GIANTS AT DEBATE.

Professor Laughlin and William H Harvey Meat on the Rostrum.

DIVERGENT VIEWS OF FINANCE

Both Sides of the Muney Question Pre sented at Chicago by Men Who Are Acknowledged as Leaders Among Monometallists and Bimetallists.

CHICAGO, May 17.—A stirring political encounter took place last night, hardly paralleled in the west since the famous struggle between Lincoln and Douglas just on the eve of the civil war. The com batants were two giants of the opposing eldes in the raging financial controversy-J. Lawrence Laughlin, professor of po-litical economy in the University of Chi-cago, the favorite authority of President Cleveland, and William H. Harvey, author of "Coins Financial School.

The spacious rooms of the Illinois clut on stately Ashland boulevard were crowded to sufficiation when the president, Dr. Homer M. Thomas, read the proposi-

tion to be discussed as follows:

"Resolved, that the United States should at once enter upon the free coinage of silver at the ratio 16 to 1, independently of the action of any other nation.

For the affirmative Mr. Harvey said in part: "The first reason why I am in favor of independent action by this country is that we should not be subjected by the influences of the governments of Europe. If people can be reduced to poverty, and the prosperity of the United States can be rained by hanging to the financial policy of Europe, then we can be reduced to the same condition by financial legislation as a war of conquest would re

"Our friends, the monometallists, mostly say, 'We admit bimetallism would be good if we could get international bimetallism.' In other words they agree that there is something radically wrong, but claim that we are tied to the financial policy of Europe. Where there is a necessity there is a remedy. The governments of Europe are plutocracies. They squeeze the lemon for the people about every so often. The few control class legislation and the masses are hewers of wood and drawers of water for the titled few. Now, if finan-cial legislation is one of the classes of class legislation by which the many are robbed and the few are enriched, then it is one of the institutions of the European governments that we, as a nation of peo-ple, republican in form, should declare our independence.

"This nation can have an independent financial system without any reference whatever to the balance of the world, and can carry on atsown commerce with other governments of the world notwithstand-ing. Primarily, balances of trade are set-tled with trade. We give them our wheat and we take their silks, and the balance that we may owe them or they owe us will be settled just as the merchant between the importing points may agree to

settle it. There is no such thing as an in-ternational money.
"What we want is bimetallism, and scientific bimetallism is this: Free and unfimited coinage of both gold and silver; these two metals to constitute the primary or redemption money of the government The money coined from both metals to be legal tender in the payment of all debts. The operation as to which of the two moneys is to be paid in the liquidation of

a debt to rest with the debtor.
"We would again make the standard silver dollar the unit of value, as it was before 1873. We would make gold coins of the value of so many silver units or dollars, as the law existed prior to 1873.

Silver is the people's money.

"We would allow no private individual to dictate to the government what its le gal tender money should be. There was to be no two yardsticks. The rich man's money-gold-was recoined when the commercial ratio changed to interfere

"The bank of Rothschilds in England is now behind the United States treasury. They are our financial agents; our financial managers. We are paying them the princely salary of \$8,000,000 for each six months of their valuable services. We are in the hands of the pawnbrokers of Europe. Put silver in competition with gold as quick as possible. The extra demand for silver will raise its value. Everything will advance in value at

Professor Laughlin, replying for the

negative, said:

"There is no more essential need of an inreased amount of measure with which to ompare goods than there is or should be a number of yardsticks equal to the num-

er of yards of cloth in a store.
"The idea of supposing that much money s required in order to have something with which to measure goods is as absurd as to suppose that a community mus have hearers in number equal to the population. What is important is that the goods when expressed in terms of a com-mon demoninator of value are today exchanged to enormous quantities, mainly without the use of any money. necessity of an increasing quantity money is growing less important with the development of this system of exchanges From 12 per cent, to 35 per cent, of trans-actions are performed by this machinery without the use of money, and recent in vestigations by the comptroller of the cur rency show that 5k per cent of retail transactions are similarly performed with-

out the use of money. "We express the value of goods in terms of money, but then we really exchange them almost entirely by means of the deposit currency." posit currency. Transactions expressed in terms of money are based not upon coin but upon the goods bought and sold. Coin only is a means of going from one set of goods to another. Prices since 1878 have not fallen because of the lack of money silver has fallen about 50 per cent, as com pared with a very modest fall in the price of commodities. Silver does not have the Hence, free coinage cannot be urged as a just means of paying debt.

"Since we undertook the purchase of silver, in 1878, it has fallen about one half in value, although we have purchased about \$6.0,000,000. It is perfectly evident that there is no use in the United States acting alone to bulster up the price when we have failed even in concert with the Latin

"As free cotnage of silver would inevit ably result in a fail of wages, its first ef-fect would be to diminish the purchasing power of all wages. The man who gets solo or \$100,000 a year as a fixed rate of wages or salary will find he can buy just half as much as now. Are we willing to sacrifice the interests of the laboring classes to the demands of certain owners

"No trick or sophistry can make the scaling of debt to mean anything but dis honesty and cheating. Were free columns of silver to be passed it would mean that every depositor in a savings bank, every investor in a loan association, every holder of a life insurance policy, every recipient of a pension would have their dues reduced one-half. Is it possible that there is something behind this free coinage

scheme not really discovered?
"Extraordinary as is the proposal for free coinage, it is in truth only a huge disease It was born in the private offices of the silver kings, nursed at the hands of the speculators, clothed in economic error, fed on boodle, and as sure as there is honesty and truth in the American heart it will die young and be buried in the same ignominious grave wherein lies the now forgotten infant once famous as the rag



BUILDINGS COLLAPSE.

