Opening of the National Convention at Cleveland.

LAUNCHING PRESIDENTIAL ROOMS.

Many Politicians Present Who Have Never Before Attended League Conventions. The Silver Advocates Seem to be Meeting with Little Encouragement.

CLEVELAND, June 10.—The business portion of the city is profusely decorated with flags and bunting in honor of the National League of Republican clubs, which met in annual convention this forenoon. Music Hall, where the convention is held, is most artistically decorated.

Among the visiting statesmen who attracted most attention yesterday were Governor Brown of Rhode Island, Governor Nelson and ex-Governor Merriam of Michigan, ex-Governor Moody of Oregon, and the officers of the state leagues, but the influx of delegates last night was so large that favorites are less conspicuous.

The silver enthusiasts are greatly disappointed over the attitude of the mountaineers and the colored brethren from the south. The southern delegates say the Democrats of the southern states are dividing on the silver question, and they want nothing done at this convention on that question, and that if the issue is forced they will vote with the eastern and other delegates against free silver.

The American Protective league has elaborate headquarters here this week, in charge of General Secretary Wilbur F. Wakeman, of New York, and several state secretaries.

There are here now leading Republicans who have never attended league meetings before, and who are here in the interest of McKinley, Reed, Allison and others for president. It is realized that the presidential boom will be more numerous and more luxuriant than ever next year, and for that reason, also, the meeting of 1890 should be held after the Republican national convention. D. D. Woodmansee, president of the Ohio league, withdrew as a candidate for national president, because of McKinley's candidacy for president, and now the Ohio delegation does not know what to do.

The free silver man held a conference last night and decided to make an aggressive fight, notwithstanding the disaffection of southern delegates on whom they had depended. The silver men say they will run Colonel Isaac Trumbull, of Salt Lake City, for president of the league, and show their strength on a ballot. Senators Carter and Dubois are working hard for him. The latter will precipitate the silver fight by offering a 16 to 1 resolution.

Lanont's Tour of Inspection. CINCINNATI, June 10.—Hon. Daniel Lanont, secretary of war, stopped here on his journey to the west, and made an inspection of the troops and garrisons at Fort Thomas. He was deeply interested in finding out the shelter of the fort a party of Creek Indians who deserted a Wild West show here.

Suicide Rather Than Blindness. ALLENTOWN, Pa., June 10.—Joseph Koch left home yesterday morning for Allentown and was found drowned in the evening in the Lehigh river. The body stood upright in the water when found near the wharf of the Allentown Rolling Mills. It was a case of suicide. Koch's eyesight had been failing him rapidly, and he became discouraged over the poor prospects of supporting himself. He was well advanced in years and left a family.
