AWARDING PRIZES TO WINNERS.

F. C. Ross, of Brooklyn, Crowned Shooting King, and George Hetm, of San Francisco, Defeated All Comers on the Ring Target -- Many Rich Prizes Won.

GLENDALE PARK, L. I., July 11.-The National Schuctzenbund of the United States wound up its first shooting festival here last night, and every one connected with the affair is more than satisfied with its success throughout. The distribution of the trophies did not begin until 30 clock yesterday afternoon. President Weber made a few remarks before the presenta-tion began and said that the fest had been brought to a very successful issue and bade fair to be more satisfactory in the

The money prizes were the first to be given out, and the large assortment of valuable donations from various societies and individuals for the successful shooters in the Columbia target of honor con-test were the last to be distributed. These were exhibited on tables at the end of the big dining pavillon, where they were in-spected and admired by the friends of the lucky shooters.

The first name to be called out from the list of winners on the ring target was George Helm, of San Francisco, who made the highest possible score of 75. His cash prizes amounted in all to \$870. Six beautiful silver wreaths were donated for the high men in the different contests, and Helm got two of them.

A. Strecker, of San Francisco, took first prize, \$200, on the man target, with 97, and Gus Zimmerman was second, with 96. The latter won first honors at the American standard target, which brought him \$150. H. D. Miller, of New York, was awarded first prize for the best bullseye on the point target. The winners of Columbia honor places were the last to be called to the inclosure reserved for the presentation committee, and each man selected his prize when his name was called. The principal winners were: First prize, W. Vorbach, of Brooklyn, 125 pieces of silver, valued at \$1,000; second, F. B. Schuster, of San Francisco, silver cup, valued at \$1,000; third, J. Bus-field, of Lawrence, Mass., \$500 in gold; fourth, L. Flach, of New York, piano, valued at \$750; fifth, G. Gregor, of New York, \$300 in gold. There were 260 other prizes in this class, ranging in value from \$600 to \$25 for the other contestants.
