The Casino Accident Depresses the Gay Summer Resort.

ATLANTIC'S SORROW.

Even Frederick Claprorth, Whose Death Was Reported, Is Still Alive-The Accident Caused by a Rotten Pillar Used as a Support for the Upper Floor.

ATLANTIC CITY, July 12 .- The galety and bustle characteristic of this resort has given way, to a degree, to a feeling of de-pression in consequence of the disaster at the Baltic Avenue Casino. It is largely tempered, however, by a devout thankful-ness that the catastrophe was no worse, and, indeed, it is considered almost miracu-lous that hundreds were not killed outright. At the Pacific Avenue Santtarium, where the most seriously injured are be ing cared for, it is reported that only one of the patients is in any immediate danger of death. This is Frederick Claproth, the cornetist of Jennings' band, of Camden. He has been several times reported dead. but is still hovering between life and death, to the wonder of the physicians, who ascribe it to a remarkably strong constitution.

The other inmates of the hospital, all of whom are progressing encouragingly, are Mrs. S. S. Japha, of New York, compound fracture of the thigh; J. L. P. Eckman. Mt. Holly, N. J., fractured leg: Anton Diamond, Philadelphia, fractured leg; Leopold Fry, Philadelphia, fractured leg; S. H. Hamberger, Philadelphia, fractured leg; J. Melville Jansen, of Carncross' minstrels. Philadelphia, cut about head. Mrs. Jansen, thigh fractured; Dr. R. W.

The number of the injured will undoubtedly aggregate close to 200, although it is impossible to obtain exact figures many of the victims having left for their homes, and the others being scattered throughout the city in innumerable botels. It has been definitely learned that the neeldent was caused by a rotten wooden pillar which helped to support the second floor of the Casino, Itself an old and long disused structure facing the boardwalk Most of the visitors had been on the lower floor, which had been used as a refresh ment pavilion, but the music from Jen-nings' band, which was stationed above. attracted a large majority to the upper floor. This undoubtedly prevented a great loss of life. There was a party of eight New York delegates below, and they remained there, chatting together, when there suddenly came a warning crackle, the ceiling above them was seen to split, and they rushed for their lives, gaining the boardwalk outside but a moment be-

fore the crash came. The great weight of the crowd was primarily responsible for the collapse, but measures will probably be taken to fix the

responsibility. It having been generally known that the structure was unsafe for a multitude. The accident occurred a few minutes be-

SOUTH AMERICA'S TURMOIL.

Peru Illy Prepared for War with Bolivia and Ecuador.

WASHINGTON July 12 -South American diplomats in Washington are much interested in the press reports that Bolivia has presented an ultimatum to Peru, which the latter has rejected, and that Bolivia and Ecuador have formed an alliance with the prospect of making war on Peru. The three countries involved are without ministers here, as recent revolu-tions have broken up the legations. The representatives of neighboring countries say Poru and Bolivia are about equally matched as far as military prowess is con-cerned. Pecu's former strength has dis has dis appeared since her war gill I die. The Chileans took all the Perryian warships, and it is believed that one old transport is all that remains of the Peruvian navy. The army is said to number about 4,000 men. The resources of the country were further crippled recently by a revolution in which the government was overthrown, the capital sacked and hundreds of people

killed. Since then there has been a "junta" running the government until an election could be held. Bolivia has no navy, and her army is said to be about the same as that of Peru She is ontirely inland since the war with Chile, when Chile took possession of those provinces which had formed Boll-via's coast i.e.. Of late Bollvia has tried to get back her coast front, and a treaty

was effected for this purpose, but it has not been ratified by the Chilean congress, and is not likely to be. Ecuador is said to be in good fighting trim, as she has just emerged from a revolution, and all her people are in arms. But her navy is insignificant, her only good warship having been sold to Japan some months ago. It looks, therefore, to those conversant with the situation that these three crippled countries would not engage in a very formidable war. They cannot fight by sea, and there are great stretches of desolate and mountainous

untry between them. Chile is in no way interested in the trouble. The late war appears to have estab-lished her firmly as mistress of the west coast of South America. She has a pow-erful fleet, ranking with some of the European powers, and none of the neighbor ing republies seem willing to oppose her

Forger Lewis Prepared for Flight.

URBANA, O., July 12 -- No new forged bonds have turned up in Z. T. Lewis' case. The amount of \$125,000 spurious bonds remains unchanged. It now looks as though Lewis had premeditated this collapse, and had prepared for it. His wife went east in April, but turned up at St. Clair, Mich., later. His daughter also repaired to St. Clair two weeks ago. A visit to the residence last evening revealed that every particle of clothing of the two women had been taken away. The sealskin cloaks had not been forgotten. It has just been developed here that Lewis had a scheme concocted to get hold of \$250,000 natural gas bonds of this city. The sudden collapse balked his game.

Antonio Ezeta's Foolish Threat.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12. - Antonio Ezeta's aunouncement of his intention to return fo Salvador at the head of an in-vading party and become president of that Central American republic has created little interest hore. Dr. Cornelio Lemus, the Salvadorian minister of finance, now in this city, says that if he ever returns to Salvador military protection would be necessary to save his life from the people long enough for him to be tried on the criminal charges pending against him. United States District Attorney Footo does not believe Ezeta has any intention of returning to Salvador. He adds that if Ezeta attempts to leave port in a vessel of of his own he will be arrested.
