open fight. I appeal to the sovereign people of South Carolina to protect their home and liberties. The government of the peo-ple must and shall be perpetuated, and we are ready to lead the fight under the white man's flag."
