**DEFENDER VS. VIGILANT.**

A Fair Test of Speed Between the Two Famous Yachts.

NEWPORT, R. I., July 15.—The Defender outsailed the victorious Vigilant in a fair and interesting trial contest yesterday afternoon off the Rhode Island coast, and Messrs. Iselin, Morgan and Vanderbilt, the members of the syndicate, who followed every movement of both boats, expressed themselves as well pleased with the result.

The Defender arrived here in tow of a tug at 7 o'clock this morning. Captain Huff was in charge, and after spending two hours making preparations for a sail waited for the Vigilant to put in her appearance. Just before 11 o'clock the latter was seen coming down the bay.

In a few minutes more the distance was doubled. Both boats were then carrying balloon jibs. At 12:30 the Defender came about and set her jib and sky sail, and hauled down the balloon jib.

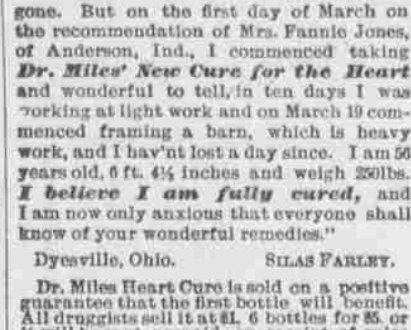
The Vigilant's commander at once came about, took in her headsails and she was taken in tow by her tender. The latter headed for New London.

**A MONSTROUS PLOT.**

The Sassoun Massacre Was Carefully Planned by Turkey.

BODIES SATURATED WITH OIL. Large Quantities Were Taken Into the Country Before the Eprising of the Kurds for the Purpose of Aiding in the Horrible Work of Destruction.

LONDON, July 15.—Writing from Van, Armenia, under date of July 5, the special correspondent of the Associated Press says: The Sassoun massacre, it would appear, was one of the most carefully planned outrages in history.

During the months of June, July and August preceding the Sassoun massacre the Kurdish chiefs in the country surrounding the Sassoun region, and particularly the districts in the southward and southwestward, were apparently unusually busy in gathering up the scattered warriors of their tribes for an invasion of the Sassoun region.

In July and August enormous quantities of petroleum were shipped from Erzerum to Moush. This petroleum came originally from Russia to Erzerum, and so great was the quantity brought over the mountain roads that it was a subject of remark to very many persons.

But the mystery was a mystery no longer after the Sassoun massacre, for that petroleum was used to burn the houses of the Sassoun villages and to cremate the bodies of the wretched villagers who fell victims to the awful butchery.

A few weeks prior to the beginning of the Sassoun massacre there was an unusual demand for horses for the army. This demand was not confined to the city of Moush, nor yet to the province of Bitlis.

Several weeks after the Sassoun massacre, it is claimed, orders were sent from the palace at Constantinople for a massacre of the inhabitants of Modlikan, a district lying to the south and southeast of Sassoun.

In 1893, it is added, an attempt was made by the Turkish government to exterminate the Sassoun people, but on this occasion the work of extermination was entrusted to the Kurds, with the result that the latter got decidedly the worst of it.

An Indian God. WICHITA, Kan., July 15.—In the Caddo Indian district it has been raining steadily for a week. The rain, coming as it does after the incantations of Squirel, an aged and decrepit Indian, who claims that the Great Spirit has given him the power to make rain, has driven the Caddo Indians into a frenzy.

Spain Agrees to Pay Up. MADRID, July 15.—The Spanish foreign and colonial ministers have finally agreed to the immediate payment of the Mora indemnity, which was recently demanded by the United States, through Minister Taylor.
