If there is a disease breeding spot within the borough limits this is one and the authorities should not fail to deal with it vigorously and promptly.

Convention of the Organization Held Behind Closed Doors.

URGING MILITARY AFFILIATION.

"The Time Has Arrived When Irishmen Must Unite and Prepare for an Armed Struggle for the Independence of Their Country."

was held yesterday in this city. The convention assembled at 1 o'clock and remained in session until 6 o'clock. About It promotes digestion, enriches the 300 delegates were present from various sections of the country. The meeting was called for the purpose of adopting measures for the affiliation of all Irish-American military organizations with the union in view of probable exigencies in connection with the question of Ireland's independence and also to consider the advisability of having an encampment next year for the assembling of Irish-American troops from the different states.

The convention was called to order by the commander-in-chief, General William F. Kelly, after which the creden tials of the delegates were examined. Among the national and staff officers present were General Henry Walsh of Washington, Adjutant General P. J. Keating of Newark, N. J., Paymaster General Patrick O'Brien of Philadelphia, Quartermaster General Martin Joyce of Scranton, Inspector General James B. Murphy of Philadelphia, Chief Assistant Adjutant General George Couway, Judge Advocate General Thomas H. Ronavne. O'Rellly Surgeon General Thomas B. Commissary General Hugh Rodgers of Philadelphia, Chief Signal Officer Louis A. Busche of Philadelphia, Chief of Cavalry Colonel James H. Murphy, Chief Ordnance Officer Colonel John Hanks of Wilkesbarre, Chief of Artillery T. M.

Dullard. The following resolutions were pre-sented and adopted:

Whereas, The time has arrived when Irishmen must unite and prepare for a grand armed struggle for the independ-

ence of their country,
"Resolved, That we, delegates of the Irish-American union, in convention assembled, hereby invite all Irish-American military organizations in the United States to affiliate with this union to the end that have one purpose in view, that we may be in a position to take concerted action at all times, and may establish such a brotherhood of affection as will, in its strength, be capable of effective work towards securing Ireland independence. That we furthermore invite such organizations to appear with us in camp at Bridgeport, Conn., in the summer of 1896, when there will be opportunity for mili-

tary evolutions on a grand scale."

It was also agreed that French, Polish and Hungarian military bodies in sympa-thy with the Irish movement be permitted to join the union. The Philadel-phia signal corps, commanded by Colonel Busche, and the Lafayette Guards of Brooklyn, Captain L. Grass, have signified their desire for affiliation. Resolutions were adopted tendering the gallant pa-triots of Cuba their heartlest wishes for triumph of their cause. A resolution ex-pressing regret at the retirement from the office of quartermaster general of colonel Henry Boylan, of Philadelphia, and tendering him thanks for his earnest labors for many years to promote the interests of the union was also adopted

The convention, which was held behind closed doors, then adjourned after five hours' deliberation.
