An Unusual Proceeding During the Summer Months.

THE PRESIDENT WAS NOT PRESENT

While the Cabinet Officials Refuse to Reveal the Subject Under Consideration, It Is Believed to Have Been Called to Suppress Cuban Activity Here. WASHINGTON, July 20.-For the first

time in many years there was a midsum-mer cabinet meeting in Washington yes-terday afternoon. In the absence of the president. Secretary of State Olney apparntly came to Washington from Falmouth for the express purpose, for he arrived at noon and left the city this morning. Secretary Olney called at the war department soon after his arrival at the state department, to talk with Secretary Lamont. The latter was absent at the time and he falled to attend the cabinet meeting, which was held later, although an effort was made to summon him by telephone. secretary Herbert next received a visit from the secretary of state, and about 4 s'clock the pair walked over to the state department and were closeted in the office of Secretary Olney. Here they were joined in the course of half an hour by Secretary Carlisle and Attorney General Harmon, who had been called by telephone

into the conference.

The conference lasted for fully two hours, and from time to time Assistant Secretary Adee, who has been acting as eretary of state during the absence of Secretary Olney, was called into the room to advise the cabinet as to some point under discussion. Whatever was the subject or subjects considered cannot be learned, and apparently it was resolved to keep the matter secret, for each of the persons present, as they emerged, declined courteously, but positively, to answer a single question touching their deliberations. All that could be gathered was to the effect that nothing had happened at Gray Gables to give rise to any apprehen

Still, there was an air of gravity in the demeanor of the officers as they emerged from the conference that would indicate that some weighty and important ques tions had been under consideration. What these may have been can only be surmised, without any tangible evidence of probability. One theory is that the Mora claim was before the cabinet in the shape of some proposition from the Spanish government for its settlement that perhaps involved the element of long time, and consequently justified some hesita-tion before it could be disposed of. Another idea broached was that there

was an ugly question as to the fulfillment of our neutrality obligations towards Spain that had caused the sudden assemblage of the cabinet officers. This had some color from the fact that the particular officers gathered at the state department yesterday afternoon were just those who would be charged with the execution of the neutrality laws. The secretary of state would be clothed with general supervision, the attorney general would look after the enforcement of the law ashore. the secretary of the treasury, through the collectors of customs and revenue cutters, would care for the ports and coasts, and the secretary of the navy would maintain the marine patrol. In further con-firmation of this theory, Senor Dupuy de Lome suddenly arrived in Washington from Massachusetts.

O. P. Tucker, Deputy Controller of the Treasury, Shows How Savereign's Plan, If Carried Out, Would Simply Contract the Currency \$211,000,000

WOULDN'T HURT NATIONAL BANKS

WASHINGTON, July 20.—At he treasury department it was said that plan of Mr. Sovereign, of the Kuights of Labor, of beycotting national bank notes, if carried out, would prove more harmful than bene-ficial to the labor interests of the country. as it would contract the currency to the extent of \$211,000,000 without injuring the national banks.
"It would not hurt the national banks

at all," said Mr. O. P. Tucker deputy con-troller of the currency. "If people should refuse to receive their notes the banks would simply present them to the United States treasury for redemption and receive legal tender notes, which they would con-tinue to use in their business. The only effect would be to withdraw that much money from circulation, as represented by the amount of notes redeemed

"It is true that under the law the acceptance of national bank notes cannot be enforced, and no man can be compelled to take them as legal tender. The fact that they are accepted in every day transac-tions is because the government is behind them, and stands ready at any moment to redeem them with legal tender. An effort to discredit national bank notes would, therefore, be an attempt to depreciate the government's currency. There are only \$211,000,000 of national bank notes in circulation, while there are \$650,000,000 of other kinds of money outstanding.

Dallas "Prominents" Want the Fight. Dallas, Tex., July 20.—One of the largest meeting ever held in Dallas assembled at the Commercial club house last night for the purpose of protesting against the proposed moving of the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight from Dallas to Galveston. The meeting was composed of over 300 prominent citizens, merchants, traders, property owners, lawyers, etc. A committee of twenty was appointed to confer with the county officials with regard to the legality of the proposed fight

Mormon Missionaries in North Carolina Winston, N. C., July 20.—Mormon elders are turning Surry county, in this state, topsy turvy from a religious stand-point. In and around Mount Airy, N. C., the illiterate people are flocking to the followers of Brigham Young, and in the Chestnut Ridge and other sections many families have become converts to the Mormon faith. The elders claim that they do not preach the doctrine of polygamy, but it is reported that they advocate this doctrine in private religious interviews.
