EX-OONSUL GRACEY'S EXPERIENCE.

He Explains That All Foreigners Are in Constant Danger of Massacre Through the Ignorance of the Masses-The Victims of the Latest Outrage.

BUFFALO, Aug. 6.—Samuel L. Gracey, of this city, late United States consul at Foo Chow, China, was interviewed on the reported massacre at Ku Cheng. Mr. Gracey said: "Ku Cheng, the place men-tioned in the press dispatches as the scene of the latest anti-foreign riots in China, is in the Fuhkien province, about ninety miles above Foo Chow. It is fully a hun-dred miles from Pagoda anchorage, the highest point of navigation for steamers in the Min river, hence is entirely beyond the protection of American or other foreign gunboats."

'The literati have been stirring up trouble against the foreign residents there for many months, and the danger to life and property became so great that about two months ago all American residents there were recalled to Foo Chow. These were the Rev. and Mrs. W. C. Wilcox and three children, Miss Mabel Chartford and Miss Rouse, the two latter representing the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, and all of the Methodist church. The other foreigners there were three or four mem-bers of the English church mission, who may not have been recalled during recent troubles. It is probable that matters may have quieted down there after the foreigners came away, and some may have been encouraged to return.

"The common people do not distinguish between Japanese, American, English and German nationalities, but all are alike-foreign devils, and obnoxious. We cannot but fear that outrages such as have just recently transpired at Chengtu, in the northwest interior, will occur in other localities where foreign missionaries are residing far away from the treaty ports, and hence beyond the protection of for-eign gunboats. The people are extremely ignorant and excitingly superstitious and easily imposed upon. The fact that the recent outrages in the Szechnan province were connived at by the highest authori-tics in the district at the time (since removed) gives cause for much anxiety concerning all foreign missionaries living in the interior. "The people and the officials of the

Folkien province, in which Ku Cheng is located, have been among the most friendly of all in the empire toward for-eigners, and this mussacre will be most surprising to all familiar with the countrv

Considerable light is thrown upon the feeling of the Chinamen towards foreign-ers and the causes which led up to the recent massacre by an article printed in the North China Herald of July 5, regarding the previous riots, a copy of which Mr. Gracey had. It was as follows:

"At Changtu the officials, who have more than an adequate force at their dis-posal, made no serious attempt to stop the destruction of the Protestant and Cath-olic property, though appealed to from the first, although, when the destruction was complete, they protocted the lives of the missionaries, for the word seems to have been. 'Drive out, but not kill.' The chief of polles at Chengtin, a Hanan man, a Taoti in rank, issued the following proclamation on the second day of the riots.

At the present time we have evidence that foreigners deceive and kidnap small children. You soldiers must not be disturbed and flurried. When the cases are brought before us we certainly will not be leniont with them.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.-The garment work ers' strike is practically a victory for the union, although Secretary Witkowski, who on Saturday night made a formal presentation is the surrender in the name of the Contractors' association, was not able to deliver all of the goods, and a few employers are still resisting the workers' demands. The setthement committee of the strikers was engaged all day yesterday in making out forms of agreement for amployers to sign. Forty agreements were filed from 9 o'clock in the morning until 4 in the afternoon This makes a total of 400 contractors, rep resenting 12,000 strikers in New York and vicinity, who have accepted the terms of the workmen. Leader Scheenfeld, of the strikers, snid: "Over 5,000 of our men returned to work

yesterday and today, and there are now only 200 contractors who have not signed our agreement. They are nearly all asso-clation men, and they may hold out two or three weeks. In the meantime the old contractors will be doing all the work."

According to official reports 4,000 coat makers, employed usually by 200 contrac-tors, are still on strike in this city. Secretary Witkowski now denies that he did surrender Saturday, and the strik-ess much bittenie scener birs. ers speak bitterly against him. There was a meeting of the contractors'

association yesterday afternoon, at which several contractors urged a continuance of the strike. Last night the strikers held a mass meeting which was jubilant in the tenor of its speeches.


