THE TARDY FRENCHMEN

The Waller Court Martial Records Still Withheld.

MAY MAKE PEREMPTORY DEMAND

Our Government Will Not Submit Much Longer to the Dilatory Frenchmen, and the Case May Yet Lead to Serious International Complications.

WASHINGTON, July 27.—The officials of the state department are at present anxiously awaiting information from Ambassador Eustis as to the manner in which the second demand for the record of the Waller court martial, which was held in Tamatave, has been received in France. It is now learned definitely that the French government refused to furnish the record upon the first presentation of the request, and that this refusal was met on the part of the state department by a more positive and pressing demand for all the papers.

The department is informed by Ambassador Eustis that this demand has been presented to the French authorities. There has been quite sufficient time for a reply, but none has been received. The delay would seem to indicate that the French authorities appreciate the situation to an extent at least, and while apparently not prepared to change front without due consideration are yet disposed to delay another refusal as long as it can be done under diplomatic usage.

The course of the French in their refusal to supply the record is considered most unusual, and as no explanation of the decision was vouchsafed, the department is at a loss to know upon what grounds it was based. It is customary when a government asks for the evidence upon which one of its citizens has been convicted and sentenced to furnish a copy of the record, especially when the trial has been by a military court and in a country foreign to the two governments. There is no other means by which the government officials may determine whether justice has been done or denied its citizens.

It is presumed that if the refusal is not insisted in and an explanation is made in response to the renewed demand, it will be based upon the conclusiveness of the trial by the French court martial, but Mr. Kennedy, Waller's senior counsel, asserts that the precedents against this position are beyond question. The supposition is gaining ground that France's refusal to furnish the record is due to a desire not to give publicity to revelations made in the letters from Waller, which were intercepted by the French authorities, concerning the misconduct of some of the French soldiers. In letters which have been received here from Waller within the past few days he reveals the fact that in his letters to his wife he informed her of various outrages committed upon the native women of Tamatave, and gives such a circumstantial account of these proceedings as to render in a way which the French authorities might not desire to see published to the world.

There is good reason for believing that in case of a second refusal by France to supply the record a third demand will be made, which will be peremptory. It is not believed, however, that this step would be taken in the absence of Secretary Olney, as it is probable that if made it might lead to serious international complications. The state department authorities consider the case as one of importance, because it is liable to develop some very delicate and intricate questions before it shall be finally disposed of. It is known that Secretary Gresham took this view of it, and it is believed that while he has not had occasion to go into the details to the extent that his predecessor did, Mr. Olney also feels that it is a matter of extreme gravity.

Kansas Governor Appeals for Waller.
 TOPEKA, Kan., July 27.—Governor Morrill has addressed a letter to President Cleveland, again calling the attention of the federal government to the imprisonment of Ex-Consul John L. Waller by the French government. He says: "The people of our state feel that a great outrage has been perpetrated upon one of its citizens. It is not a question of race or color—it is a question of American citizenship—and through me the people of our state appeal to you to take immediate and active measures to secure justice to our fellow citizen." Congressman Curtis has sent another telegram to Secretary of State Olney on the subject, saying that he had written to the state department three letters and sent one telegram, but had received no reply.

General Schofield Praises the Army.
 WASHINGTON, July 27.—General Schofield, commanding the army, has returned from his tour of inspection of army posts in the west and northwest and his trip to Alaska. The general was absent from the capital over two months, and during that time inspected between twenty and thirty army posts. He is very much gratified at what he saw, and has nothing but words of commendation and praise for the army. The army posts where the men are stationed are generally in excellent shape and condition, though in some cases there is a lack of money to provide properly for their equipment.

The Sheriff Responsible.
 NEW YORK, July 27.—Recorder Goff summoned the grand jury before him and delivered a charge upon the negligence of Sheriff Tamsen in permitting the escape from Ludlow street jail of the three post-office robbers, Allen, Russell and Killoran. He said in strong terms that the sheriff could be held responsible for the prisoners' escape. The same question was recently considered by the federal grand jury, which contented itself with censuring the authorities.

Bulgaria's Brutal Apathy.
 LONDON, July 27.—The correspondent of The Standard at Constantinople comments upon the fact that Bulgaria does nothing towards the arrest of the suspected instigators or the actual murderers of Stambuloff. "The whole tone of the government press," the correspondent goes on, "indicates satisfaction at this brutal murder, while the persecution of his family is unabated and the sequestration of his property is maintained."

Latest English Election Returns.
 LONDON, July 27.—Polling, so far as returned, show the following state of the parties: Conservative and Liberal Unionists, 405; Liberals, 165; McCartyites, 63; Parrellites, 12; Labor, 2. Total opposition, 242.

