HOLMES' MANY CRIMES.

Startling Evidence Against Insurance Swindler Holmes.

PERHAPS SIX TIMES A MURDERER.

The Missing Boy, Howard Pitezel, Probably Murdered by Holmes in Indianapolis and His Body Taken Away in a Trunk-The Accused Non-Committal.

PHILADELPHIA, July 17.—The discovery of the dead bodies of the two girls, Nellie and Alice Pitezel, in a cellar in Toronto, Canada, by Detective Geyer, of Philadelphia, is the all absorbing topic of conversation in police circles. The girls are believed to be the victims of H. H. Holmes, the insurance swindler, now in Moyamen sing prison awaiting sentence for swind-ling the Fidelity Mutual Insurance company out of \$10,000.

Holmes, who has himself confessed that

he has committed enough crimes to hang him half a dozen times, is supposed to have first deliberately murdored the Pitezel girls' father and brother and then the girls themselves.

These nurders are alleged to have been committed for the purpose of getting the victime' money. Besides the above crimes, Holmes is supposed to have done away with Minnie and Nellie Williams, whose he admits having obtained, awindled several fire insurance companies out of large amounts, and otherwise committed depredations which will hand him down as one of the most notorious additions to the criminal annals of the coun-

Holmes was in consultation for nearly two hours with Assistant District Attorneys Barlow and Finietter yesterday. The prisoner has grown a beard, and this and the other changes he has undergone would serve to be valuable aids to him if he was again escaping from justice.

District Attorney Graham had issued an order to Superintendent Perkins, of Moyamensing, that Holmes was not to be permitted to see any newspapers in which ap-peared an account of the finding of the Fitezel children. Before the order had reached the prison, however, some of the morning papers had reached Holmes, and he was reading an account of Detective Geyer's terrible find in Teronto when the special officer entered.

It was evident that the publication prepared him for the subsequent examination by Assistant District Attorney Barlow.

It was learned that Holmes clung to his eld story of the disappearance of little Alice and Nellie Pitezel. It is said he feigned surprise that their dead bodies had been found. He professed to know nothing of the whereabouts of Howard Pitezel.

Although nothing definite could be learned about the examination further, it was intimated that Holmes threw no further light on the terrible mysteries which

are now shadowing the case.

Holmes was visited in Moyamensing prison later by his counsel, R. O. Moon, who subsequently made the statement that his client had positively denied all connection with the murder of the children. He asserted that the last time he saw them was in October of last year in and Shamokin,

THE BULGARIAN CRIME

Ex-Premier Stambuloff May Survive His Wounds.

PIFTEEN SWORD CUTS ON HIS HEAD

The Government Morally Responsible for the Outrage, as It Neglected to Suppress an Organized Band of Assassins-M. Stambuloff Predleted the Assault.

Soria, July 17.—The condition of M. Stambuloff is such as to give slight hopes that he may yet recover from his wounds. He has fifteen sword cuts on his head, and one of his eyes has been destroyed.

Although the attempt to murder him

was made in a busy street, no one came to his assistance. Everybody seems to be convinced that the police were in the plot to assassinate the ex-premier, as five mem-bers of the police force who were near him when he was attacked made no attempt to interfere.

Then again, one of the Stambuloff serwants chased one of the assassins, but the man was stopped by the police. M. Stam-buloff's coachman, who fired his revolver but missed hitting anybody when the premier's assallants attacked the carriage last night, is also believed to have one of those who plotted against the statesman's life, as he made no attempt to whip up his horses when the attack was made.

A man who witnessed M. Stambuloff's servant pursue the assassins says that he saw a policeman strike the man because of his refusal to give up the revolver with which he was chasing the criminals, and to whom the policemen were not paying any attention.

M. Stambuloff last evening made a statement to the public prosecutor, who has ordered the arrest of Tufektchieff, who was formerly charged with the murder of M. Beltcheff, the Bulgarian minis-ter of finance, who was assassinated in March, 1801, while in company with M. Stambuloff. Mme. Beltcheff, it will be recalled, was recently induced to believe that M. Stambuloff was the murderer of her husband, and a warrant was issued, but never executed, for his arrest.
