THE MYSTERY OF THEIR ESCAPE.

Postmaster General Wilson, in a Letter to

the United States District Attorney at New York, Intimates That Some Jail Official Is Criminally Responsible. New York, July 6.—The postoffice thleves, Killoran, Allen and Russell, who escaped from Ludlow street jail by terri-tying or bribing Sheriff Tamsen's subor-

finates, are still at large. The police be-lieve they have already got away from the Sheriff Tamsen came down town yesterday morning, and his counsel, ex-Police Commissioner Charles F. MacLean, met

him at the Ludlow street jall shortly af-terward. Both denied themselves to reorters, and all that could be learned was that an investigation was in progress. On saching the jail the sheriff suspended from duty the two keepers, Schoen and Schneer, until the investigation should indicate what part they had in preventing or assisting the escape. Then he and Mr. MacLean began informally to take testimony in the case, calling upon the two keepers to make whatever statements they could in their own behalf.

In response to subsequent inquiries Sheriff Tamsen and Mr. MacLean sent out word that nothing definite had been earned which would fix the blame for

the occurrence. District Attorney MacFarlane said: "There seems to have been a huge blun-der somewhere, and the attitude of the Ludlow street jall authorities, who claim that the United States deputy marshals who escorted the prisoner back and forth between the federal building and the juil gave the men the pistols, is untenable. The marshal has no jurisdiction over pris-oners when they have been surrendered to the jall authorities after a short absence from the jail for the purpose of a judicial examination. Fifty Foreign Laborers Driven from Work by Armed Strikers-Houses Burned Down and Other Depredations Committed-Governor MacCorkle Takes Prompt Action,

CHARLESTON, W. Vo., July 6.-Governor MacCorkie has ordered the Second regiment under arms in readiness to proces to the Pocahontas coal fields. The miners, with Winchesters, forced fifty of the foreign laborers to quit work and leave the field. Thursday night a band of armed strikers met the Norfolk and Western trains at Fekman and refused to allow any one to leave the coaches. that the miners throughout the Eikhorn district are rioting having burned houses and committed other depredations. The Elkhorn mining region is on the Norfolk and Western road, near the boundary of Virginia, and is on the West Virginia line, at which the governor of Virginia has had troops for two months past. The present trouble is supposed to be due to the long strike, during which the

strikers have been driven to desperation by hunger. Governor MacCorkle has been watching things closely and has the mat-ter well in hand. If necessary troops will be on the ground by noon today, and there is little doubt that they will be able to cope with the situation.

FORECASTER WILLIS MOORE.

Secretary Morton Praises the New Chief of the Weather Bureau.

NEW YORK, July 6 .- J. Sterling Morton secretary of agriculture, arrived in the city yesterday. The secretary took the chaffing about the weather good naturedly, and made no excuses for the first day's work of his new chief, Willis L. Moore, but claimed that the new man is the best

forecaster of the weather bureau.
"We don't want scientific deductions." said the secretary. "We want forecasts. This new man won his promotion by a good record as a forecaster. He was brought up in the service from boyhood. He was chosen on the day that Howgate, a former chief, was sentenced to prison. Twenty years before, to a day, Willia Moore was confined in the guard house by order of Howgate for refusing to indorse some dishonest reports of the then chief You might call it retributive justice.

"There has been a great deal of talk about politics in the appointment of Moore. I never asked his politics until after he was sworn. To tell the truth, Mr. Morton, was his reply, "I have always

voted the Republican ticket."
"He was chosen because he can forecast the weather. It is suggested that, now he is at the top, be can afford to give the other boys in the service the benefit of his secret, and he has promised to do so. The result will be that we will have more faithful weather forecasts than ever before in the history of the bureau."
