UNCLE SAM THE WINNER

The Peralta Land Grant Claim a Monster Fraud.

THE CLAIMANT TO BE PROSECUTED.

He Laid Claim, Through His Wife, to Over Twelve Million Acres of Land in Arizona and New Mexico, Much of It Occupied by Settlers.

SANTA FE, N. M., June 28.—The great Peralta grant, situated in Arizona and New Mexico, and covering 13,400,000 acres of land, which has been on trial for three weeks, was decided yesterday in favor of the government. The claimant was in court, appearing cool and collected.

Reavis was arrested by the United States marshal for asserting false claims against the government, upon complaint made by United States Attorney Reynolds. United States Attorney Reynolds and his associate, Mallett Prevost, are being showered with congratulations from all over Arizona.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—The arrest of James A. Reavis in New Mexico yesterday, and the decision of the United States court of private land claims that Reavis' right to nearly 12,000,000 acres of land in Arizona and New Mexico, much of it occupied by settlers, and known as the Peralta-Reavis Mexican grant, is declared to be fraudulent, was received by Secretary Olney and the officials of the department of justice with much satisfaction.

Three Killed on a Georgia Railroad. MACON, Ga., June 14.—A serious wreck occurred on the Central railroad near Milledgeville, some twenty miles from here. Three men were killed and several badly injured. The dead are Tom Allen, section foreman, and Bob Smith and Bob Jesse, both colored train hands.

Urging Mgr. Satelli's Expulsion. WORCESTER, Mass., June 28.—The eighth annual convention of the National Association of Loyal Women of American Liberty was held in this city yesterday. The resolutions call for the expulsion of the pope's legate, Satelli, from the country, because he is the sworn agent of a foreign ecclesiastical power; favor restricted immigration; urge the putting of a national flag on every school house and a picture of Washington in every school room, and protest against the confining of women in convents.

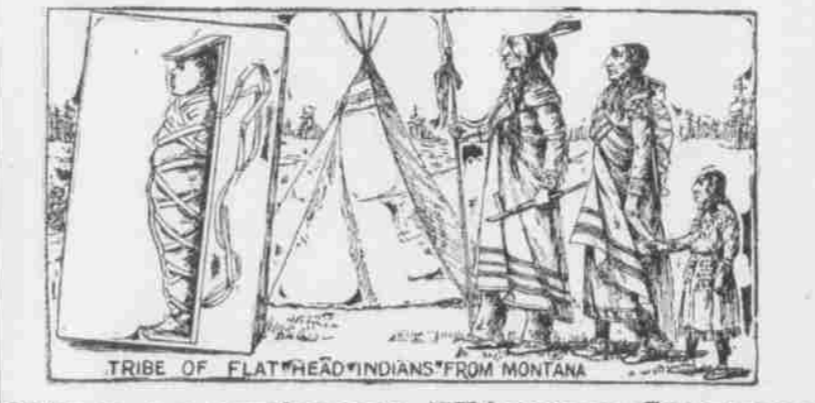
