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SIX FIREMEN KILLED.

Buried Under Falling Walls at a Minneapolis Conflagration.

SEVERAL OTHERS SERIOUSLY HURT

It Is Feared That There May Be Still More Dead Than the Number Given, and That Their Bodies Are Under the Smoking Mass.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 28.—The most disastrous fire which ever visited Minneapolis accomplished its work of destruction and death last night. Within an hour after the alarm rang in, at 11 o'clock, six firemen paid the penalty of death for their faithfulness in trying to save the property of others.

The dead are: Joseph Fay, truck No. 2; Walter Richardson, hose No. 6; Frank Ruland, lieutenant of hose company No. 6; John Horn, truck No. 8; Bert Thomas, hose No. 10, died on the way to the hospital; unidentified new member of engine company No. 14.

The seriously injured, so far as known, are: Ed. Thielan, lieutenant of hook and ladder company No. 2; Captain Castwell, engineer of company No. 6. Several others were seriously injured, and it is thought there may be still more dead who have not yet been extricated from under the walls, which fell and crushed them.

San Francisco's \$2,000,000 Fire. SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—Three alarms of fire last night brought out the entire department to suppress a conflagration that started in the rear of the San Francisco box factory, at the corner of Fifth and Bryant streets.

Death of Nancy King Blackie. ENGLEWOOD, N. J., June 28.—Nancy King Blackie died here yesterday. She was born Aug. 25, 1813, at Waterford, Pa. Her late husband, Rev. Dr. Alexander Blackie, to whom she was married nearly fifty years, was widely known in the United States.

Dr. Cyrus Edson Resigns. NEW YORK, June 28.—Today's World says: Dr. Cyrus Edson has resigned as a member of the New York board of health.

Tornado at Put-in-Bay Islands. CLEVELAND, June 28.—News comes by boat of a tornado at Put-in-Bay islands. One wall of the brick town hall at Put-in-Bay was blown down, half the trees in Victory park were uprooted, and great havoc was wrought in the peach orchards.

The Chinese Commander Weakens. LONDON, June 28.—The Times' Hong Kong correspondent telegraphs that Japanese warships are assembling at Makung and preparing to attack the Black Flag. The Chinese general has repeatedly demanded the withdrawal of the British forces, and on one occasion guns were trained on the foreign settlement, but the British men-of-war Spartan, Rainbow, Redoubt, Plover and Pigmy cleared for action, when the Chinese commander recanted his order.

Professional Cycling at Asbury Park. ASBURY PARK, June 28.—From information received from President Atkins, of the Asbury Park Wheelmen, who is now at Philadelphia in conference with the officials of the League of American Wheelmen, professional races will be run and special cash prizes offered for the suspended class B men to race for during the National League of American Wheelmen meet here next month.

Illinois Legislators Meet Act. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 28.—Governor Altgeld informed a committee from the Democratic house caucus that if the legislature, now convened in special session, adjourned without acting on the matter mentioned in his proclamation he would in a week or two reassemble the legislature.

"Gail Hamilton" Leaves Washington. WASHINGTON, June 28.—This afternoon Miss Mary A. Dodge ("Gail Hamilton") was taken from the Blair residence and sent to her home in Salem, Mass. She occupies a special car, and is accompanied by Dr. Johnston, her physician.
