SPANISH BRAVERY.

Details of Gomez's Destruction of San Geronimo.

BRAVE LIEUTENANT'S FORTITUDE.

Though Overwhelmed by Superior Numbers, He and His Men Fought Nobly Until Driven from Their Garrison by Smoke Gomez's Tribute to Courage.

HAVANA, June 29 .- The facts about the raid and the burning of San Geronimo, news of which has been already cabled to the Associated Press, as they are learned in more detail, are found to be of import

San Geronimo is the most flourishing village in the province of Puerto Principe, and possesses several warehouses. It is situated about twenty-five miles from the town of Puerto Principe.

About 5 o'clock in the evening Maximo Gomez appeared near San Geronimo, at the head of 1,500 men. He sent to the commander of the village, saying that he must surrender or run the risk of being killed, either by bullets or fire. The Spanish commander, Lieutenant Laborda the note to pieces, replying: "Tell him to ome at once and do what he pleases; that a Spaniard will never surrender." Addressing his men he said: "Soldiers.

Throughout the night these men waited to be attacked. The families of the citizens, aware of Gomez's presence in the neighborhood, left the town, seeking shelter in the Guajamal hacienda, at a dis-tance of three miles. Meanwhile the rain was falling in torrents. The insurgents allowed the women and children of the families to pass out of the city, but the men remained inside.

At sunrise Gomez ordered the mayor of the town to tell the Spanish lieutenant that he had the town surrounded, and that he must surrender immediately. Afterwards the mayor returned, saving: der no circumstances will he surrender. Gomez then gave an order for 400 of his cavalry to dismount and attack the place. At the same time they advanced toward the town and ordered their prisoners to set fire to the nearest houses.

Gemez was heard to say: "That officer

is a brave man. He will not surrender in

spite of shooting and fire. He then commanded that the whole town should be burned. The fire increased rapidly through the town, and the fort in which the garrison was quartered was al-ready burning. The troops kept firing until nearly suffocated by the smoke, when the officer lifted a white flag, and the insurgents' bugle gave the signal to stop firing. Lieutenant Laborda, a lieutenant of guerillas, fifty soldiers of the garrison and twenty-two guerillas came forward and, agreeing with Gomez as to the terms of the surrender, delivered their arms and ammunition.

The marquis of Santa Lucie and Maximo Gomez embraced Lieutenant Laborda, saying to him: "You can shout 'Viva Espana, because you are a worthy defender

The officers and soldiers, with tears in their eyes, revealed in their faces the an-guish they felt at their surrender, to which they consented although quite haughtily. But it would have been a mad enterprise to attempt to defend themselves against an enemy twenty times as numerous as
