AT THE COUNTY COURT

Some of the Shenandoah Cases Disposed Of.

SENTENCE FOR PLIMMER!

Chief of Police Tosh Succeeds in Putting Thomas Krushane Away for a White-A Trouble-some Character.

Yesterday was one of the Shenandoah days at the county court and a number of cases were disposed of. The principal one was that of William Plimmer, the negro, who struck a boy named Michael Hartz on the head with a hatchet at a picnic at Columbia park on Memorial day.

John and Fannie Showdes, Polish representatives of this town, were also before the court yesterday. They were arraigned on a charge of resisting an officer preferred by special officer Anthony Alex. The officer went into the house of the accused to serve a warrant on one of the boarders and was thrown out.

Chief of Police Tosh yesterday succeeded in convicting Thomas Krushane, who has been a terror to the residents of the lower end of Main street for some time. Krushane is a cripple who gets along in this world on the Weary Waggles order.

Patrick Hilbert, a boy of tender years residing in town, was convicted on a charge of larceny preferred by Samuel Davis, the West Centre street grocer. The court was lenient and only sentenced the boy to pay the costs.

Joseph Pickalofsky, a fourteen year old boy of town who has been giving his mother considerable trouble by reason of his bad conduct, was sent to the Huntingdon reformatory today.

Among the other Shenandoah cases disposed of was that of Anthony Willatofsky, charged by George Sovitsky with cheating and defrauding a boarding house keeper. The jury failed to convict and the costs were put on the prosecutor.

A case before the grand jury yesterday was that of Peter McAlee, charged with assault and battery by William Caneerins, the East Centre street saloonkeeper. The jury ignored the bill and put the costs on Caneerins.
