THE DEFENDER AFLOAT. The American Yacht Pulled from the Ways by a Big Tug.

THE VESSEL ESCAPES INJURY,

But the Cradle on Which She Rested Was Solintered by Protruding Bolts, Which Prevented the Launch on the Day Orig-Inally Decided Upon.

BRISTOL, R. L. July 2 .- The new yacht Defender, upon which the hopes of Amer-ica depends for victory over the English boat with which she is to compete next fail, rests gracefully in the waters of Bris-tol bay at the dock of the Herreshoff works, having been released yesterday afternoon from the position into which she became fastened during an attempt to launch her on Saturday. A thorough ex-amination of the hull by divers has been made, and the yacht is pronounced unin-jured by her forty-eight hours' suspension near the end of the ways. The yacht was released by the powerful tug Right Arm, after repeated attempts made during the time since she became fast.

All efforts to move the yacht during Saturday night and Sunday having proved useless, it was determined to attempt to raise her from the cradle by the use of pontoons. Accordingly preparations were begun to accomplish the work of lightering the obstructed yacht. The pontoons were expected to arrive from Newport at 7 o'clock yesterday morning, as they were to be put in at low tide, but owing to a misunderstanding they did not arrive until after the tide had reached the flood. The tide served well, and shortly after noon, when the water was pretty well up, Captain Davis, of the tug Right Arm, told refunded. Book free. the Defender. He was told to do so. Captain Davis and his men then placed a net work of cables about the yacht, in the form of a huge cat's cradle. This was done not only to give additional purchase but also to avoid possibility of toppling the Defender over.

The Right Arm then got up steam and gathering the cables together, when the word was given, started ahead. The hawsers became taut, but the Defender did not move. The strain was again applied with no apparent result, and a third pull was also unsuccessful.


