THE DEFENDER AFLOAT.

The American Yacht Pulled from the Ways by a Big Tug.

THE VESSEL ESCAPES INJURY.

But the Cradle on Which She Rested Was Splintered by Protruding Bolts, Which Prevented the Launch on the Day Originally Decided Upon.

Bristol, R. I., July 2.—The new yacht Defender, upon which the hopes of America depend for victory over the English boat with which she is to compete next fall, rests gracefully in the waters of Bristol bay at the dock of the Herreshoff works, having been released yesterday afternoon from the position into which she became fastened during an attempt to launch her on Saturday.

All efforts to move the yacht during Saturday night and Sunday having proved useless, it was determined to attempt to raise her from the cradle by the use of pontoons. Accordingly preparations were begun to accomplish the work of lightening the obstructed yacht.

Captain Davis and his men then placed a net work of cables about the yacht, in the form of a huge cradle. This was done not only to give additional purchase, but also to avoid possibility of toppling the Defender over.

The Right Arm then got up steam and gathering the cables together, when the word was given, started ahead. The havers became taut, but the Defender did not move. The strain was again applied with no apparent result, and a third pull was also unsuccessful.

Captain Nat Herreshoff and C. Oliver Iselin, who were watching the operations, looked even more serious than before. A conference was held with Captain Davis, of the tug, and the tug was nearly 3 o'clock, and the tide was turning.

At this point the eager eyes on the dock noticed a slight movement of the yacht, followed by a decided motion towards the end of the ways, and in another moment the Defender took the water with a splash, floating easily along in the wake of the tug.

As soon as the yacht floated the cradle, separated from the keel, floated alongside. It was badly scratched and splintered, showing that had not the builders placed it under the Defender she would have been seriously damaged in the attempts to release her.

The cause of the mishap to the Defender is now known to have resulted from protruding bolts used in the construction of the ways. These bolts extended through the timbers of the ways, so that as the cradle came down upon them they became imbedded in the woodwork to the depth of from an inch to an inch and a half.

The opinion is given on good authority that it will be six weeks before the Defender will be ready for a trial trip.

CHICAGO, July 2.—A decision of much importance to cyclists was rendered by Judge Payne yesterday, when he denied the petition of John H. Breckenridge to compel the Fort Dearborn building proprietors to allow bicycles to be stored there by tenants.
