TRAGEDIES OF THE DAY

Many Murders Mar Independence Day Festivities.

A BLOODY RIOT IN EAST BOSTON.

An American Protective Association Emblem Leads to the Killing of One Man and Serious Injuries to Several Others. The Day's Tragedies in Other Sections,

Boston, July 5 .- The Fourth of July parade of the patriotic societies of Boston and vicinity, at East Boston yesterday afternoon, ended in a pitched battle be-tween some of the paraders and the spectators, in which sticks, stones and revolvers were used with fatal effect. John W. Wills, a laborer of East Boston, one of the spectators, was shot and instantly killed; Michael Doyle, of East Boston, had his head split open by a club, and now lies dying at the city hospital; a young man named Stewart had his nose cut off with a suber in the hands of one the paraders; Parader Falls Patrick Kelly sustained a severe scalp wound, whether from a club or a builet is not known, and Officer A. S. Bates was hit in the month by a brick and lost sev-eral teeth, besides suffering from severe Incerations.

It is claimed that the trouble all resulted from the persistence of those who managed the parade in introducing as a feature r float presenting "The Little Red School House," which from its association as the emblem of the American Protective association has become obnoxious to many persons, especially those who do not symathize with the A. P. A. movement, The Fourth of July committee refused to permit this feature to appear in the parade, and those desiring to prevent it tried to have an order passed by the board of aldermon, but failed.

So great was the interest excited by this controversy and the expressed determination of the paraders to display the school house that fully 10,000 visitors gathered at East Boston. The police officials in an-ticipation of any hostile demonstration had a special squad of 350 men, in addition to the East Boston force, on duty, but they marched at the head of the procession. At several points the feeling of the crowd was given yent in hisses at the 1,500 paraders and the school house, but no further demonstration was made until the rear of the parade had reached Put-num street, when the crowd tried to overturn the last carriage. Word was sent to the front for police

assistance, and a squad of twenty officers were sent back. A ukirmish followed between the crowd and the officers, and Michael Doyle received a fractured skull. A man named Stewart, of Brooks street, had his nose cut off by a saber in the hands of Albert E. Andrews, of Everett, a private in the Rosebury Horse Guarás, who went to the assistance of the occu-pants in the carriage. By this incident the feeling of the crowd was intensified. and when the parade broke up and those who had participated were proceeding in companies to the ferry, in order to reach the city proper, a group of between sixty and seventy was surrounded on Border street by a crowd, who commenced hooting and throwing stones.

A dozen revolvers were drawn, and in response to a fusiliade of stones eight or nine shots were fired. The firing of the revolvers brought a large body of police to the spot and the mob was soon dispersed. When the street was cleared the officers found John Wills dead in the street, with a bullet hole in his right side, and Patrick A. Kelly lying seriously wounded about the head. It was learned later that several other persons had been slightly injured, all of whom were taken away by their friends.

The police arrested Harold Brown and John Ross as the principals who did the shooting. It is claimed by six witnesses that Brown did the shooting which killed Wills and wounded Kelly. Wills, the murdered man, leaves a widow and six children.


