# PAINT cracks.—It DEATH OF STAMBULOFF.

The Assault on the Great Bulgarian Ends Fatally.

HIS MURDERERS STILL AT LARGE.

The Assassination Arouses the Ire of Berlin Newspapers, One of Which Asserts That Prince Ferdinand Has Forfelted the Right to Wear a European Crown.

Sofia, July 19.-M. Stambuloff, who vas murderously assaulted by four men while returning home from the Union club on Monday night, died yesterday without having uttered a word since 10 o'clock Wednesday night, when the death struggle began.

A catafalque is being prepared on which the remains will lie in state. The am-putated hands of the murdered man have been preserved in alcohol. The interment will take place tomorrow. The government has not yet proposed to give the re-mains of M. Stambuloff a state funeral. The widow of the deceased statesman has received many telegrams of condolence from high personages in different parts of Europe, including Queen Victoria and the Prince of Wales.

The government has offered 10,000 francs for the capture of the murderers. Public opinion points to Haloff, Nikola, Ivanheff and Tufektchieff as the authors of the erime. It is said that the government has decided to rearrest Tufektchieff, who was liberated on Tuesday. Stambuloff had al-ways designated the brothers Tufektchieff as the assassins of N. Beltcheff. The gov-ernment organ, Mir. suggests that Stambuloff's servant, Todoroff, and some members of of his party committed the crime.

M. Stambuloff was called the "Bismarck of Bulgaria," and was assuredly the leading statesman of the Bulgars. He was born at Tirnova in 1855. After the elec-tion of Alexander I as Prince of Bulgaria he became, with M. Karaveloff, one of the chiefs of the Liberal party, and was elected president of the sobranje in succession to the latter in 1884. He continued president for two years, but in August, 1886, when the conspiracy against Prince Alexander came to a head at Sofia, he, together with Colonel Mutkuroff and M. Karaveloff, formed a counter government in opposition to the revolutionary government un-der Zankoff, which had only a short duration. Prince Alexander was able to re-turn to Bulgaria, but eventually abdi-cated, in view of the hostile attitude of Russia, and Stambuloff, Karaveloff and Mutkuroff were nominated regents on

Under his influence the grand sobranje in 1887 elected Prince Ferdinand of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha Prince of Bulgaria. Several attempts were made to assassinate Stambuloff, and he repressed his enemies with such terrible rigor that the European press loudly protested, and called him a judicial murderer. The crowning act of his powerful reign was the marriage which he arraigned between Ferdinand and a woman of the royal blood, Princess Marie-Louise of Parma, which was announced by proclamation in February, 1893. At this point in his career Stambuloff again tried to get the great powers to recognize Bulgaria as an inde-pendent state. In that he falled. The Japanese have already taken Keelung, which is only eighteen miles from the capitol, Tarpelefu, and order there will soon be restored. The movement for independence was organized by the officials. "There were 250,000 Chinese troops in Formosa," says Mr. Denby. "They are well armed, but will not fight. Many of these braves are now in Amoy fighting foreigners.'

KILLED BY A CAVE IN.

Two Men Dead and Three Seriously Injured at Newark, N. J.

NEWARE, N. J. July 19.—Two men were killed, two fatally injured and three seriously injured by the caving in of a sewer trench in Harrison, Hudson county, across the river from this city, yesterday afternoon. The accident occurred in Jersey street, between Fourth and Fifth

Unknown man slightly injured. Contractors Thomas J. Began & Co., who had charge of the work, owing to an accident that occurred at the same place last week, had been notified by the police to have the earth properly shored up. It is claimed that this was not done, with the

result of yesterday's cave in. The trench was ten feet deep by four feet wide, and the crash came without the slightest warning. Ten men were at work at the time, but three managed to make their escape. The others were completely buried under a mass of earth. An alarm was given, and soon police and those liv-ing in the vicinity were at work trying to

liberate the entombed men.

The work of rescue was slow on account of the danger of a further cave in, and it was half an hour before the first of the unfortunates was reached. He was Thomas Bronnan, and beside him was Engrene. The unknown man was found next, and then McDonald and Lonedy, close together. They were unconscious, and were hurried at once to St. Michael's hospital. Ryan and Villadne were dead at the bottom of the trench. Their bodies were found lying across a pipe, over which they had evidently tripped in their attempt to escape.
