ALL THE FAVORITES DEPEATED.

Hornpipe, on Which Horse Very Lit le Money Had Been Placed, Captures the Ten Thousand Dollar Purse in 2.11 1-4. with a 30 to 1 Chance Second.

NEW YORK, May 18,-The first real trial of the new racing law was had resterday at Gravesend, and as far as could be seen It is likely to become popular. The event of the day was the Brooklyn handleap for a \$10,000 purse. The morning hours were anything but pleasant, for a cold wind blew across the track, the air was raw and chilly, and the overcast sky made it seem as if rain would fall as any minute. The track was very muddy and there were pools of water all over it. The clouds began to break away at about 10 o'el-ek and there was pienty of blue sky and sunlight by noon. The bookmakers had plenty of work to do, but they did not shout the olds, and the betting was done quietly. From 1 o'clock until the start of the handl cap betting was in order, and Dr. Rice and Ramapo were about equal choices, al-though it finally settled down with the the latter as first choice.
At 4:30 the horses came to the post

They were Hornpipe, Lazzarone, Sir Walter, Counter Tenor, Rey El Santa Anita, Declare, Dr. Rica, Rubicon, Assignee, Bassetlaw, Ramapo and Ed Kearney. Appreciating the necessity of an even start, Starter Rowe detained the horses at the post until 4:51, when, catching them well in order and in action, down went the flag and the race was on. Hamilton, on Hornpipe, was first to dart out of the Then came Griffin with Ramapo, and Littlefield on Bassetlaw, the others elng close up.

Suddenly whips went up in the air and came down on the sides of the horses, spurs were jabbed with cruel fierceness and off dashed Assignee, intent on making the running for his stable companion. Hornpipe, who fell back in the bunch. At the quarter Assignee was half a length better than Ed Kearney, who had Ram-ano at his hind quarters, Dr. Rice and Sir Walter being close up. Assignee led to the half mile post, where his wind gave out, and he relinquished first place to Sir Walter, seeing which Hamilton, on Hornpipe, again cut loose. Sir Walter was a great horse at this stage of the race. Closely attended by Dr. Rice, Rey El Santa Anita, Ramapo and Hornpipe, the game little Sir Walter made the pace until well down the home stretch. Then the heavy weights and equally heavy track began to tell a tale of distress for the fav-orites, and the lightweighted youngsters oegan to overpower them.

They were all at the whip, and the thoroughly excited throng of men and women yelled frantically at their respective choices to come on and land the great race. But it was not to be a favorite's triumph. A furlong from the finish Hamilton was seen oming with Hornpipe like a whiriwind. On and on he came, speeding by the jaded brutes in front of him like a locomotive running wild. Hornpine's rush was something that literally clove the tongues of the shouters to their mouths. The governor is satisfied that the oper ators forced the West Virginia miners to strike to secure a reduction of freight charges. The operators at Pocahontas charges. however, he says, have stood by their agreement, and the men are entirely satisfled with their treatment. Many miners the governor says, would return to work but for fears growing out of the fact that the West Virginia miners, who are backet by their operators, are threatening then with violence if they work, and it is to protect these men that the governor is keeping troops at Pocahoutas.

As a result of the strike, industries all along the Norfolk and Western lines are shut down, and thousands of people are thus thrown out of employment. governor intended to relieve from duty the Roanoke machine works' guards, company composed of workingmen from those shops, but has left them on duty on petition of the men themselves, who stated that they preferred to remain as soldier to going home to be idle,

The situation, he added, is improving There were 300 men at work in the mines of the Southwest company on Tuesday. Sixty more went on Tuesday night, 200 more yesterday, and 400 more today. company is taking back its old men upon application, except in the case of a few obstreperous leaders.

No Disorder at Pocahontas.

POCAHONTAS, Va., May 16.—Two hundred Italian miners reached here to go to work for the Southwest Coal company. The mines are all busy. The officers re-port everything quiet, and many of the old men have returned to work. The West Virginia lines are closely watched, and the strictest guard kept upon all going to the Elkhorn mines. The bringing in of these miners increases the bitter feeling and it is not known what action the strik ers will take. Meetings are being held throughout the Elkhorn section today.

Suspected Senators Exonerated.

ALBANY, May 16,—The report of the sen-ate committee appointed to investigate allegations of bribery in connection with the New York city firemen's salary bill was submitted to the senate today. It finds that the allegations were based from the ldle gossip of members of the fire department.
