Defaulter Taylor's Movements.

CHICAGO, June 17.—W. W. Taylor, ex-state treasurer of South Dakota, did not put in an appearance at the Palmer House yesterday as was expected.

Both Perish Under the Car.

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa., June 17.—A distressing accident occurred here when Mrs. Nelson A. Byers, wife of a lumberman, and her 4-year-old grandson were run down and killed by a trolley car.

The grandson's name is Nelson B. Allen, and his home is in Buffalo, N. Y.

The little fellow was crossing the track in front of a trolley car, when his grandmother ran to save him.

She stumbled and fell as she reached him, and both were crushed beneath the car.

Since the electric cars began to run here four persons have been killed.

Trustee Duss' Sharp Move.

BEAVER FALLS, Pa., June 17.—A rather sharp move has been made by Trustee Duss, of the Economy society, whose case is now in the courts.

During the session it transpired that Duss had sold the interest of the society in the Little Saw Mill Run railroad to a coal company for \$100,000, and had paid a mortgage against the society amounting to \$90,000 with the proceeds.

This disposed of some of the most valuable assets for which the defendants are fighting.

A Minister Deposed.

CAPE MAY, June 17.—The Cape May Court House Baptist church, at a congregational meeting, deposed its pastor, Rev. T. E. Richards, for having induced two young women members of the church to follow him in a roving gospel itinerary through the mining region of Pennsylvania against the entreaties of their parents.

Rev. Richards has not yet returned, and his wife and children are being cared for by charitable persons.

His Life for a Fishing Line Cork.

FLEMINGTON, N. J., June 17.—While attempting to secure a cork which became loose from his fish line Westcott Carpenter, the 21-year-old son of ex-Senator John Carpenter, of Clinton, fell into the Raritan river, and was drowned.

Edward Seals, a boy who was near by, caught Carpenter as he came up the first time, crying for help, but was unable to hold the drowning man.

His body has been recovered.

Drowned While Trying to Rescue His Son.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 17.—W. H. Kerr, of Hechester, Howard county, Md., was drowned from his yacht Watanga yesterday afternoon in attempting to save his 6-year-old son, who had fallen overboard.

The boy was rescued by Captain Burtis, of Annapolis, and Mr. Kerr's body was recovered soon after.

Mrs. Kerr and a party of friends were aboard the boat.

Murdered for His Watch.

HAZLETON, Pa., June 17.—When William Cummings, of Mahanoy City, tried to sell a watch at Stockton Joseph Comitz claimed the timepiece as his property.

Comitz endeavored to secure possession of the watch, and a fight resulted, during which Cummings shot his opponent in the hand.

Comitz died in a few hours.

Acting President of Nicaragua.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, June 17.—Vice president Franco Bacia H. Just has been installed as president of Nicaragua, in the temporary absence of President Zelaya at Amapala, to confer with the presidents of Honduras, Salvador and probably Guatemala, as to the formation of a league of Central American states.

Drowned in the Schuylkill.

PHILADELPHIA, June 17.—Edward A. Shevlin, aged 24 years, was drowned in the Schuylkill river yesterday by the capsizing of a rowboat occupied by him and three companions, two of whom were girls. The others were rescued.

They were all members of a picnic party.

Death in His Bootie.

LANCASTER, Pa., June 17.—During the night Samuel Keeler, an inmate of the almshouse, rolled out of bed while suffering from an attack of epilepsy.

His face ran into the leg of his boot that lay upon the floor, and he was suffocated.

Traders Murdered by Natives.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., June 17.—The natives of the Solomon islands have murdered two traders. Head hunting is rampant in the island.

The British admiral there has been ordered to repress the excesses.

VIENNA, June 17.—At the Austrian bicycle derby yesterday the American bicyclist Banker was first, the Venese Ehinger second, and the British rider, Bardon, was third.
