FORTUNATELY the local Board of Health has not been thus far bothered by the arrival of any disease-attlicted immigrants and the warning sent out by the State Board proves to have been but a part of a routine of precaution. Still the time devoted to the matter was not wasted and it is hoped none of the vigilance will be lessened. Too much precaution cannot be taken

THE characteristics of the man were clearly revealed when Senator Quay said. on being told of Governor Hastings' attitude, that if the Governor wanted to be the presiding officer of the Republican state convention he should have no opposition. It takes the wind out of the Governor's sails in more than one respect. Certainly Senator Quay cannot be charged with any discourtesy towards the Governon.

In is hoped the Chief Burgess and Chief of Police will adjust their differences without going to court. It is a case of a clash of authority in which both officials have performed what they considered their duty, or at least what they considered they had a right to do. In regard to Chief of Police Tosh it must be admitted that he did right in trying to nip in the bud any attempt on the part of the circus fakirs to operate in town. The people expected him to do this and had he been indolent in this respect he doubtless would have been severely censured. Without touching upon the wisdom of the Chief Burgess in issuing a permit in the case in question, it must also be admitted that fakirs have found too good a haven in Shenandoah for many years and if more stringency were placed upon them the people would be better satisfied. If the man to whom the license in this case was granted was not of the swindling kind of fakirs the Chief of Police supposed him to be; it was a very easy-matter for him to call upon the Chief Burgess and require him to make good the permit, or retand the fee paid for it; and if the sole purpose of the man was to advertise the circus it seems odd that any license fee should be required. There is no doubt that the Burgess is the chief executive officer of the borough and that where he issues a permit it must be respected; but it is equally true that the Chief of Police has an authority of considerable magnitude, especially when he believes that the law is being openly violated. Should be make a mistake and improperly arrest a man who holds : license issued by the Chief Burgess it would seem that the proper course would be a suit against the Chief of Police by the man subjected to arrest, and not a criminal action between the officers. Under the present status the man who held the permit will parhaps be thousands of miles away from Shenandoah when the suit between the officers comes up and, perhaps, at this moment he takes as little interest in the case as does the Czar of Russia; but the Chief Burgass and Chief of Police will be bothered with the case for months, a heavy hill of costs will be accumulated, and for what-to see who has the most authority, when the laws clearly define the duties of each officer. The Peralta Land Grant Claim a Monster Fraud.

THE CLAIMANT TO BE PROSECUTED.

He Laid Claim, Through His Wife, to Over Twelve Million Acres of Land in Arizona and New Mexico, Much of It Occupied by Settlers.

SANTA FE., N. M., June 33.-The great Peralta grant, situated in Arizona and New Mexico, and covering 13,465,000 acres of land, which has been on trial for three weeks, was decided yesterday in favor of the government. The claimant was in

court, appearing cool and collected. The court hold every title paper to be forged and manufactured, and that the mission records of San Salvador, Cal., were forged to enable the wife of the claimant to connect herself with a Per-alta family. Three Killed on a Georgia Railroad.

MACON, Ga., June 14 .- A serious wreck occurred on the Central railroad near Milledgeville, some twenty miles from here. Three men were killed and several badly injured. The dead are Tom Allen section foreman, and Bob Smith and Bol Jesse, both colored train hands. A freight train had stopped at Midway station to shift some cars, when a service train, heavily loaded, approached the station. which is on a steep grade. A coupling pin broke, and the cars rushed down the grade and struck a cor that had been left on the main line by the freight train.


