A Quarrel That May End in Riot and Bloodshed.

BOTH SIDES SEEM DETERMINED.

The Governor Refuses to Take Part in the Appointment of a New Police Board, and the Other Commissioners Say They Will Proceed Without Him.

Омана, Aug. 2.-Police are in possession of city property, armed with pick handles, to resist any effort made under the new regime. The new force will be appointed this afternoon. The mayor has issued a riot proclamation.

The A. P. A.'s plans have already been

decided upon in a great measure. Johnny McDonald is slated for chief of police, ex-Sergeant Shoup is given an office in the new make up, and all of the policemen were recently dismissed for the good of the service will be reinstated, with two exceptions. It is also said that when the new board calls upon the present police force to obey the new chief that at least seventeen members will respond to the call. The present police force is on duty

and ready to retain possession.

Mayor Bemis, when asked what had prompted him to issue the riot proclamation, said it was merely a precautionary measure adopted to prevent bloodshed. He said nothing had occurred in the nature of a disorderly act or demonstration so far on the streets, but from what he had read in the newspapers it was necessary to put the people on guard against a probable riot.

Chief of Police White, when asked why he had a reserve force of police at the headquarters and the official police alarm operators guarded, said: "There has been great deal of inflammatory talk upon the streets, and there have been inflam-matory articles printed, and in the event of trouble I want men on hand to suppress it. I do not expect any trouble, but if there should be and I did not have the men to preserve the peace and enforce the law I should be condemned by the public, and rightly, too."

# SIXTEEN LIVES LOST.

The Greatest Flood in the History of Socorro, N. M.

A HUNDRED FAMILIES HOMELESS.

Not a Dwelling Mouse in the Piace Eseaped Some Damage, and Many of the Citizens Have Lost Everything-The Loss Will Exceed a Million Dollars.

SOCORRO, N. M., Aug. 2.-The flood of Wednesday was the greatest in the history of New Mexico. Sixteen persons are known to have lost their lives in the raging waters. After two hours of terrific rainfall a cloudburst struck the mountain about five miles above the town, and in less than half an hour after dark gigantic waves, bringing bricks, mud and debris, took their devastating course through the

The bridges and at least a mile of the grade of the Magdalena branch of the Santa Fe raffroad was washed away, and some damage has resulted to the main line south of the city. Of several houses which stood near the channels of the arroyos not a vestige is left. Many adobe houses in different portions of the city have fallen and others are giving way. Water entered the Catholic church, and the Convent of the Sacred Heart is ex-

It is impossible to save the adobe house when once the water has soaked through their foundations. The Appalling Mow Shing Wreck.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—Advices from Chefoo received by steamer say workers have been at work on the sunken Kow Shing, sunk by the Japanese cruisers off the Yalu river. They report that the vessel is an appalling sight, and she is literally torn to pieces with shot and shell. The 'tween decks are full of dead, many of the rooms being packed, especially on the star-board side, where fundreds of people had crawled to escape, if possible, the pitliess storm of projectiles.

Will be "Subdued" Before Winter. Madrid, Aug. 2. — Count Monterra, chief of the Cuban reform party, in an interview upon the state of affairs in the Island of Cuba, said today that operations against the insurgents would be commenced in sarnest early in autumn, and that before winter set in the rebellion would be over. Fatal Fires in Russia.

Berlin, Aug 2.—The two Russian towns of Grayiwo, near the Prussian frontier, and Sicclecheow, in Radom, have been burned. In the burning of the latter seven men perished.

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
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
