IRISH-AMERICAN UNION.

Convention of the Organization Held Behind Closed Doors. URGING MILITARY AFFILIATION.

The Time Has Arrived When Irishmen Must Unite and Prepare for an Armed Struggle for the Independence of Their Country.

NEW YORK, June 17.—A special convention of the Irish-American military union was held yesterday in this city. The convention assembled at 10 o'clock and remained in session until 6 o'clock. About 800 delegates were present from various sections of the country. The meeting was called for the purpose of adopting measures for the affiliation of all Irish-American military organizations with the union in view of probable exigencies in connection with the question of Ireland's independence and also to consider the advisability of having an encampment next year for the assembling of Irish-American troops from the different states.

The following resolutions were presented and adopted: "Whereas, the time has arrived when Irishmen must unite and prepare for a grand armed struggle for the independence of their country." "Resolved, That we, delegates of the Irish-American union, in convention assembled, hereby invite all Irish-American military organizations in the United States to affiliate with this union to the end that have one purpose in view, that we may be in a position to take concerted action at all times, and may establish such a brotherhood of affection as will, in its strength, be capable of effective work towards securing Ireland's independence."

22,000,000 Already Raised for the Cause.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 17.—The Irish-American club, composed of 300 of the most influential Irishmen in the city, approve of the movement which is secretly under way throughout the United States looking to the emancipation of Ireland by a resort to arms.

Wild Car Carried Death.

ELKINS, W. Va., June 17.—An accident occurred on the Dry Fork railroad, built from Hendricks to Womelsdorf, in which four men were killed. A party of railroad workmen wishing to ride to their homes boarded a freight car, loaded with lumber, and started it down the grade to the Dry Fork crossing.

Fatal Riot at an Entertainment.

NASHVILLE, June 17.—At Tally Station, in Marshall county, while a school entertainment was in progress a terrible fight occurred, resulting in the death of one man and the serious cutting and beating of several others.

Silverites in Danger.

LOUISVILLE, June 17.—The Democrats of Kentucky held a series of precinct mass meetings Saturday, and those delegates to the county conventions to be held this afternoon. Many delegates are untrusting.

Drummer Charged with Embezzlement.

NASHVILLE, June 17.—Mortimer Bartlett, a drummer from Philadelphia, is under arrest in this city, charged with embezzlement. What the amount is is not known.

A MURDER UNEARTHED.

While the funeral is in progress the Real Cause of Death is Discovered. WILKESBARRE, Pa., June 17.—Anthony Gimite, aged 30 years, has been arrested for the murder of Andrew Yocksta. Yocksta kept a boarding house, where Gimite lived, and it is said the latter had tried to persuade Mrs. Annie Yocksta, the wife of Andrew, to elope with him. The men worked in adjoining chambers in the Blackman mine, and last Friday Gimite appeared at the foot of a shaft and cried out that Yocksta had been killed by a fall of coal. The body was found and was to have been buried yesterday, but suspicion had been aroused, and an examination revealed three bullet wounds.

A number of persons had gathered at the house and one of them who had helped to prepare the body for burial remarked that it was not badly bruised, considering the quantity of coal and rock that had fallen on it. A physician present overheard the remark and decided to investigate the matter. The room was cleared of mourners and the body lifted from the coffin and examined. Three bullet holes were found, one in the forehead and two in the breast. The funeral was postponed and Anthony Gimite was arrested for the crime.

Gimite was the only man in the mine at the time Yocksta was reported to have been killed. It is believed that he murdered the man in the chamber and then barred round a lot of coal on the body to make the death appear accidental.

THE HARLEM SHIP CANAL.

The New Waterway Will be Formally Opened Today. NEW YORK, June 17.—Today with the booming of cannon, bursting of rockets and the cheering of thousands the Harlem ship canal, which is to unite the water of the Hudson with Long Island sound, will be formally opened to traffic. At the celebration Governor Morton and staff, Governor Werts of New Jersey and staff, and the mayors of New York, Brooklyn, Jersey City, Yonkers, Mount Vernon and other cities will take part, and with the mammoth marine parade and the picturesque procession on land the opening of the new waterway will be fittingly observed.

The federal government will be represented by a number of warships. The Atlanta will be stationed at the eastern end of the canal, and the Cincinnati at the western or southern end. At the beginning and at the ending of the ceremonies the two warships will boom forth salutes. As the first salute is fired two barrels of fresh water, one from Lake Champlain and the other from Lake Superior, will be emptied into the salt water of the canal to typify the union with the great lake system.

Fourteen Killed in a Death Chamber.

VIENNA, June 15.—Seventy people gathered yesterday in the death chamber of a young man at Rovigno, a seaport town of Austria, on the west coast of Austria, in the vicinity of the Adriatic sea. The flooring of the chamber collapsed, and all fell to the ground floor and thence into a deep cellar, the walls of the house falling on top of the unfortunate victims. All the inhabitants of the town hurried to the spot, the fire brigade was called out and the soldiers in the town also rushed to the scene. All united in efforts to remove the debris. This being done revealed the fact that fourteen of the mourners had been killed and thirty injured. The unhappy young woman who had been the fiancée of the deceased man was found dead in the ruins close to the coffin.

Serious Runaway Accident.

VINELAND, N. J., June 17.—Four persons were injured in a runaway accident here last evening. One of the injured may die. The animal took fright on Main avenue and plunged down a steep embankment near the bridge. The carriage contained George Berry, his wife, Mrs. Hines, mother of Mrs. Berry, and a nephew of Mrs. Berry. All are residents of Millville.

Boat Capsized, Two Drowned.

NORFOLK, Va., June 17.—A Sunday frolic cost two citizens of Norfolk their lives. Shortly before daylight Dennis O'Brien, Harry Smith, James Dunlavy, John Mossina and Harry Story started down the river in a small sailboat on a fishing trip. Their boat was capsized and the men thrown into the water. O'Brien and Story were caught beneath the boat and drowned.

Three Lives Snuffed Out.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., June 17.—In the Alden tunnel Thomas Bryan, a miner, and John Rinka, a laborer, were buried by a fall of rock. Several hours' time were required to remove the rock, and then the bodies were found horribly mangled. John Zapka, a Hungarian miner, was crushed into a shapeless mass by the fall of a sulphur bed in No. 6 slope, Glen Lyon.

Well Known Lawyer and Jurist Dead.

NEW ORLEANS, June 17.—Judge Felix P. Poche, well known as a lawyer and jurist, died yesterday, aged 69 years. Judge Poche was one of the founders of the American Bar Association. In 1890 he was appointed associate justice of the supreme court of Louisiana, and served a full term of ten years.

The Decrease in Immigration.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—A report from the bureau of statistics shows that the number of immigrants who arrived during May was 49,141, an increase over May, 1894, of about 16,000. During the eleven months ending with May there was a falling off of about 45,000.
