Damage to Minnesota Wheat.
MINNEAPOLIS, July 23.—Specials to the Journal confirm the reports of smut on wheat in the northern part of the Red River valley, running from Grand Forks to the line. Smut is also found in scattering fields of barley and oats. The condition is reported as not serious as yet, taking the whole acreage, but it is expected to lower yields considerably.

The Nicaragua Commission at Work.
NEW YORK, July 23.—The Nicaragua canal commission, which arrived on Sunday on the United States cruiser Montgomery, has opened headquarters in the Army building. There the commission will work on its report to President Cleveland. The real work of getting the report ready will not begin until the early part of next week.

The Disaster at Breux, Bohemia.
BREUX, Bohemia, July 23.—It has been definitely ascertained that twenty-five houses have been totally destroyed and fifty-nine partly destroyed by the remarkable sinking of the earth here. The disaster has turned nearly 2,500 persons out of their homes, for it is feared that other houses will collapse in the same district.

Sensational Reports Denied.
POCAATELLA, Idaho, July 23.—There is no truth in the sensational reports sent out from here regarding the outbreak of Indians, and no demonstrations have been made such as the Indians always make before hostilities are commenced. There is no excitement in Pocatealla, and no further trouble is anticipated.

Five Years for Defaulter Stebbins.
GREENFIELD, Mass., July 23.—Defaulter Albert L. Stebbins, ex-tax collector of Deerfield, was yesterday sentenced by Judge Maynard to five years in the county jail. His friends restored to the town \$7,000 of the missing \$7,500 embezzled.

WENDEL GRAF DROWNED

His Boat Capsizes in the Tumbling Run Upper Dam.
DROWNED NEAR THE COVE

He was a Prosperous Baker and Located in Pottsville Two Years Ago—The Coroner Takes Charge of His Effects.

From the Miners Journal.
Wendel Graf, a single man, about 38 years old, doing business as a baker at 201 North Centre street, was drowned in the upper dam at Tumbling Run last evening between 6 and 7 o'clock. Graf came here from Shenandoah two years ago where he was engaged at his trade on Jardin street for about five years. He has no friends or relatives in this section, and it is believed his nearest of kin in his country is his sister who is living in a convent in Chicago. His parents, who are wealthy farmers, live at Baden, Germany, from which place Wendel left for America about 12 years ago.

The Boat Capsized.
Graf and John Schurt, a baker employed by Henry Leibel, spent the afternoon together and visited a number of beer saloons before they started for Tumbling Run at about 4 o'clock. Both were in a hilarious spirit when they boarded Nick Schurt's trolley car, and had a few words with the conductor.

The men rolled ten-pins after they reached Tumbling Run and got into hot words about a certain matter. Then they hired a boat from Joseph Gorman and took a row to the opposite side of the dam and landed near the cove. They undressed, leaving nothing on but their drawers, and got into their boat. Schurt, who it seems is the only living witness of his friend's death, says when they got out about 20 feet from shore, the boat capsized and threw both men into the water, which is only about nine feet deep at this point.

Schurt held on to the boat, but Graf lost his hold and disappeared beneath the surface of the water. He never came up and the theory is that he must have been seized with cramps and became helpless. He was a good swimmer and had the reputation of being a good oarsman. Schurt became so excited that he rowed back to shore and put his shirt on inside out. Then he gave no alarm.

The Body Found.

Grappling hooks were furnished by Mr. Gorman and George Mager, William Tarr and Thomas Lloyd pulled the body to the surface within 20 minutes after the man sank out of sight. They tried to resuscitate the man, but with no avail. The body was placed on shore and left there until the deputy coroner arrived. He and Deputy Coroner composed of the following: Captain a jury Kennedy, Charles Downing, William J.erson, William Clausen, William Stevenson, Joseph Rothstein, John Boland, Robert Howell. The body was rowed to the opposite shore after viewing it the jury repaired to the hotel where the testimony of those who found the body was heard. Undertaker Heiken brought the remains to the late home of the deceased a few minutes before midnight. The hearing of testimony will be resumed at the drug store of Deputy Coroner Clemens at 12:30 p. m. to day. John Schurt will then give his testimony.

A Prosperous Business.

Graf was prosperous in his business and had three teams on the road. He employed two bakers, Charles Ott, foreman, and a man named Charles Eberhart. He occupied the old Miller bakery. His housekeeper was Miss Annie McGone, who kept the place in a very tidy condition, and looked after the business of the store besides giving her time to the household work. Very little is known about Graf's business or his antecedents. A pocket-book containing \$18 was found in his clothes. A key to his private cash box was also found in his clothes. The Deputy Coroner has the money in his possession and has taken charge of the bakery which under his instructions will be closed to-day after the bread and other goods in process of making are disposed of.

A big crowd collected in front of the house when the news of the drowning became known and several men were kept busy keeping the morbidly curious from invading the home.

Charged with Poisoning Her Husband.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 23.—The coroner's jury in the case of Mrs. Mary Spivey, charged with poisoning her husband, received the report of the state chemist. It was to the effect that no traces of morphine could be found in the stomach. He stated, however, that it did not follow that poison was not taken. The body had been embalmed, and embalming fluids are often fatal to successful detection of poisoning. The jury returned a verdict that the death of the deceased was caused by an overdose of poison administered or caused to be administered at the hands of his wife.

Yellow Fever and Cholera.

WASHINGTON, July 23.—The following are the latest advices to the Marine hospital service. Dr. Burgess, at Havana, cables as follows: "Yellow fever is markedly increasing in Havana among evil-lans." Consul at Hoga, Japan, cables that cholera is prevailing. Consular reports from Merina, Asia Minor, report as follows on cholera: For the week ending July 1, 450 cases, 300 deaths in Taurus; 500 cases and 300 deaths in Adana, and 3 cases and 1 death in Merina.

To Settle on Nanticoke River.

BALTIMORE, July 23.—Z. F. Boljens and C. W. Vanderhoop, making an inspection of the Eastern Shore counties of Maryland for the purpose of selecting a site for founding a colony of natives of Holland, have decided to locate along the Nanticoke river, in the upper part of Dorchester county. The colony will number about 500 persons, and if the first settlers are pleased they will be followed by a larger number of their countrymen.

Revolution in Colombia.

COLOMBIA, July 23.—A report has reached here that a revolution has broken out in three of the departments. News was received early in June of a fresh outbreak near Barranquilla, which was said to be due to the forces marched into Colombian territory from Venezuela. The success of General Almor's revolutionary movement in Ecuador has been expected to reawaken the revolutionary spirit in Colombia.
