

THE FIFTEENTH VICTIM

THE CAUSE OF THE ACCIDENT.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.-The cause of the collapse of the Ireland building, in which fifteen lives were lost, came to light yes-terday when the workmen engaged in

But one more man known to have been in the building is missing, and it is expected that his body will be found there.

He wanted the Populists to give up local strife for small offices and join in the effort to get the southern Democrats and western Republicans united in the fight for free silver.

A New Electric Combine.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.-The World says: A new and gigantic electric combine has just been forced to fight the new Westing-house-Baldwin combination. It includes the Yerkes railroad people and the Sie-mens and Halske Electric company. The combination means the entry into the American market of a big foreign electric supply manufacturing concern, in affiiliation with the Widener-Elkins syndicate of the street car lines in New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburg and Chicago. Charles F. Yerkes, the head of the new combine, is known as the Chicago cable king.

Riotous Italian Strikers.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 14.-One hundred and fifty Italians employed on the excavations for the conduit at Allegheny struck for an advance of twenty-five cents per day in wages. Other men were secured to take their places, and yesterday the strikers tried to drive the new men from the work. Stones, clubs and revolvers were freely used, and two Italians, whose names could not be learned, had their heads split open in the malee. The mob was dispersed by the police. No Confirmation of the Reported Resignation of Campos.

THE INSURGENT ARMY GROWING.

General Do Quesada Asserts That Spanlards Are Constantly Describing to the Ouban Standard-Reported Capture of an Insurgent Lander.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.-No confirmation has been received of the report in a daily paper of this city that General Campos had resigned his command of the Spanish forces in Cuba. In an interview with General De Quesada on the subject the General De Quesada on the subject the Cuban leader said: "It would not be sur-prising if General Campos did carry out his oft repeated threat of throwing up the command in Cuba.

"Information just received from Camaguya tells of the success of General Gomez and of daily reinforcements to his ranks. The city is in a panic and the Spanish troops are afraid to venture beyond its lim-its. General Campos has ordered that every body of troops shall leave monuments be hind, in order to show that they have have operated in the places designated by him. When the soldiers return from their excursions in this region one-half of them are disabled by sickness. In the hospital at Puerto Principe there are over 400 Spanish soldiers, and the deaths average twelve per day. "From the sugar plantation of El Lu-

garano fifty Spanlards, natives of Gallicia, recently joined the insurgents, show-ing that even the Spanlards are in sympathy with the revolutionists. From Ma-drid I am informed that the reserves of 1891 are so disgusted at being ordered to Cuba that the government is afraid of a mutiny. To prevent this they have been disarmed, and their arms and ammuni-tion will be shipped on a transport to Cuba. The reserves, however, declare they will join the revolutionary forces when they are disembarked in Cuba.



All but three were taken out with but slight injuries. Henry Young and Joe Jones were dead when re-covered, and Richard Hall had his ankle crushed, and perhaps is internally injured.


