The White Metallists Active at the Cleveland Convention.

BOTH SIDES SHOW THEIR COLORS.

Yellow Badges Predominate, but Those Who Wear White Badges Are Still Undismayed-Friends of Presidential Aspirauts Actively at Work.

CLEVELAND, June 20 .- The opening session of the eighth national convention of Republican clubs adjourned at 1 p. m. yesterday until 10 a. m. today, after disposing of all preliminaries and routine matters. There were no developments in the convention indicating the contest be-tween those wearing yellow and white badges, and representing respectively the gold and the silver standards, but in the committee rooms, at the Arcade, hotels and elsewhere the fight continued.

The committee on credentials had considerable auusement over the South Caro-lina contest. The committee on league work, rules and order of business had nothing unusual. The committee on time and place selected Milwaukee as the place for the next national conven-tion, and referred the selection of the date empty store rooms on Main street. Thurston, of Nebraska, as follows: "We approve the declaration of the last Republican convention that 'the American people from tradition and interest favor bimetallism, and the Republican party letes, generally, find a sovereign remedy for demands the use of both gold and silver as a standard money, with such restric-tions and under such provisions to be determined as will secure the maintenance of the parity of values of the two metals. so that the purchasing and debt paying power of the dollar, whether of silver, gold or paper, shall be at all times equal, and refer the action for a more specific declaration to the next Republican convention, which alone has the power to bind the party or make platforms and declare principles." There was no discussion of the tariff or any other issues in the committee of forty six members except that of the silver plank, and no differences of opinion except on the silver question. Nearly all the members of the committee were instructed on the silver question by their respective state delegations, so that it will not be difficult to adopt a report. Still it is con-ceded that these instructions make it almost certain that both majority and minority reports will be presented to the convention. The silver men still have confidence in their strength among the dele gates, although a majority of the committee is against them.


