VIGILANT WON THE CUP.

But the Dashing Defender Again Shows Her Superiority.

KNOCKED OUT BY AN ACCIDENT.

Herreshoff's Latest Creation Had the Bace Well in Hand When Her Gaff Broke and She Was Compelled to Withdraw. Jubilee Defeats Volunteer.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 3.—The Vigilant won the Goelet cup for sloops yesterday because the Defender was forced to withdraw from the race within half a dozen miles of the finish on account of a broken gaff. But for this accident the Vigilant would probably have been nine minutes or more behind the Defender.

So far as practical results go the race enly reiterates what everybody knows, that the Defender is the fastest light weather boat ever built in America. She outpointed and outfooted the Vigilant in the beat to windward, which was the first leg of the course, and gained much more on her during the second leg, a run dead before the wind, a course supposed to be most favorable to the centerboard yacht. But just as the new vessel undertook a stretch for home, with only six and a half miles of the entire thirty-eight to cover, her hollow gaff snapped in two and she was compelled to give up.

At the first mark the Defender led the Vigilant by six minutes, with Jubilee third and Volunteer fourth. On the run to West Island Defender gained materially on the Vigilant, going around the second mark at 3:44:10, while the Vigilant did not show until 3:55:45. The Volunteer was nowhere. She did not turn until

At the turning of the second mark the Defender was seven and a half minutes ahead of the Vigilant on the time consumed from the start, and she had the same opportunity to lengthen the gap that she had off Sandy Hook on July 22, when on a long stretch for home she increased her lead. The last part of the race was a closer stretch, but the high pointing qualities of the fin keeler justify the statement that she would have gained on that leg. Although the Vigilant won the cup, it is a growing opinion that the American cup committee are satisfied that no formal trial races will be necessary, because the sailing of the Defender yesterday was good enough to evidence her continuous improvement, and that is all that is wanted in the way of information.

However, a test of the boat in a blow is still essential, for the Defender has not yet been tried in that sort of weather, but it is hoped that this one undisplayed quality of the yacht will be brought out be-fore this cruise of the New York Yacht club is ended. The Jubilee and Volunteer, which also started yesterday, were never in the hunt with the Defender and Vigilant, although the Jubilee did make bet ter time than the Vigilant on the eight een mile run before the wind from Block Island to the West Island lightship.

The Defender had not been past the mark more than a minute when her mainsail was seen to collapse. A second glance showed that the gaff had split right in the middle, and its two parts were sticking down into the head of the mainsail. Club topsail and mainsail began to flap, and the boat was instantly thrown up into the wind. After a moment's consultation between Mr. Isolin and Captain Haff it appeared as if they had concluded to try to finish. The yacht was kept on her course for the home mark close hauled. For five minutes she was kept at it, but sagged so far to leeward that it was decided to give up the race, and the Defender was taken in tow for Bristol.

The Vigilant went on and won the cup, gaining very much on the Jubilee on the last stretch. Such little luterest as remained after the Defender obtained her Pennsylvania R. R. big lead on the others was altogether lost when the accident occurred, and only became a matter of universal regret that it could not be seen how much the new boat would come in ahead of the Vigilant, for it is conceded that the Defender does better every time she starts.

The race between the schooners was a very secondary consideration. Laska got ne first, and won the cup on time allowance.

Murdered and Laid on the Track.

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Aug. 3.—The body of a young man was seen lying on the tracks of the Erie road near Stairway by Engineer Knauss, but all efforts to stop the train were fruitless. Twenty cars passed over the man. His arms were cut off, his right breast mangled and his neck broken. A bullet hole was found in the left breast. The body was cold. A letter found in the man's pocket is addressed "Mr. C. J. Twist, Kirkwood House, Geneva, N. Y.," and signed "Your Friend, Katie." A suspicious looking fellow who, it is thought, may have murdered the man, took a train at Pond Eddy yesterday for Binghamton.

Wisconsin Forest Fires.

PESTHIGO, Wis., Aug. 3.-Forest fires have again made their appearance in Mar-Inette county. At present they are confined to the territory lying between Ellis Junction and Marinettee, adjacent to the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul track, but fears are entertained of a more widely spread calamity, as vegetation is as dry as tinder, owing to the continued drought of the past two months.



A REMARKABLE STORY.

Sequel to a Celebrated Buffalo Kidnaping Case.

O. O. Cottle, Who Was Captured and Imprisoned in an Empty House, Charged with Accepting Money from One of His Abductors to Obtain a Pardon.

BUFFALO, Aug. 3 .- George Allen, one of the men who kidnapped Lawyer O. O. Cottle for ransom here some time ago, was arrested at the Mansion House yesteriay. He retained Hugh Pentecost, the one time preacher, for his attorney, and Pentecost tells a remarkable story. The crime that was committed by Allen, and one Emery, was one of the most daring ever perpetrated here. Lawyer Cottle was invelgled into taking a buggy ride to look at some property, and when ushered into a vacant house was overpowered and thrust into a cell, handcuffed and chained by his ankles to a post, gagged, and then under threats of death compelled to write a note to his wife asking for \$5,000 immediately. When this note was delivered Cottle's son, suspecting that his father was in durance, attempted by personal interviews with Emery to temporize, but of no avail. It is generally believed that the money was paid.

The elder Cottle was then liberated

from his dungeon, while his captors made their escape into Canada. It was first learned that Emery was an alias assumed by Claude Strong, of this city, who had, under the name of Emery, become a fugi-tive from Cincinnati justice and a resident of Toronto, Canada. He had employed Cottle as attorney to obtain a pardon to permit his return to the states, and claimed to have paid him something like \$14,000 for getting the pardon. Cottle failing in this endeavor, however, Strong, alias Emery, had sought restitution and finally devised upon kidnapping and ran-som to effect it. Alien admits his identity now, although he says his real name is John McDonald, and his place of nativity Louisville, Ky. He also confesses to the

kidnaping.

Hugh Pentecost was interviewed last evening. He asserts that Cottle swindled Emery out of \$5,000, and that Carlton Strong, a prominent architect and a brother of Emery's, had also swindled Emery. The New York lawyer claimed to have documentary evidence in proof of all this, and showed the reporter two rec signed by O. O. Cottle, one for \$2,000 and the other for \$1,000. Both receipts also contained the statement that the money was to be returned to John C. Emery in case Emery was not pardoned or his sen-tence commuted. Two hundred dollars of this amount, it was stipulated, was kept by Cottle, to be paid to William C. Oates, a representative in congress, now gover nor of Alabama, who, it was claimed by Cottle, was to aid in securing Emery's

Both Cottle and Carlton Strong, said Chris. Schmidt, Agt.,

Penteenst, had told Emery they paid large sums of money in Washington in their efforts to secure his pardon. These men, Penteenst said, he had visited and found that they had not received a cant. Being unable to get any satisfaction from his lawyers or his brother through entreaty, Emery conceived the idea of forcing the matter to public attention in the unique manner afterwards carried out. Mere writing to the newspapers, added Mr. Pentecost, would have been useless, as none would have believed him in opposition to two men considered so respectable in every way as O. O. Cottle and Carlton

Allen has been connected with Emery more or less intimately for many years. Both he and his connsel say that he came to Buffalo with the express purpose of forcing Cottle and Cariton Strong to either hand over the money or take the step which they have taken in causing his
