Under the new law the number of a tax receipt can be readily noted and, as figures can't lie, a balt can be more readily called if the same number turns up more than once than it can when only a comparison of names is depended upon.

### SIX FIREMEN KILLED.

Buried Under Falling Walls at a Minneapolis Conflagration.

SEVERAL OTHERS SERIOUSLY HURT

It Is Feared That There May be Still More Dead Than the Number Given, and That Their Bodies Are Under the Smok-MINNEAPOLIS. June 28 .- The most dis-

astrons fire which ever visited Minneapohs accomplished its work of destruction and death last night. Within an hour after the alarm rang in, at 11 o'clock, firemen paid the penalty of death for their faithfulness in trying to save the property of others.

The dead are: Joseph Pay, truck No. 2; Walter Richardson, hose No. 6; Frank Rulaine, lieutenant of hose company No. 6; John Horn, truck No. 8; Bert Thomas hose No. 10, died on the way to the hospital; unidentified new member of engine company No. 14.

The seriously injured, so far as known. are: Ed. Thielan, lieutenant of hook and ladder company No. 2; Captain Cadwell, eng'neer of company No. 6. Several others were seriously injured, and it is thought there may be still more dead who have not yet been extricated from under the walls, which fell and crushed them.

The property loss consisted of the en-tire demolition of the building occupied by McDonald Brothers, dealers in crockery, chinaware, glassware, silverware and gas fixtures. The building was of four stories, brick walls and wooden interior framework, and was well stocked. The fire originated in the boxes and packings stored in the rear of the building, and was beyond the power of the fire department to control. At a few minutes before mid-night the walls fell, one side wall falling in and the other falling out into the alley where the firemen were at work. San Francisco's \$2,000,000 Fire.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28 .- Three plarms of fire last night brought out the entire department to suppress a conflagration that started in the rear of the San Francisco box factory, at the corner of Fifth and Bryant streets. The fire spread rapidly, and before it was gotten under control over a hundred buildings had been burned and \$2,000,000 worth of property destroyed. One death is reported. A large number of horses were burned to death.