Fatal Fall of a Tenement House Near Providence.

THREE KILLED TWO FATALLY HURT

Nine Others Receive Injuries More or Less Serious - One Killed and Two Fatally Hart While Removing the Wall of Burned Building In Chicago.

PROVIDENCE, May 18 .- A two and a half story wooden tenement house, owned by Joseph Le Moine and occupied by him and several other French families, in that part of the town of Coventry known as "Jeritho," seven miles from this city, collapsed late yesterday afternoon and three persons were killed and eleven injured. It is thought that two of the latter are fatally hurt. The building had been raised to permit the building of another story be

The killed are M-3. Mabel Guertin, 5-years old. occupant of house; Asa Ald rich, 55 years old, workman employed in raising house; 214 year-old child of Louis

LeMoine, occupant of house.

The injured are: Mrs. LeMoine, aged 70 years, crushed, bruised and injured, probably fatally; Noah Richards, workman, scalp wounds, side crushed, proba bly fatal internal injuries; Mrs. Louis LeMoine, 35, injured about head; Fred Balliere, 10, scalp wounds, unconscious Frank LeMoine, 18, leg fractured: Josep LeMoine, 85, serious contusions, selin, 10, scalp wounds, shoulder crushed Two small children named Gauniere wer also seriously injuried. Two others sus-tained slight injuries, but were able to care for themselves.

The building was about fifty feet long

with a frontage of twenty feet. The lower portion was formerly a store and the owner recently decided to raise it thirty feet and fit up the lower stories for tene ments, and about three weeks ago Con tractor Poole, of Apponaug, began the work, and the structure was raised to the required height. The two families in the upper stories did not move out, as they were told the building was perfectly safe

While the men were working at the underpinning the building, without warning, slid off the piles on which it rested and pitched endwise into the street, striking the ground with a terrific crash as it was split and smashed into a mass of kindling wood. From the ruins rose the cries of the injured and dying, and the passersby and others at once began the work of rescue. In the excitement the Centreville fire department was summoned, and they rendered valuable assistance in tearing away the debris. An alarm was rung up on the mill bells and soon thousands had gathered at the scene.

Meanwhile the rescuers were tearing apart the mass of splintered beams and boards and soon came upon the body of a woman lying in the street under the second floor. It was err s red into a condition almost past recognition, but from the clothing it was identified as that of Mrs. Guertin, a widow who lived on the second floor. A short distance away the body of a child was found. The neck was broken and the lower parts were badly mangled. Haif an hour later the body of Asa Aldrich, of Arctic Centre, was found. His mek was broken and his head crushed into pulp. Aldrich was in the act of mov-ing a heavy jack under the building when

ing a dealy just an arrange when it started on its downward plunge.

Mrs. Joseph Le Mofne, wife of the owner of the building, and Noah Richards, a workman, were taken from the ruins so badly injured that they will probably die. half a dozen others, including children, who had been playing near by, were also injured. Joseph Le Moine, a man 85 years escaped with severe braises and a bad shaking up.

Another Falling Building Fatality. CHICAGO, May 18. - Three men were buried under a brick wall which collapsed at the Globe Moulding works. Sangamon street and Fourteenth place. One of the men, William Nangle, was so badly in-jured that he died within a few minutes after being taken to the hospital. Of the other two, James Carbine received a fractured skull and will probably die, and Thomas Burns, who was badly battered up about the body, will recover. The building had been burned a short time ago and the injured men, with eight others, were engaged in tearing down the walls. A high wind which was blowing toppled part of the wall over and the three men were caught.

Town Destroyed, Thirty Burned to Death St. PETERSBURG, May 18.-The town of Brest-Litewski, in the province of Grodno Russian Poland, was completely destroyed by fire last evening, and thirty persons were burned to death. Brest-Litewski was a town of about 40,000 inhabitants.

Anarchy Prevailing in Formosa. London, May 18 - The Times prints a uispatch from Kong Kong which says that anarchy provails in the northern part of the Island of Formesa, and riots are of daily occurrence, numerous persons hav-ing been killed and wounded. General Ku Hong Kuk, a Hatta chief, has proclaimed himself king of the northern por tion of the island, and several thousa well equipped soldiers have joined his standard, and his force increases daily The Chinese authorities have captured and beheaded many of his followers, but the revolt seems to be spreading. China advocates the recognition by the powers of a Formosan republic.

Buchanan before the court for resentence has created quite a stir bore. Never in the recollection of any person attached to the court has this body been known to pronounce the death sentence, and it is be-lieved that they will refuse to take any action except that of ordering the lower court in New York to resentence,