THE HAVERHILL SCANDAL.

Alms-house Officials Declare They Court an Investigation of Alleged Abuses.

HAVERHILL, Mass., July 27.—Excitement runs high here over the proposed investigation into the management of the almshouse, and the step is generally applauded by the citizens. Charges have been preferred several times before, but have always been allowed to drop without investigation.

Mayor Jewett and Alderman Allen say that the published stories do not give a correct account of some of the transactions there. Witnesses have come forward and will testify at the investigation to acts of cruelty to inmates, pauper food, the eating of which made numbers of inmates ill, and to instances where inmates were confined to solitary cells, with bread and water, for trivial offenses.

Chairman Oliver W. Hubbard, of the board of overseers of the poor, says he frequently called upon the semi-paralytic Doughton, but heard no complaints. City Physician Clark, who attends all patients at the almshouse, says no complaint has been made to him by any inmate of the institution. Superintendent Savage, of the almshouse, makes a general denial, and with Mr. Hubbard, says he is desirous of a full public investigation, which, they say, will show conclusively that Haverhill has the best Almshouse in the state.

Manley Favors the Pacific Slope.

AUGUSTA, Me., July 27.—Joseph H. Manley said today that the national Republican committee will meet in Washington in December to select the place and date for the next Republican convention, instead of November, as reports have had it. "So far as my preference is concerned," said Mr. Manley, "I have for a long time thought that it would be a good thing to hold the convention on the Pacific coast. I favor San Francisco as the city in which the convention should be held. I do not know the view of any of the other members of the national committee on the matter, and the matter will, of course, be settled by the vote of the majority."

Charged with Petty Swindling.

CHICAGO, July 27.—Warrants were taken out yesterday for the arrest of Walter T. Swain on the charge of petty swindling. Swain was a member of the Peary expedition to the North Pole which left Philadelphia in June, 1896. Lieutenant Phillips picked up the young man in Brooklyn, and made him his private secretary. Swain was rescued with the rest of the party last year by an expedition of which Professor T. C. Chamberlain, of the Chicago university, was a member. He turned up in Chicago about two weeks ago, and it appears devoted himself to a series of swindles, of which members of the Peary expedition were the victims.

Atlantic City's Champion Yacht.

ATLANTIC CITY, July 27.—The ocean yacht race, under the auspices of the Corinthian Yacht club, of this city, was held yesterday. The race was open to pleasure craft of all sizes and description, and was won by the schooner yacht Helene, Commodore F. S. Brown, of the Philadelphia Yacht club. The skipper John E. Mehrer was leading the Helene, but Captain Gale refused to shorten sail, in consequence of which the wind carried away his bobsay and snapped the jib-boom in half, and the Mehrer was compelled to retire.

Vessel Wrecked, Crew Saved.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., July 27.—The steam tender Ella Tohills arrived here yesterday from Alaska with news of the loss of the ship Raphael at Tanglefoot bay. The ship and cargo are a total loss, but the crew was saved. The Raphael was lying in the stream on July 7 preparatory to sailing for San Francisco, when a violent storm arose. The vessel dragged her anchors and went ashore despite all that could be done to save her. She began to break up as soon as she struck the shore.

Four Children Cremated.

BIG STONE GAP, Va., July 27.—John Hicks' house was burned during the night. Four of his children were burned to death and his wife and one more child were badly burned. The fire caught from a stove and burned very rapidly while his family slept. It was not discovered until it was too late to do more than save the parents and one child on the lower floor.

A Millionaire's Trial for Murder.

UNION, Mo., July 27.—Arthur Duestrow, the millionaire who two years ago murdered in cold blood his wife and child, was brought to trial yesterday on the charge of venue from St. Louis. Governor Charles S. Johnson is the chief attorney for the defense. Duestrow's defense will be alcoholic mania.

Sovereign's Bank Note Boycott.

KANSAS CITY, July 27.—Grand Master Workman Sovereign, of the Knights of Labor, was in the city yesterday on his way south. Speaking of his recent boycott circular he declared that it was taking "like wildfire," and was being carried out to the letter by the Knights of Labor.

Hailstones as Big as Walnuts.

DUBUQUE, Ia., July 27.—An extraordinary rain last night broke the drought. Nearly two inches fell in an hour. Hailstones as large as walnuts broke glass and did much damage. The flat portion of the city was flooded.

The Valkyrie Off for America.

LONDON, July 27.—The Valkyrie was towed to Tory Island today, whence she sailed for America with her whole crew aboard. No steamer accompanies her.
